4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning. I
5 call the April 6th, 2022 meeting of the
6 Philadelphia City Commissioners to order.

7 First, I will preserve the order on
8 decorum in these meetings means everyone in
9 attendance should be on notice that shouting
10 out or interrupting the proceedings will not
11 be tolerated. Those who violate this will be
12 asked to leave.

13 The Sunshine Act permits anyone
14 attending a public meeting to object to a
15 perceived violation at any time during the
16 meeting. If you choose do so, please
17 succinctly state your objection. Objecting is
18 not an opportunity for speechmaking.

19 We will now move to public commenter's.
20 Commenter's shall state where they live or if
21 they are not a resident of Philadelphia, they
22 they're a Philadelphia taxpayer. Public
23 comment is not an opportunity for dialogue or
24 Q&A. It's a public comment, a chance for you

1 to tell us what you think. Each speaker shall
2 have two minutes. However, I may extend this
3 time at my discretion.

4 All public comments must be relevant or
5 germane to Board business.

6 Finally, it is my responsibility to
7 preserve the order and decorum of these
8 meetings as such profane, slanderous,
9 discriminatory or personal attacks will not be
10 tolerated.

11 Please note that we will be doing
12 polling place changes later in the meeting.
13 So anyone wishing to be heard on a polling
14 place change, please wait until that time.

15 Is there anyone here for public
16 comment? Seeing none we will now move to
17 Commissioner Bluestein for e-mailed public
18 comments.

19 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: There was one
20 e-mailed public comment. I have reviewed it
21 and ask that it be moved into the record. I
22 distributed it to each of the Commissioners
23 and it is available at the public table.

24 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I too have

1 reviewed the e-mail and ask that it be put on
2 the record.

3 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I have also
4 reviewed it. Please move it into the record.

5 We will now proceed to Old Business. I
6 call on Joe Lynch to read the report from the
7 Executive Director.

8 MR. LYNCH: Good morning,
9 Commissioners.

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning, Joe.

11 MR. LYNCH: Today's Sunshine Report: A
12 County Board of Election Report a special
13 election has been called for the office of
14 District Council, the 6th Council District, to
15 occur during the General Primary on May 17th.

16 For those interested in running for
17 this office, pertinent nomination paperwork
18 must be filed by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, April
19 7th.

20 Candidates for major and minor
21 political parties need to file a nomination
22 certificate packet and be nominated by their
23 party bylaws. Candidates for political bodies
24 need to file nomination paper packets.

1 Paperwork is available on our website at
2 philadelphiavotes.com or in our office at City
3 Hall, room 142.

4 As of yesterday we have processed all
5 paper ballot applications received through
6 Monday and are up-to-date with electronic
7 ballot applications.

8 We have approved 72,809 vote-by-mail
9 applications for the primary, which is 2,317
10 added from last week's total. Of those
11 applications processed so far, 45,203 are
12 paper applications and 27,606 are electronic
13 applications.

14 The voter registration unit for the
15 election cycle: To date they have processed
16 85,165 registration applications of which the
17 6,500 were paper. All units except documents
18 are working primarily on mail-in applications.
19 There are also processing and registration
20 apps and what mail-in apps come in.

21 Documents are also making street
22 districts full ward sets, and working on the
23 mail. They are also working with the courts
24 and doing petitions challenges.

1 The election board unit: To date
2 online training, 707 poll workers did the
3 online training; 5,267 poll workers have been
4 confirmed. In-person trained poll workers --
5 overall 1,322 were trained. Total schedule
6 for in-person training is 1,061.

7 That's all I have, Commissioners.

8 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you, Joe.
9 Moving on to New Business. We have Charlie
10 Stroman with the polling place relocations.

11 First, if there is anyone here who
12 would like to speak on the moving of a polling
13 place, please step forward.

14 Good morning. Please state your name
15 for the record.

16 MS. TACKETT: Good morning,
17 Commissioners. My name is Julia Tackett.
18 Hello.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning.
20 Thanks for coming.

21 MS. TACKETT: Thank you for hearing my
22 testimony. I am a committee person in ward
23 two, division four. For the -- until recently
24 our poling location was a splendorous

1 Vietnamese Banquet Hall called Maxim Saigon at
2 6th and Washington Avenue. It has closed and
3 is no longer being a polling location.

4 In the subsequent of four election
5 cycles, our polling division has been moved
6 around quite a bit and each time it has a
7 severe chilling effect on voter turn out.

8 As the committee person, it is my
9 responsibility to canvas in this division. I
10 would estimate that I have canvassed this
11 division 50 times in the past four years.

12 I take canvassing and especially GOTV
13 efforts very, very seriously. But even if I
14 knock on every door three times, it's unlikely
15 that I will be able to speak to every single
16 voter.

17 The litigious process of Washington
18 Avenue recently has also shown that sending
19 paper alerts to people, notifications of
20 voting place changes does not always reach
21 them. The last two poll or election days
22 we've worked at Santore Library at 7th and
23 Carpenter.

24 And all day long, it's my job to stand

1 outside with a sign about finding your polling
2 table. And people show up throughout the day
3 who have to vote at other locations even
4 though the signs have been put up and the
5 notifications have been mailed, they have not
6 gotten the message.

7 The messaging has not gotten through to
8 them. As a result they walk a few blocks out
9 of their way to a polling place that is no
10 longer current and the net effect is that they
11 do not vote.

12 I am concerned that because ward two,
13 division four has been moved from Maxim Saigon
14 to Columbus Square to Capitolo to Santore,
15 back to Maxim Saigon, back to Santore, I'm
16 very concerned that this will cause undue
17 confusion for folks who will in the end not
18 vote on election day.

19 This election day is very important to
20 our division because our state reps are up for
21 election and the Democratic Primary. My
22 division is over 80 percent registered
23 Democrats. It's a Democratic division.

24 I do not want to have a chilled effect

1 on voter turnout as a result of the polling
2 place be being changed.

3 Santore Library is not closing as a
4 poling location it is staying as a polling
5 location. I respect the position of the City
6 Commissioners and the Board of Elections to
7 have to coordinate the logistics for all of
8 these poling locations, but I respectfully ask
9 do not move us from Santore.

10 I have expressed this to my board
11 leader, to our election day subcommittee
12 chair, I am not sure why ward two requested
13 this move to be made, if it was ward two that
14 made this request, but I am again respectfully
15 asking do not move ward two division four from
16 Santori Library. Thank you very much. I
17 appreciate it.

18 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you for your
19 time. Charlie Stroman.

20 MR. STROMAN: Good morning,
21 Commissioners.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning,
23 Charlie.

24 MR. STROMAN: First of all polling

1 place update. As of right now, 708 sites.
2 We're waiting on two confirmations for a total
3 of three divisions. So as of right now 708
4 sites and we're waiting for two polling places
5 so we're doing really well in that category.

6 Now we move to the hearings.

7 Commissioners, should I state ward two
8 division four hearing? We have a request to
9 move from the Santore Library to the Capitolo
10 Rec Center for voter convenience.

11 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Charlie, can you
12 tell me how many divisions are at the library?

13 MR. STROMAN: Yes, three. Last
14 election three divisions voted at Santore
15 Library.

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: And what is
17 the maximum number that you think it could
18 hold?

19 MR. STROMAN: Three.

20 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: And how many vote
21 at Capitolo?

22 MR. STROMAN: We had one last election
23 and we would have two and that would be the
24 maximum for Capitolo.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Is Santore Library
2 located within 2/4?

3 MR. STROMAN: Santore Library is
4 located in 2/11.

5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Capitolo Rec
6 Center, is it located in 2/4?

7 MR. STROMAN: 2/5. Do you see the map
8 that I attached there, Commissioner?

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: So it says on the
10 edge?

11 MR. STROMAN: Yeah, you notice four and
12 five are south of Washington Avenue --

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: So at the Santore
14 Library and you'll forgive me. I just want it
15 for the record. Does the voter have to cross
16 Washington Avenue from 4 to get to Santore?

17 MR. STROMAN: So if it changes, yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Charlie, I
19 think it's the opposite. Currently they have
20 to cross Washington Ave, yes. If the change
21 occurs, they would not.

22 MR. STROMAN: Four and five are
23 adjacent to each other.

24 COMMISSIONER SABIR: So Charlie, so it

1 appears looking at the map, that Capitolo's
2 closer to 4 than the library?

3 MR. STROMAN: Correct.

4 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Would you say it's
5 not --

6 MS. TACKETT: For certain parts of the
7 division, its closer.

8 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Excuse me. I
9 motion that we take the board of division ward
10 two, division four under advisement.

11 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

12 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner
13 Bluestein, please call the roll.

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner
15 Deeley.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
18 Commissioner Sabir?

19 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

20 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Ward two division
21 four polling place change will be taken under
22 advisement. Thank you for coming.

23 MS. TACKETT: Thank you very much.

24 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Charlie, is there

1 anybody else here to talk about a polling
2 place change?

3 Charlie, you may proceed.

4 MR. STROMAN: Okay. The next change
5 request would be in Ward two, Division twelve
6 moving from the courtyard at Portmans at River
7 View to the Santore Library and that's for
8 voter convenience. Could I make a suggestion?

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
10 take the polling place change ward two,
11 division twelve also under advisement.

12 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner
14 Bluestein, please call the roll.

15 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner
16 Deeley?

17 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
19 Commissioner Sabir?

20 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

21 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Please proceed.

22 MR. STROMAN: The next two would be in
23 the Fifth Ward. One would be the 27th
24 Division. The next one would be the 30th

1 Division moving from the Painted Bride to the
2 Old First Reformed Church. The reason being
3 is the Painted Bride was sold.

4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
5 approve the proposed move Division Five -- I
6 mean Ward Five, Division 27 and Ward Five,
7 Division 30.

8 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner
10 Bluestein, please call the roll.

11 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner
12 Deeley?

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
15 Commissioner Sabir?

16 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

17 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Please proceed.

18 MR. STROMAN: The next one would be the
19 Eighth Ward, 28th Division moving from Trinity
20 Memorial Church to the Markward Rec Center and
21 that would be back to the original location.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
23 approve the proposed move Ward Eight, Division
24 28. Commissioner Bluestein?

1 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner

3 Bluestein, please call the roll.

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner

5 Deeley?

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

7 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

8 Commissioner Sabir?

9 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Please proceed.

11 MR. STROMAN: Next one would be the
12 39th Ward and 39th Division moving from the
13 Seafarers Union Hall to the Jenks School
14 trailer and that is for voter convenience.

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
16 approve the proposed move 39th Ward, 39th
17 Division.

18 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner

20 Bluestein, please call roll.

21 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner

22 Deeley?

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

1 Commissioner Sabir?

2 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

3 MR. STROMAN: The next two would be the
4 48th Ward, the 7th Division and the 22nd
5 Division moving from their recreation center
6 to the Saint John Neumann Place. The reason
7 being their recreation center is closed for
8 construction.

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
10 approve the proposed move 48/7, 48/22.

11 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Second.

12 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner
13 Bluestein, please call roll.

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner
15 Deeley?

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
18 Commissioner Sabir?

19 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

20 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: The last one will be in
22 48th Ward, the 23rd Division, moving from
23 Barrett Neighbor Center to the Universal
24 Audenried Charter School and that's for voter

1 convenience.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we
3 approve the proposed move. Ward 48, Division
4 23.

5 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Second.

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner
7 Bluestein, please call the roll.

8 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner
9 Deeley?

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

11 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
12 Commissioner Sabir?

13 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

14 MR. STROMAN: And that's all I have,
15 Commissioners.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. We'll
17 let the record reflect Ward 2, Division 4,
18 Ward 2, Division 12, those two changes have
19 been voted to be taken under advisement
20 unanimously.

21 The following polling place changes
22 have been voted to approve unanimously Ward 5,
23 Division 27; Ward 5, Division 30; Ward 8,
24 Division 28; Ward 39, Division 39; Ward 48,

1 Division 7; Ward 48, Division 22; Ward 48,
2 Division 23.

3 Commissioner Bluestein, do you have any
4 items to be added to the agenda?

5 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I have none.

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner Sabir,
7 do you have any items to be added to the
8 agenda?

9 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I have none.

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: With no items
11 remaining on the agenda, this meeting is
12 adjourned to the call of the chair. Thank
13 you.

Dear City Commissioners-

I understand that a 2nd Ward committee person from Div. 4, Julia Tackett, may show up at your hearing to protest the relocation of the Div. 4 polling place from Charles Santore Library to Capitolo Playground.

This letter is to rebut that desire and to show **support** for the polling place changes your office has proposed for Div.'s 4 and 11. Namely, your office, in close collaboration with the 2nd Ward Election Day Committee (Caroline Tiger, chair of Election Day Committee, is copied above) has proposed that **Div. 4 use Capitolo Playground (inside rec center), 900 Federal Street, as its polling place**; and to **situate Div. 12's polling place at Charles Santore Library, located at 932 S. 7th Street.**

It makes geographic sense to make these moves.

Capitolo Playground is south of Washington Ave. (as is Div. 4)--and on the edge of Div. 4. (Div. 4 is bounded by 7th St. on the east; Washington Ave. on the north; and Passyunk on the west, with one sliver of the division butting up to 8th St.) Locating Div. 4 polling place here would mean that voters would not have to cross Washington Ave. to get to their polling place. It is nearer to Div. 4 voters and alleviates concerns over crossing Washington Ave., making it easier for voters to get to their polling place, and to vote. (I've included a link to our website which shows the boundaries of all divisions in the ward.)

Charles Santore Library is located **within** Div. 12. Same rules apply. Voters in Div. 12 will not have to cross Washington Ave. to get to their polling place. We believe these moves make the best sense for the voters.

We support having Div. 4 at Capitolo Playground and Div. 12 at Santore Library and urge you to keep to your original proposal.
