4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good

5 afternoon. Today is June 1, 2021

6 this is a reconvening of the

7 Philadelphia Board of Elections

8 return board. We will now move to

9 with public commenters's.

10 Commenters's shall state

11 where they live or if they are not

12 a resident of Philadelphia, but they are

13 a Philadelphia taxpayer. Public

14 comment is not an opportunity for

15 dialogue or Q and A, it is public

16 comment; a chance for you to tell

17 us what you think. Each speaker

18 shall have two minutes. However,

19 I may extend this time at my

20 discretion.

21 All public comments must be

22 relevant or germane to Board

23 business. Finally, it is my

24 responsibility to preserve the

1 order and decorum of the meetings;
2 as such, profane, slanderous,
3 discriminatory, or personal
4 attacks will not be tolerated.

5 Anyone wishing to offer
6 public comment at this time,
7 please step forward.

8 MR. ROVER: Thank you for
9 this chance to comment. My name
10 is Jim Rover and I am a
11 Philadelphia resident in 19149.

12 On November 3rd I was a poll
13 worker for the first time and I,
14 um, wanted to address with what
15 happened in our division.

16 First, I wanted to thank the
17 Commissioners for their
18 outstanding performance over the
19 last seven months. I think all of
20 us who are a certain age realize
21 what we were looking at was
22 unprecedented in the modern
23 history of our country, and I
24 think that you all did a

1 spectacular job with not only
2 making sure that votes were
3 counted in Philadelphia County,
4 but that the whole idea of a
5 Democratic Republic was reinforced
6 across the country and around the
7 word.

8 The other thing I would like
9 the say quite simply is that I
10 think I'm going way back in my
11 life when I was in high school at
12 St. Joe's Prep. We had this funny
13 situation when I was in the 9th
14 grade. I had a course called
15 Civics and our teacher -- there's
16 a punch line to this. Our teacher,
17 his name was Moon Mullins. His
18 day job was the band leader for
19 the Philadelphia Eagles, but Moon
20 took great pride in his Civics
21 course. He had developed and with
22 that came being recognized by the
23 Pennsylvania Department of
24 Education, so he was very proud of

1 that. I think it might be time to
2 revisit the idea of Civics in the
3 school, and perhaps the Board
4 would look favorably on working
5 with the School District to
6 develop that kind of curriculum.
7 I am not a professional educator,
8 so I can't bring those services to
9 you, but I do hold a Masters in
10 Public Administration from the
11 Maxwell School of Syracuse
12 University, a Masters in Public
13 Administration in the '70. In the
14 beginning the Maxwell School was
15 called the Maxwell School for
16 Citizenship about 100 years ago.
17 I'm getting old. I just want to
18 thank you for the chance to
19 comment and congratulate all of
20 your personally for a spectacular
21 performance.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank
23 you so much. Thank you for being
24 here today, sir.

1 Is there anyone else here
2 for public comment.

3 (No response.)

4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Hearing
5 one. We will proceed.

6 Are there old business?

7 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I
8 have none.

9 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I have
10 none.

11 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: We will
12 now move to New Business.

13 Commissioner Sabir?

14 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Thank
15 you.

16 Firstly, I would like to
17 thank the Republicans,
18 Independents and Democrats, city,
19 county, state and federal
20 government officials,
21 Constitutional and Election
22 lawyers, law professors, retired
23 judges, public interest
24 journalists and Interfaith Clergy

1 who interrupted their Memorial Day
2 weekend, honoring our most devoted
3 and courageous, who kindly and
4 generously shared their insight,
5 opinion, constructive criticism,
6 experience and professional
7 awareness of the matter.

8 As an elected official
9 charged with helping to facilitate
10 fair and open elections in the
11 County of Philadelphia, I am
12 wholeheartedly and unwaveringly
13 committed to empowering and
14 enfranchising eligible voters.

15 In furtherance of my
16 commitment to enfranchising
17 eligible voters, I will be
18 planning six county wide voter
19 education workshops to focus on
20 how to properly submit a vote by
21 mail ballot before the general
22 election. I am also equally
23 committed to ensuring our election
24 and the ballot-counting process is

1 transparent, accurate, and
2 law-abiding.

3 Recently, I voted to count
4 eligible and timely received
5 mail-in ballots that declaration
6 envelopes were signed, but
7 undated. In further consideration
8 and guidance from the Department
9 of State have led me to reverse my
10 position on this matter.

11 While I still believe that
12 the absence of dates is an
13 inadvertent clerical error and
14 should not be used to
15 disenfranchise any eligible voter.
16 I also agree that we must uphold
17 the requirements set forth by the
18 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

19 Therefore, I am requesting a
20 consideration for a revote on this
21 issue.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Is there
23 a second?

24 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I will

1 second that motion.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: There is
3 a motion on the floor to
4 reconsider the vote on the
5 un-dated mail-in ballots.

6 Commissioner Sabir, your
7 vote?

8 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote
9 that we exclude timely submitted
10 mail-in ballots that are unsigned
11 and undated.

12 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote
13 in favor if that's the motion on
14 the floor.

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Okay. So
16 Commissioner Sabir, just for
17 clarity are you voting to count or
18 not count the ballots that are
19 undated?

20 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Not
21 count.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Not
23 count.

24 Commissioner Schmidt?

1 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Yeah.

2 I would vote to not count the
3 ballots that are undated.

4 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank
5 you.

6 The great John Lewis once
7 said: "When you see something that
8 is not right, not, fair, not just
9 you have to speak up. You have to
10 say something; you have to do
11 something."

12 When I cast my vote to count
13 the ballots with the missing date,
14 I was fully informed what it
15 meant. I knew that I would be
16 entering into a grey area of the
17 law. But I think that it is clear
18 by the number of other counties
19 that counted these ballots that
20 the decision is not as crystal
21 clear as some are making it seem.
22 Furthermore, I believe that many
23 of the similar circumstances that
24 existed in November still exist

1 today, in some cases it is worse.
2 The city's is still under many of
3 the same emergency declarations to
4 protect against the spread of
5 COVID-19. During the mail-in
6 ballot period, number were
7 spiking, with hundreds of new
8 cases a day, the pandemic was very
9 much still in effect. Yet even
10 though votes from this Board in
11 November resulted in many of the
12 requirements that the voters
13 needed to complete the declaration
14 envelope being eliminated, the
15 missing date has exploded as a
16 category of a technical violation
17 of statutory requirements that
18 would result in the invalidation
19 of thousands of votes.

20 In fact, the percentage of
21 mail voters who did not include a
22 date on their envelope increased
23 by 3.5 times from last November,
24 2.1% for this election verse .6%

1 in November.

2 At the same time, all the
3 money and education that went into
4 the November Election to inform
5 voters was not here in the
6 Primary. A key point of the
7 controlling opinion was that in
8 November, voters lacked the clear
9 understanding of the consequences
10 of their failure to add the date.
11 I would argue that is still the
12 case. The fact that non-dated
13 ballots counted in November but
14 now they are not supposed to count
15 only adds to the confusion for the
16 voters. We need to work with the
17 Department of State and the
18 Legislature to better communicate
19 with the voters the technical
20 requirements, but we should not be
21 punishing these voters.

22 This is my reasoning for my
23 vote. I am an independently
24 elected official elected to weigh

1 facts and make decisions, I am not
2 a rubber stamp. I felt that the
3 date issue, unlike the naked
4 ballot issue, was less settled and
5 had room for argument. If someone
6 disagreed with a decision from
7 this body, there is a formal
8 process laid out in the Election
9 Code to bring the matter before
10 the Courts.

11 My fellow Commissioners and
12 the Courts might agree with me or
13 they may not, but for me, if there
14 is a chance that counting votes
15 that might have a chance to
16 survive in Court, I am going to
17 side with enfranchising voters
18 every time. People have died
19 defending the right to vote so I
20 take this very seriously.

21 What I find to be the most
22 morally reprehensible, is that the
23 Republican leaders in the State
24 House, I hate to bring political

1 parties into a Sunshine Meeting
2 because it feeds in the political
3 divisions facing this country, but
4 that is simply stating who they
5 are. The House Republican Caucus
6 Leadership, threatening county
7 level elected officials who they
8 disagree with to change their
9 vote. Furthermore, to illustrate
10 that this is all some political
11 game, they are only threatened
12 Philadelphia elected's,
13 Harrisburg's favorite bogymen. No
14 letters were sent to any of the
15 other counties who counted the
16 undated ballots. They are looking
17 to threaten my livelihood because
18 it fits with their national
19 message and goals of making it
20 harder, not easier to vote, like
21 what we saw in Georgia and
22 Florida.

23 It also gives them a chance
24 to continue to sow mistrust in the

1 2020 Presidential Election. I will
2 not engage in a quid-pro-quo with
3 the Republican Caucus leadership,
4 I am not changing my vote.

5 Just to be clear, nobody has
6 appealed the decision of this
7 Board and the appeal window has
8 closed. Therefore, these votes are
9 counted. What this means is that
10 this motion is a motion to uncount
11 votes, something that is
12 unpresented.

13 Now votes by Ave M. Gracey,

1 constituents. Furthermore, this issue
2 disproportionately effects voters in our
3 poorer minority communities. 5.26% of the
4 ballots from the 7th ward, 5.14% of the
5 ballots from the 42nd ward, 4.11% of the
6 ballots from the 6th ward, 4.02% of the
7 ballots from the 16th ward, 3.99% of the
8 ballots from the 32nd ward, 3.85% of the
9 ballots from the 11th ward, 3.77% of the
10 ballots from the 3rd ward, 3.74% of the
11 ballots from the 40th ward, 3.69% of the
12 ballots from the 44th ward were not
13 dated. These voters did nothing wrong,
14 except that they forgot to place a date
15 on the envelope, which we know was done
16 sometime between April 19, 2021 and May
17 18, 2021. If this motion carries, they
18 will be denied the right to vote based on
19 factors beyond their qualifications to
20 vote. I again, vote to count.

21 As that motion did not count
22 as passed, we have to take a short
23 recess to update the results. We
24 will be back in a few minutes,

1 probably 15, 20 minutes.

2 Thank you all.
