The Return Board of the November 3, 7 2020, general and special elections having 8 been reconvened on this day of November 14, 9 10 2020, shall continue with the business of the 11 canvas and computation. We will now move to public comment. 12 13 Commenters shall state where they live or, if 14 they are not a resident of Philadelphia, that 15 they are a Philadelphia taxpayer. Public 16 comment is not an opportunity for dialogue or 17 Q and A. It is public comment. A chance for you to tell us what you think. Each speaker 18 19 shall have two minutes. However, I may extend 20 this time at my discretion. 21 All public comments must be relevant or 22 germane toward business. Finally, it is my 23 responsibility to preserve the order and 24 decorum of the meeting. As such, profane,

slanderous, discriminatory or personal attacks 1 will not be tolerated. Anyone wishing to 2 offer public comment, please step forward. 3 4 MS. GREENLEE: Hello. 5 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Good morning. Please 6 state your name for the record. 7 MS. GREENLEE: Leslie Greenlee (ph). My vote has not been counted for the 8 presidential election and I have voted since 9 10 1988 in the same division in Philadelphia and I voted since 2001 in the same house. I have 11 a lot of middle names. Leslie Marsha Lincoln 12 13 Killien Greenlee is my full name and I have 14 some documents here to show you. Some proof 15 of evidence. 16 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Ms. Greenlee, how did you vote in this election? 17 MS. GREENLEE: By ballot, by mail. 18 19 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Were you contacted by 20 our office? MS. GREENLEE: Yes, I was and I filled 21 out a form and actually brought it physically 22 23 into the Commissioner's office and then it still wasn't counted. 24

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1 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Okay, thank you. Can you please show your identification to our 2 compliance specialist Garrett Dietz. 3 4 MS. GREENLEE: Thank you. Thank you. 5 THE CHAIRWOMAN: 6 Ms. Greenlee, are you here this morning for the purpose of asking if your vote will count? 7 MS. GREENLEE: Yes. 8 9 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Should you desire for 10 your vote to be counted? 11 MS. GREENLEE: Yes. 12 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. Any more 13 public comment? Please approach. State your name for the record. 14 15 MR. MASARA: Good morning. My name is 16 Thomas Henry Masara (ph). It's been a 17 pleasurable experience for the last week to have tens of thousands of people in this city, 18 19 in this state, in this nation, in this world to thank this Commission, all three 20 21 Commissioners, for having a fair, full, 22 honest, accurate, honest, count on election 23 day. 24 That's a wonderful thing to have been

1	said because it's bipartisan but when I
2	thought about it that is 99.7 percent
3	insufficient to thank you for election day.
4	I'd like to thank each of you for the
5	approximately 215 days, nights where you
6	worked to have a fair, honest, accurate,
7	transparent election. So all of us and our
8	city, our state, our nation, and our world
9	would really like to thank you for about
10	215 days before the election. Thank you.
11	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. Anyone
12	else for public comment? Hearing none, we
13	will now hear a report from Deputy Seth
14	Bluestein on provisional ballot challenges.
15	MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning,
16	Commissioners.
17	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Good morning.
18	MR. BLUESTEIN: Earlier this week, the
19	staff canvassed the provisional ballots cast
20	in the general election and received
21	challenges to a number of provisional ballots.
22	These challenges fall into ten categories that
23	I will present to the Commissioners for a
24	vote. The first category are absentee and

1 mail-in ballots that were counted or voted in 2 person. THE CHAIRWOMAN: If anyone representing 3 4 those who brought the challenge would like to make an argument or if anyone representing a 5 6 candidate or party would like to speak on that 7 category of ballot challenge? Hearing none, proceed. Can you repeat the category? 8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Sure. Voters who cast 9 10 a provisional ballot, who also cast an absentee mail-in ballot that counted or voted 11 12 in person. 13 THE CHAIRWOMAN: I vote no count. 14 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote against 15 counting them. 16 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote no count. 17 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Those will not be 18 counted. 19 MR. BLUESTEIN: The second category was 20 a blanket challenge against provisional 21 ballots cast by a voter whose absentee or mail-in ballot was canceled in advance of the 22 23 general election. 24 THE CHAIRWOMAN: If anyone representing

those who brought the challenge would like to 1 make a argument or if anyone representing a 2 candidate or party would like to also speak? 3 4 Please state your name for the record. MR. BONIN: Adam Bonin B-O-N-I-N on 5 6 behalf of the Democratic Party and its 7 candidates. It's my understanding that this is a category that represents individuals who 8 were directed by the City Commissioners based 9 10 on guidance from the Department of State to notify voters whose envelopes received had 11 certain deficiencies that were cancelled and 12 13 that these were voters who were directed to cast provisional ballots in order to make sure 14 15 their vote be counted. If in fact these are 16 voters who fall within this category, this is 17 what the provisional ballot exists for and this is our hope that these ballots be 18 19 counted.

20THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. Anyone21else? Hearing none, I vote that these ballots22be counted.

23COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count.24COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count.

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1 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Proceed. These votes will be counted. 2 MR. BLUESTEIN: The third category are 3 4 provisional ballots cast by voters whose absentee or mail-in ballots were not returned. 5 6 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone here 7 representing those who brought the challenge that would like to make argument or if anyone 8 9 representing a candidate argument or if anyone 10 representing a candidate or party would like 11 to also speak? Hearing none, I vote to count 12 these ballots. 13 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count. 14 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count. 15 THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be 16 counted. Proceed. 17 MR. BLUESTEIN: The fourth category are 18 provisional ballots cast by voters who did not sign the affidavit. 19 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing 20 21 those who brought the challenge would like to 22 make an argument or if anyone representing a 23 candidate or party would like to speak on behalf of these ballots? 24

1 MR. BONIN: Just very briefly, Commissioners. My only question as to this 2 category -- and I hope that the Commissioners 3 4 have reviewed this thoroughly -- is whether these voters signed the envelopes in some 5 6 other place other than on the line of the 7 affidavit. If there's a signature anywhere on the outer envelope, if the voter may have been 8 9 misdirected as to where to sign, we would hope 10 that those ballots be counted. Obviously there needs to be some signature somewhere. 11 I 12 just want to make sure the staff is thorough 13 in determining that there was absolutely no 14 signature as to these ballots. 15 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you, counselor. Mr. Bluestein, was there a signature anywhere 16 on these ballots? 17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, 18 19 Commissioner. The ballots that were part of 20 category four had no signature anywhere on the 21 envelope. 22 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. I vote to 23 not count these ballots. COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote not to 24

1 count. COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote not to 2 3 count. 4 THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will not be counted. Proceed. 5 6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Category five are provisional ballots cast by voters who did not 7 fully complete the affidavit or the 8 information on the affidavit was inconsistent 9 10 with their record in the SURE system. 11 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing 12 those who brought the challenge would like to 13 make an argument or anyone representing a candidate or party would like to speak? 14 15 Hearing none, I vote to count these ballots. 16 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count. 17 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count. THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be 18 19 counted. Proceed. 20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Category six are 21 provisional ballots cast by voters whose 22 affidavit is missing any poll worker 23 signature. 24 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing

those who brought the challenge and would like 1 to make an argument or anyone representing a 2 candidate or party who would like to speak? 3 4 Hearing none, I vote that these ballots be 5 counted. 6 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count. COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count. 7 THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be 8 9 counted. Please proceed. 10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Category seven are 11 provisional ballots whose affidavits have no reason given for casting the provisional 12 13 ballot. 14 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing 15 those who brought the challenge and would like 16 to make an argument or anyone representing a 17 candidate or party would like to speak? Hearing none, I vote to count these ballots. 18 19 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count. 20 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count. THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be 21 22 counted. Please proceed. 23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Category eight are provisional ballots that were cast by voters 24

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in the wrong ward or division. 1 2 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing those who brought the challenge would like to 3 4 make an argument or if anyone representing a candidate or party would like to speak? 5 6 MR. BONIN: Just very briefly. Again, for the record this is Adam Bonin. It would 7 be our position that voters who are registered 8 to vote in the City of Philadelphia but who 9 10 happened to show up in an incorrect ward and 11 division, that those votes should be counted 12 as to those races for which they were properly 13 registered and not counted for those local races where they may have showed up at the 14 15 wrong polling place. 16 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you, counselor. I vote to count these ballots. 17 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count. 18 19 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count. THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be 20 21 counted. Please proceed. 22 MR. BLUESTEIN: The ninth category of 23 the challenge that was brought is a 24 provisional ballot envelope that has no

1 barcode.

2	THE CHAIRWOMAN: If anyone representing
3	those who brought the challenge would like to
4	make an argument or if anyone representing a
5	candidate or party would like to speak?
6	Hearing none, I vote to count these ballots.
7	COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count.
8	COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count.
9	THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be
10	counted. Please proceed.
11	MR. BLUESTEIN: Category ten are
12	provisional ballots who were challenged with
13	no explanation and the reason for challenge is
14	unknown.
15	THE CHAIRWOMAN: Anyone representing
16	those who brought the challenge would like to
17	make an argument or if anyone representing a
18	candidate or party would like to speak?
19	Hearing none, I vote to count these ballots.
20	COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: I vote to count.
21	COMMISSIONER SABIR: I vote to count.
22	THE CHAIRWOMAN: These ballots will be
23	counted.
24	MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you

Commissioners. That's all I have. 1 2 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you, Mr. Bluestein. We will now hear a report from 3 4 our supervisor of elections Garrett Dietz. MR. DIETZ: Good morning, 5 Commissioners. 6 7 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Good morning, Garrett. MR. DIETZ: I have one category of 8 9 ballots that I'm bringing before you today. 10 It's specifically voters whose identification response was received timely but could not be 11 verified due to technological issues with 12 13 SURE. 14 So to give a little context, part of 15 the absentee or mail-in ballot application 16 requires some sort of identification in the form of last four of your Social Security 17 number or PA driver's license or PA 18 19 identification card number. We had several thousand voters that 20 21 unfortunately could not be verified at the -for the first check. We sent a letter out to 22 23 all those voters informing them that their identification could not be verified and to 24

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give them a further opportunity to rectify the 1 situation. 2 We have a few hundred voters who 3 4 responded to the notice but unfortunately due to technological issues with SURE we were 5 unable to confirm or deny that the 6 identification that they provided was 7 sufficient. 8 9 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Garrett, is the state 10 aware of this issue? MR. DIETZ: Very much so. I've been in 11 12 talks for weeks with various members of the 13 Department of State. Both their programming 14 team and people next to or people higher up --15 people in the Department of State itself. 16 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Where do we get the proof of identification form from? 17 18 MR. DIETZ: A template was provided by 19 the Department of State well before this 20 election. It was altered slightly for the 21 usage for this county in particular. THE CHAIRWOMAN: Are any of these 22 23 voters first-time voters? 24 MR. DIETZ: Some are. I would say the

overall majority are long-time voters. 1 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Why would there be 2 voters without either a Social Security number 3 or a driver's license number on their file? 4 MR. DIETZ: If they originally 5 6 registered to vote before that was a requirement for registration. 7 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Is there anything 8 9 special about these voters records? 10 MR. DIETZ: So as you can imagine it 11 would be disproportionately elderly voters 12 because they would tend to disproportionately be ones who had to -- who would have 13 registered before the Social or driver's 14 15 license requirement was in effect. THE CHAIRWOMAN: Given what we know 16 today about this issue, is there any chance 17 that any of these voters will ever be able to 18 19 vote without a fix to the system? MR. DIETZ: Short of being able to find 20 a different source for the Social or driver's 21 license number of each voter and manual 22 23 affixing it to the record, the only other 24 opportunity that these voters would have to

1 vote by ballot ever again would be if SURE fixes the issue. 2 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Is Ms. Greenlee one of 3 4 these voters? 5 MR. DIETZ: I believe so, yes. 6 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. Anyone 7 else have any questions? COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Garrett, now 8 9 that we have those additional identifying 10 information, do we update their file in SURE 11 to reflect that? So the problem doesn't 12 persist since they just provided it to us. 13 MR. DIETZ: So we don't have any plan 14 in place yet but we can definitely look into 15 that. We can definitely take that into 16 consideration. 17 COMMISSIONER SABIR: How many files is it, Garrett? 18 19 MR. DIETZ: So the group of voters I'm 20 talking about in particular are a few hundred. 21 A few hundred voters where they responded 22 timely but the verification -- the identification verification could not be 23 24 processed.

THE CHAIRWOMAN: So it is my belief 1 that these voters did everything that we asked 2 of them. They submitted their applications, 3 4 they submitted their ballots and when we sent them a letter indicating that their ID was 5 6 unverified, they returned the forms that we 7 supplied for this purpose or contacted our office as instructed. 8 9 Clearly something is wrong with the 10 system that is preventing these voters from ever having their IDs properly verified and 11 therefore their votes counted. It appears 12 13 that their only option to prevent this in the future is to update their voter registration 14 with a Penndot number or a Social Security 15 16 number. 17 The ID verification process worked well for over 440,000 applications but it appears 18 19 to be putting these couple hundred voters' 20 voices in this election in jeopardy. I am 21 satisfied that they are legitimate votes given all the communication our office has had back 22 and forth with them. 23

I vote that we count all of the

Page 19 ID-verifieds that returned a proof of 1 identification form to us or contacted our 2 office with their identification information 3 4 as instructed and are being prevented from being verified because they have neither a 5 6 Penndot number or a Social Security number in their registration file. Do I have a second. 7 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Yes, second. 8 9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: All in favor? 10 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Aye. 11 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye. 12 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye. 13 MR. DIETZ: That concludes my business. 14 Thank you, Commissioners. 15 THE CHAIRWOMAN: One more thing, 16 Garrett. On this topic, I would like to vote to count the ballot of Leslie Greenlee as she 17 both returned the verification form to us 18 19 timely and appeared before us today to 20 demonstrate that she is a legitimate voter. 21 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I second. 22 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you. 23 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Ave. 24 THE CHAIRWOMAN: Thank you, Ms.
