1 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning.

2 BOARD MEMBERS: Good morning.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Call to order the meeting
4 of the Philadelphia City Commissioners Board
5 of Election for Wednesday, February 11th,
6 2026. This meeting is in compliance with the
7 Pennsylvania Sunshine Act. The Philadelphia
8 City Commissioners are a three-member
9 bipartisan board of elected officials in
10 charge of elections and voter registration for
11 the City of Philadelphia.

12 Each Commissioner is elected to serve a
13 four-year term that coincides with the
14 municipal election cycle for Mayor and City
15 Council. The Commissioner set and enforced
16 departmental policies to administer voter
17 registration and conduct elections in
18 accordance with federal and state voter
19 registration election laws.

20 The City Commissioners were created by
21 the Pennsylvania assembly in 1711 where they
22 focus on taxation, and held various regulatory
23 powers throughout the centuries. The
24 Commissioner started maintaining voter lists
25 in 1799 and took on more election-related

1 responsibilities, but didn't emerge into its
2 current form until the adaption of
3 Philadelphia's Home Rule Charter in 1951.

4 We will start off with public comment.
5 Before beginning their comments, commenters
6 shall state where they live or if they are not
7 a resident of Philadelphia and that they are a
8 Philadelphia taxpayer. Public comment is not
9 an opportunity for dialogue or Q/A. It is
10 public comment, a chance for you to tell us
11 what you think. Each speaker will have two
12 minutes to speak. However, I may extend the
13 time at my discretion. Public comment must
14 concern matters on today's meeting agenda.

15 Finally, it is my responsibility to
16 preserve the order and decorum of the
17 meetings, as such profane, slanderous,
18 discriminatory, or personal attacks will not
19 be tolerated. If you wish to make a public
20 objection to a perceived Sunshine Act
21 violation, please raise your hand and I will
22 recognize you. Outbursts will not be
23 tolerated.

24 Anyone wishing to offer public comment,
25 please step forward. Hearing none, we will

1 now move to report from Secretary for email
2 public comments. Commissioner Bluestein, are
3 there any email public comments?

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: As of 9:45 a.m.,
5 there were no email public comments.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you very much. We
7 will now proceed to old business. First, we
8 have a report from our Directors of Election
9 operations and administration, Mr. Joseph
10 Lynch and Mark Johnson. Joe, we'll start up
11 with you.

12 MR. LYNCH: Good morning, Commissioners.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning.

14 MR. LYNCH: This is our public meeting
15 update for February 11th, 2026. At the
16 Election Warehouse, the Voting Machine
17 Services Unit has been busy performing
18 scheduled general maintenance on the XLs. The
19 E-pole bulk unit began testing the ExpressVote
20 printers. The Election Materials Unit has
21 been working to ensure that the supplies
22 needed for our poll workers are ordered,
23 organized, and ready for packing.

24 For our voter registration report for the
25 election cycle to date, we have processed

1 58,352 voter registration applications, of
2 which 1,550 are paper and 56,802 are
3 electronic. This week we mailed out 10,544 ID
4 cards. All applications are up-to-date. We
5 are also training (indiscernible), Delaware
6 and Spring Garden and SEO personnel in
7 petition challenges and voter registration
8 refresher trainings.

9 The County Board of Elections is now
10 accepting mail-in and absentee ballot
11 applications. Voters on the annual mail-in
12 and absentee list started receiving their
13 annual application in the mail. Voters will
14 need to complete and return their application
15 to the County Board of Elections Office to
16 continue to automatically receive either a
17 mail-in or absentee ballot for each election
18 in 2026.

19 Voters may apply online rather than
20 returning the paper application at
21 vote.phila.gov. As of yesterday, we have
22 approved 14,134 vote-by-mail applications. Of
23 those, 306 are paper applications and 13,828
24 are electronic applications. This includes
25 civilian, overseas, military, and federal

1 voters.

2 We have started receiving back the annual
3 mail-in and absentee applications, leaving us
4 with a total of 8,382 applications waiting to
5 be processed. Of those, 5,879 are paper
6 applications and 2,503 are electronic
7 applications. Voters will need to complete
8 and return their applications to the County
9 Board of Elections Office by 5:00 p.m. on May
10 12th to vote by mail for the primary election.

11 Petitions for the upcoming general
12 primary election are now available on our
13 website at vote.phila.gov. The County Board
14 of Elections Office at City Hall Room 142, and
15 at our satellite election offices, will be
16 printing petition packets for anyone who needs
17 assistance. Any Democrat or Republican
18 interested in running for Members of Ward
19 Executive Committee Person will need to
20 complete and file their petitions with the
21 County Board of Elections Office Room 142.

22 Petitions cannot be circulated or filed
23 until Tuesday, February 17th. The last day to
24 circulate and file nomination petitions is
25 March 10th, and the last date for candidates

1 to withdrawal is March 25th, 2026. For the
2 Polling Place Unit -- the Polling Place Unit
3 is actively finding locations for refusals and
4 conducting field work to secure proof of
5 residence in coordination with the Voter
6 Registration Unit.

7 They will also consistently monitor these
8 sites in anticipation of the primary election.
9 The Board Workers Unit Winter Training for our
10 poll workers in January, the Election Board
11 Training seminar is posted on our website at
12 vote.phila.gov. To date, 2049 poll workers
13 have registered for the training, with 621
14 already attending. Training notifications
15 were sent out via letters, emails, and text
16 messages.

17 Weekly reminders will go out to those who
18 have not yet attended. The unit launched the
19 involved at 17 applications and a new poll
20 worker interest form in the working-the-poll
21 section of our website. We hope to recruit
22 250 new poll workers in February. Satellite
23 election officers are currently processing
24 online request for mail-in ballots while also
25 assisting the public with petition requests.

1 Offices are open Monday through Friday,
2 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Thank you. That's all
3 I have.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Joe. Vice-Chair
5 Deeley, do you have any questions?

6 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: Thank you, Chairman.
7 Yes, Joe, just one question. Are we keeping a
8 tracker on the 250? Do we know where we're at
9 with regards to --

10 MR. LYNCH: Not as of yet. I could find
11 out from Megan. I'll find out.

12 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: Okay. Thank you.

13 MR. LYNCH: Okay. Thank you.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you
15 have any questions for Joe?

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I have none.
17 Thank you.

18 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Joe. Mark, you
19 want to proceed?

20 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning,
21 Commissioners.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning.

23 MR. JOHNSON: Over the last couple of
24 months, we've been working hard on ensuring
25 that we're preparing for the next election

1 that's upcoming in May. Engagement Unit,
2 which has been primarily working on
3 translations and linguistic services with
4 different departments to make sure the
5 information that goes out to the community is
6 correct and appropriate.

7 Our communications department has been
8 working hard with all our other departments
9 and including your offices to make sure that
10 the community knows what dates are important,
11 information on the website is updated, and
12 that the commissioner's office is constantly
13 represented in the best possible light.

14 From a security standpoint, we have been
15 dealing with our security vendor for the city
16 is up currently on the contract. And we're
17 waiting for that bid to close so we can know
18 exactly who we're going to be dealing with in
19 the upcoming elections, since security is a
20 paramount thing for our organization. And
21 we're working on contingencies, if we do not
22 have our regular vendor because of contractual
23 concerns.

24 We're going to have to have some type of
25 plan B to make sure that they understand what

1 we do, how we go about doing it. Because
2 we're kind of unique in our role when it comes
3 to election management and making sure that
4 the vendor -- even though the contract that
5 goes out is a citywide contract, our needs are
6 real heavy for a very short period of time,
7 and not all contractors can deal with that
8 without a support. So we are aware of that
9 and we're working diligently to address that.

10 From an IT standpoint, the IT
11 department's been working with a lot of the
12 other departments to bring additional
13 efficiencies in through IT management,
14 creating new forms, working with investigation
15 unit to help find a really good way to
16 identify and track our polling locations.
17 Working with the poll worker unit on
18 potentially new software so that they can
19 manage poll workers a little bit more
20 efficiently. And, one, to make sure that they
21 can get paid quicker. I know that's a great
22 concern for all your offices.

23 And budget and finance. Today we'll be
24 dealing with the budget, so we'll go through
25 that when that time is appropriate. But we

1 have been working hard to make sure that
2 everyone's needs by talking with all the
3 different departments to ensure that not only
4 for this budget cycle, come up until election,
5 everyone's needs are met, the money is in
6 appropriate locations, our vendors are being
7 paid.

8 But to make sure that moving forward,
9 that we are flush, and we are officially
10 responsible in everything that we do, so.

11 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Mark. Vice-
12 Chair Deeley, do you have any --

13 MR. JOHNSON: I'm not done.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Oh, okay.

15 MR. JOHNSON: So, currently, from a HR
16 standpoint, we currently have 176 employees
17 total, 30 exempts, 146 civil servants, 51
18 clerk 1s, 25 clerk 2s, 28 clerk 3s, eight
19 trade harpers and eight voting machine
20 mechanics. And we also have one temp who's
21 also working for us currently, so.

22 CHAIR SABIR: You done?

23 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. There we go. Vice-
25 Chair Deeley, do you have any questions?

1 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: Thank you, Chairman.

2 I have none. Thank you.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein?

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Thank you. I
5 just have one question. Is the current
6 security contract already expired, or do we
7 know when it's going to expire?

8 MR. JOHNSON: It will be in April.

9 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: In April?

10 MR. JOHNSON: Yeah. So their bid closes
11 for the current contract, I believe, on the
12 18th of this month, I believe. So when
13 they're going to award that, that's really up
14 to the city. That's what we carry. We don't
15 currently have our own contract. That might
16 be something that we need to think about
17 moving forward later on, depending on what
18 happens. But for right now, it's a wait and
19 see type of thing.

20 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Okay. Thank
21 you.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Mark. And thank
23 you, Joe. I really appreciate the hard work -
24 - I appreciate the hard work from you and your
25 staff. We will now proceed to new business.

1 We will begin by considering our first agenda
2 item. A motion to approve the City
3 Commissioner's fiscal year 2027 budget
4 proposal for inclusion, and the mayor's
5 proposed budget pending City Council approval.
6 Is there a second?

7 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Commissioners, do you have
9 any comments on the items before we proceed to
10 vote?

11 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: I have none.

12 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I have none.
13 Thank you.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please
15 call roll.

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Vice-Chair
17 Deeley?

18 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: I vote no.

19 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
20 Chairman Sabir?

21 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. We will now proceed
22 to the next agenda item. Our motion to
23 approve the 2026 primary election ballot
24 canvas procedures and absentee in Maryland
25 ballot application challenge procedures. Is

1 there a second?

2 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Commissioners, do you have
4 any comments on these items before we proceed
5 to vote?

6 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: Thank you, Chairman.
7 Yes. If I may, I just would like to say that
8 I cannot vote in favor of any procedures that
9 eliminate the RTCs. That is how we ensure
10 that results from around the city arrive
11 timely and around the same time. Thank you.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Secretary
13 Bluestein?

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I have nothing.
15 Thank you.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Well, before we
17 proceed to vote, I just wanted to reassure the
18 public that our staff have been doing things
19 slightly different than we've done in the
20 past, but the result has always been excellent
21 and superb and above reproach. So, again,
22 thank you, staff, for bringing new, innovative
23 ideas to the Commissioner's office. And I
24 encourage you to keep on continuing bringing
25 new ideas.

1 Secretary Bluestein, please call the
2 roll.

3 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Vice-Chair
4 Deeley?

5 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: I vote no.

6 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
7 Chairman Sabir?

8 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. That was our last
9 agenda item. Is there any other business to
10 be raised at this meeting?

11 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: I have none.

12 MR. LYNCH: I have none.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Commissioners.
14 Before we close out, I just wanted to
15 recognize Black History Month. The 15th
16 Amendment was passed in 1870, and in 1871,
17 Octavius Catto was killed on election day for
18 organizing African Americans for the God-given
19 and constitutional right to vote. After
20 reconstruction and after passing of the 15th
21 Amendment, state and local commissioners from
22 across the country were not enforcing those
23 laws, which led to Jim Crow, which led to poll
24 taxes.

25 Poll taxes in many cases were one month's

1 salary for someone to vote. And if someone in
2 their family did not have the money for the
3 poll tax, in some counties, the balance kept
4 on getting higher and higher and higher.

5 Sometimes it resulted in a loss of life, loss
6 of employment. We saw four little girls who
7 were visiting church, was detonated, and
8 bombed and died.

9 We saw in Selma, Alabama, where you had
10 activists crossing the Edmund Pettus Bridge
11 who were met by state troopers on horses and
12 who were beaten savagely because they were
13 doing their God-given constitutional right to
14 protest for voting access for all Americans.

15 The Voting Rights act was passed in 1965,
16 which led to today we're seeing vote by mail,
17 we're seeing satellite office locations, and
18 we're seeing a robust Election Day operation
19 which is currently happening in Philadelphia
20 county, which may have the most access of
21 voting in the country of America. So we just
22 take time to reflect about the history,
23 especially in Black History Month, and the
24 challenges and the barriers that were in place
25 to block Black voters from participating in

1 democracy.

2 A motion to adjourn today's meeting. Is
3 there a second?

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please
6 call the roll.

7 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Vice-Chair
8 Deeley?

9 VICE-CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

10 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
11 Chairman Sabir?

12 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. This meeting is
13 adjourned.
