2 (11:00 a.m.)

3 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning.

4 MR. LYNCH: Good morning.

5 MS. DEELEY: Good morning.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

7 CHAIR SABIR: I call to order the meeting of the  
8 Philadelphia City Commissioner's Board of Election for  
9 Wednesday -- not the right date? It's not the right  
10 date. March 13? For March 13th. This meeting is in  
11 compliance under the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.  
12 Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three-member  
13 bipartisan board of elected officials in charge of  
14 elections and voter registration for the County of  
15 Philadelphia.

16 Each commissioner is elected to serve a four-year  
17 term that coincides with the municipal election cycle  
18 for Mayor and City Council. The commissioners set and  
19 enforce departmental policies and administer to voter  
20 registration and conduct elections in accordance with  
21 federal, state, and voter registration election laws.  
22 City Commissioners were created by the Pennsylvania  
23 Assembly in 1711 with a focus on taxation that held  
24 various regulatory powers throughout the centuries.

25 The commissioners started maintaining voter lists

1 in 1719 and took on more election related  
2 responsibilities, but didn't emerge in its current  
3 form until the adaption of Philadelphia's Homeland  
4 Charter in 1951. We start off with public comments.  
5 Before beginning their comments, commenters shall  
6 state where they live or if they are not a resident of  
7 Philadelphia and that they are Philadelphia taxpayers.  
8 Public comment is not an opportunity for dialogue or  
9 Q&A.

10 It is a public comment, a chance for you to tell  
11 us what you think. Each speaker will have two minutes  
12 to speak. However, I may extend the time at my  
13 discretion. Public comment must concern matters only  
14 on today's meeting agenda. Finally, it is my  
15 responsibility to preserve the order and decorum of  
16 the meetings as such, profane, slanderous,  
17 discriminatory. Raise your hand and I will recognize  
18 you. Outbursts will not be tolerated. Anyone wishing  
19 to offer a public comment, please step forward.

20 We will now move to a report from Secretary  
21 Bluestein for email Public Comments. Commissioner,  
22 are there any email public Comments?

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: There were no public comments  
24 emailed by 9:45 a.m.

25 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you very much. We will now

1 proceed to old business. First, we will have a report  
2 from our Director of Elect-administration and  
3 Operation, which will be reported by Joe Lynch and  
4 Stephanie Reid.

5 MR. LYNCH: Morning, Commissioners.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning.

7 MR. LYNCH: Our report for today, March 13, 2024.  
8 for our voter registration report, we processed a  
9 total of 72,402 registration applications so far. Out  
10 of these, 6,250 were sent to us on paper. All  
11 applications are up-to-date, and we are proofreading  
12 and making any necessary corrections. We also mailed  
13 out 14,271 voter ID cards and 22,000 return under  
14 deliverable mail in applications have been scanned and  
15 processed and insured.

16 You could strike that last sentence where it says  
17 all court cases are now finished, the supervisor meant  
18 to say that all petition challenges are complete. For  
19 the county board of elections report, we're still  
20 accepting mail in and absentee ballot applications and  
21 the deadline for the primary election mail in  
22 applications is April 16th at 5:00 p.m. Voters can  
23 apply online at [vote.phila.gov](http://vote.phila.gov). So far, we've  
24 approved 71,085 vote by mail applications, which is  
25 6,185 more than last week's reported numbers.

1           We've processed 44,356 paper applications and  
2 26,729 electronic applications. We are currently  
3 up to date on processing mail-in and absentee ballot  
4 applications. Additionally, we have mailed out 389  
5 UOCAVA ballots.

6           For our election board report, confirmation calls  
7 and emails for board workers continue. We have  
8 confirmed a total of 5,563 board workers with 200  
9 declines and left messages for 489. Additionally,  
10 excuse me -- additionally, we currently have 1,904  
11 poll workers registered for training.

12           So far, 3,411 have attended seminar trainings and  
13 1,471 have attended express poll refresher training  
14 sessions. With the online training now accessible,  
15 416 poll workers have completed training online.

16           The polling place unit has been confirming  
17 locations and out of 692 locations, 685 have been  
18 confirmed as polling sites. All polling sites must be  
19 confirmed by April 3rd. Any changes after April 3rd  
20 will require a court order to relocate. We have  
21 encountered one refusal and 55 polling place changes.

22           Efforts are underway to secure substitutes for  
23 refusal and accommodate relocation requests.  
24 Satellite election office leasing efforts are  
25 progressing across the board, with most offices

1 advancing into the lease draft phase, excluding  
2 Districts 1, 4 and 8. Unfortunately, the landlord --  
3 the landlord for District 4 withdrew from lease  
4 negotiations due to a better offer from another  
5 tenant, prompting us to explore other locations.

6 On a brighter note, District 8 has transitioned  
7 into the letter of intent phase, marking a significant  
8 step forward. District 3 is on track to open its  
9 doors to the public on March 18, 2024, with an opening  
10 event slated for April 2nd, 2024. Negotiations for  
11 satellite election office locations in District 1 are  
12 underway and discussions focusing on a site that will  
13 become available when another city department  
14 relocates this summer. Thank you. That's all I have.

15 MS. REID: Good morning, Commissioners. I'm  
16 pleased to present the weekly administration report  
17 for the week of March 13th, 2024, showcasing the  
18 remarkable progress and achievements across our  
19 departments. In budget and procurement, our efforts  
20 are yielding fruitful results. Lanyards are on track  
21 for delivery by March 19th and routine processing of  
22 POs and invoices for essential services is underway,  
23 including poll book printing and ballot box wrapping.

24 Additionally, corrections to poll worker pay have  
25 been filed with financing -- with finance and we're

1 actively following up with the RDS vending, parks --  
2 vending and parks and rec for election day food and  
3 beverage services. Communications have been robust  
4 and effective with the roll out of branded templates  
5 and streamlined documentation creation. Public facing  
6 materials, including satellite election office posters  
7 and presentation docs have been meticulously crafted.

8 Engagements with key stakeholders have progressed  
9 smoothly, focusing on language access materials and  
10 social media content development engagement efforts  
11 continue to thrive with approvals secured for various  
12 tabling events and voting machine demos at strategic  
13 locations. Distribution of election materials has  
14 been extensive, fostering community engagement and  
15 awareness.

16 Staff attendance and participation at events such  
17 as the Northeast Philadelphia Development Corporation  
18 Lunar New Year Banquet have bolstered our outreach  
19 efforts significantly.

20 On the human resources front, recruitment  
21 activities are in full swing with a significant  
22 portion of positions filled or in the pipeline. Our  
23 human resources department is continuing the process  
24 of hiring 25 clerk ones, five trades helpers, and 30  
25 temps. As of now, we've made considerable progress



1 with the following hires.

2           Eighteen temps have been onboarded with 12  
3 positions still open. Eight clerk ones have been  
4 hired, leaving 17 positions to fill, and three trades  
5 helpers have been recruited with two positions  
6 remaining vacant. Our current work -- workforce  
7 totals 152 employees, consisting of 124 civil service  
8 employees and 28 exempts. Within the civil service  
9 roles, we have 42 clerk ones, 21 clerk twos, 12 clerk  
10 threes, and 13 trades helper positions.

11           Surge staffing preparations are underway with  
12 orientations and training sessions being organized to  
13 ensure seamless operations. In the search staffing  
14 report, significant progress has been made in  
15 mobilizing resources for our upcoming operations. The  
16 sign-up link for search staffing was featured in the  
17 city's newsletter this week, resulting in a  
18 substantial response. There are 477 individuals that  
19 have already signed up and the administration is  
20 making progress on meeting our staffing needs.

21           In two weeks, we will commence the scheduling of  
22 polling place liaisons with comprehensive training  
23 sessions planned by the administration in coordination  
24 with our office to ensure they're equipped to meet the  
25 demands of the role effectively.

1           Additionally, administration efforts to secure  
2 ECAR drivers has begun. Confirmation emails for ECAR  
3 driver assignments commenced distribution on March  
4 12th, resulting in over 30 percent of the contacts  
5 from the previous election confirming their  
6 availability by 4:30 that day. While we require 78  
7 ECARs for our operations, we have successfully  
8 confirmed 27 individuals thus far. Furthermore,  
9 confirmation emails have been dispatched to Dropbox  
10 lockers and Dropbox locker leads for election day  
11 operations, with 52 lockers confirmed for deployment.

12           We're grateful to the administration for their  
13 ongoing commitment to supporting our staffing needs  
14 for each election. Satellite election offices are  
15 taking shape with finalized policies and procedures  
16 set for presentation during today's Sunshine meeting.  
17 In the domain of information technology, significant  
18 progress has been made in satellite election office  
19 installations, computer upgrades and configuration of  
20 Dell equipment for deployment to satellite offices.

21           Screening for the technical support specialist  
22 position is progressing well, with promising  
23 candidates identified for further consideration. It's  
24 been a highly productive week across all of our  
25 departments, with determined efforts focusing on

1 enhancing efficiency, outreach, and technological  
2 capabilities. I extend my sincerest appreciation to  
3 all team members for their dedication and hard work.  
4 Thank you.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you for your reports. Vice-  
6 chair Deeley, do you have any questions?

7 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. May I ask  
8 questions of the Director of Election Administration,  
9 please?

10 CHAIR SABIR: Yes, you may.

11 MS. DEELEY: Ms. Reid, how many of the remaining  
12 districts do we actually have LOIs for, for the  
13 satellite offices?

14 MS. REID: I would defer that to Joe Lynch.  
15 That's under him.

16 MR. LYNCH: I believe they're all in process  
17 right now.

18 MS. DEELEY: All 10?

19 MR. LYNCH: All, all nine. Nine more.

20 MS. DEELEY: Nine. So we have -- we, we have  
21 LOIs for nine satellites?

22 MR. LYNCH: I can -- I can confirm that with,  
23 with Vanessa when we get through this meeting.

24 MS. DEELEY: Okay. So we secured one in four  
25 last summer, and we just lost them. And we're still

1 without a location in eight.

2 MR. LYNCH: Yes.

3 MS. DEELEY: We have less than eight months  
4 before the presidential election, and we are only  
5 opening one for the primary, when we were hoping to  
6 have at least half open. Realistically, Ms. Reid,  
7 what are the chances that you will have 10 satellite  
8 offices open for this November's election?

9 MR. LYNCH: Well, I'll answer that, Commissioner.

10 MS. DEELEY: I'm, I'm -- I don't understand.

11 MR. LYNCH: Okay.

12 MS. DEELEY: Respectfully, I -- I've asked  
13 questions to Ms. Reid over and over again, and I've  
14 become very concerned that when I ask questions, they  
15 just get pivoted to Mr. Lynch. You should know the  
16 answers, it's supposed to be your plan. You are the  
17 person in charge. So could you please answer my  
18 question?

19 MR. LYNCH: Can I just -- can I just say one  
20 thing? I, I understand. But we are pushing to have  
21 all 10 of those open by November election.

22 MS. DEELEY: Okay. So, last week, when I asked  
23 what was your plan for having the satellite elections  
24 offices staffed and keeping up with the voter  
25 registration and the mail-in ballot applications, Mr.

1 Lynch said that you were going to use the city surge  
2 staff. That's other department staff that come in  
3 after their normal shift to do the data entry.

4 This week, I was informed that you plan to open  
5 the satellite offices seven days a week and expect  
6 staff to be there from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday  
7 through Friday, plus weekend hours. So my question  
8 now is, have you put any more thought into how you are  
9 going to staff these satellite offices?

10 MR. LYNCH: We, we, we are talking about how  
11 people -- some people might get tired and might not  
12 want to work the hours, but we're going to have to  
13 deal with that as, as it comes on -- comes along.

14 MS. DEELEY: Okay. I just want to remind you  
15 that we are down 17 clerk positions, and that you cut  
16 five more clerk positions, as well as the funds for  
17 the surge staffing from our recent budget request.  
18 And respectfully, again, I would just mention that  
19 I've asked these questions of the administrator,  
20 Stephanie Reid. So, thank you, Mr. Chairman.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Sure. Secretary Bluestein, do you  
22 have any questions, comments?

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would  
24 just like to point out that the deputy executive  
25 director for satellite election offices reports to Mr.

1 Lynch as the Director of Election Operations. So I

2 just want to make that very clear for the record.

3 Thank you, sir.

4 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, if I may? Thank you,  
5 Secretary Bluestein. We are aware of that. But the  
6 Director of Operations reports to Ms. Reid. Thank  
7 you.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman. The rules on  
9 January 10th make very clear that both the Director of  
10 Election Operations and the Director of Election  
11 Administration report to the Board in its entirety.  
12 I'm ready to move on. Thank you.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Just -- this is a whole, right?  
14 The rules that we all agreed on as a Board.

15 MS. DEELEY: I take exception. We did not all  
16 agree, but they did pass. Thank you.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Well, it passed it, the Board. So  
18 we all represent on the Board. So as the Board passed  
19 the rules. You have to ask for -- to be recognized by  
20 the chairperson. And then the chair speaking. You  
21 didn't get recognized. I'm just repeating the rules  
22 that were adopted by the Board, was that there's  
23 permission by the chairperson, then the chairperson  
24 recognized that person. It's all that I'm saying.

25 And again, if we need copies to be sent out to

1 everyone on the rules that were agreed upon, then I  
2 can forward everyone over so that we're on the same  
3 page. And moving forward. This completes our old  
4 business for today's meeting. We will now proceed to  
5 new business. We will begin by considering the first  
6 agenda item under new business. A motion to adopt and  
7 implement Philadelphia Office of City Commissioner  
8 Satellite election office policies. Is there a  
9 second?

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

11 CHAIR SABIR: Commissioners, do you have any  
12 comments on this item before we proceed to vote?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none, Mr. Chairman.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Vice Chair Deeley?

15 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
17 the roll.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

19 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

21 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Being moved and properly  
22 second, the ayes are three, the nays are zero. With  
23 the majority of members having voted in the  
24 affirmative, the motion passes. We will now move to  
25 the next agenda item, polling location change. We

1 will hear from Mr. Charles Stroman.

2 MR. STROMAN: Good morning.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Good morning, Charlie.

4 MS. DEELEY: Good morning, Charlie.

5 MR. STROMAN: I have eight changes proposed. And  
6 the first will be in the 9th Ward and the 17th  
7 Division, that would move out of Chestnut, to the  
8 Chestnut Tower next to -- Division.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of  
10 the professional staff, I move that we accept the  
11 polling change for 9th Ward, 17th Division. Is there  
12 a second?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Mr. Bluestein, please call the  
15 roll.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

17 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

19 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion carries. Mr. Stroman,  
20 please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: Next set of changes will be in the  
22 10th Ward of 5th Division and the 22nd Division. They  
23 are both moving out of the Paragon Banquet Hall to the  
24 store front on 7180 Ogontz Avenue that's for two  
25 locations.



1 CHAIR SABIR: That was -- Mr. Stroman, that was  
2 22nd and 23rd, right?

3 MR. STROMAN: 5 and 22nd.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. Having heard the  
5 recommendation of the professional staff, I move that  
6 we accept the polling change for Ward 10, Division 5  
7 and 22. Is there a second?

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Mr. Bluestein -- Secretary  
10 Bluestein, please call the roll.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

12 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

14 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Mr. Stroman, please proceed.

15 MR. STROMAN: Next one is the 10th ward, again in  
16 the 8th Division. Moving out of the Rowan school to  
17 the Building 21 school. And that is for voter  
18 convenience.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of  
20 professional staff, I move that we accept the polling  
21 change for Ward 10, Division 8. Is there a second?

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
24 the roll.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

1 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

3 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion carries. Mr. Stroman,  
4 please proceed.

5 MR. STROMAN: The next set would be in the 10th  
6 Ward again. Ward 10, Division 16 and Division 27.  
7 Moving out of the Paragon Banquet Hall to the  
8 Excelsior School. And that is due to a refusal.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of  
10 the professional staff, I move that we accept the  
11 Poland change for Ward 10, Division 27. Is there a  
12 second?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
15 the roll.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

17 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

19 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion carries. Mr. Stroman,  
20 please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: Next one is in the 10th Ward again.  
22 The 23rd Division moving out of the Congregation  
23 Temple Bethel, to the storefront at 7163 Stenton  
24 Avenue. That is due to a religious holiday.

25 CHAIR SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of

1 professional staff, I move that we accept the polling  
2 place change for Ward 10, Division 23. Is there a  
3 second?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
6 the roll.

7 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

8 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

10 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion carries. Mr. Stroman,  
11 please proceed.

12 MR. STROMAN: Last but not least, in the 22nd  
13 Ward, the 4th Division. Moving out of the Germantown  
14 Jewish Center to the Emlin Arms apartments. And that  
15 is due to a religious holiday.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of  
17 professional staff, I move that we accept the polling  
18 change for Ward 22nd, Division 4. Is there a second?

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
21 the roll.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

23 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

25 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion carries. What about

1 this one?

2 MR. STROMAN: That's all I have, Commissioners.

3 CHAIR SABIR: That's it? Okay. All right.

4 Thank you, Charlie. I appreciate you. It's always a  
5 pleasure. I know elections close, and we see you,  
6 Brother. I appreciate you.

7 MR. STROMAN: Thank you.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Now move to the other portion of  
9 our agenda. Vice Chair Deeley, do you have any  
10 business need to be raised at this meeting?

11 MS. DEELEY: I do not, Mr. Chairman.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have  
13 any other business to be raised at this meeting?

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have  
15 none.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Commissioners. I'd like  
17 to thank all the staff. I know this transition has  
18 been difficult on some people. But we definitely have  
19 been working hard, tireless hours. And I'm seeing the  
20 work. And I can guarantee that we're going to have  
21 the best election that we ever had. Hearing no other  
22 business, a motion to adjourn today's meeting. Is  
23 there a second?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

25 CHAIR SABIR: Commissioner Bluestein, please call

1 the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

5 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Motion to adjourn passes.

6 Meeting is adjourned.

7 (The meeting was adjourned.)
