1 P R O C E E D I N G S

2 (11:00 a.m.)

3 MR. SABIR: Good morning. Call to order the
4 meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioners Board
5 of Elections for Wednesday, March 27th, 2024. This
6 meeting is in compliance under the Pennsylvania
7 Sunshine Act. The Philadelphia City Commissioners
8 are a three-member bipartisan Board of elected
9 officials in charge of elections and voter
10 registration for the county of Philadelphia.

11 Each commissioner is elected to serve a four-
12 year term that coincides with the municipal election
13 cycle for mayor and city council. The Commissioners
14 set and enforce departmental policies to administer
15 voter registrations and conduct elections in
16 accordance with federal and state voter registration
17 election laws. The City Commissioners were created
18 by the Pennsylvania assembly in 1711 with a focus on
19 taxation that held various regulatory powers
20 throughout the centuries.

21 The commissioner started maintaining voter
22 lists in 1799 and took on more election related
23 responsibilities, but didn't emerge into its current
24 form until the adaptation of the Philadelphia Home
25 Rule Charter. We will start off with public

1 comments. Before beginning their comments,
2 commenter shall state where they live or if they are
3 not a resident of Philadelphia and that they are a
4 Philadelphia taxpayer.

5 Public comment is not an opportunity for
6 dialogue or Q and A. It is public comment, a chance
7 for you to tell us what you think. Each speaker
8 will have two minutes to speak, however, I may
9 extend the time at my discretion. Public comment
10 must concern matters on today's meeting agenda.
11 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve the
12 order and decorum of the meetings. As such profane,
13 slanderous, discriminator a personal attacks will
14 not be tolerated.

15 If you wish to make a public objection to a
16 perceived Sunshine violation, please raise your hand
17 and I will recognize you. Outbursts will not be
18 tolerated. Anyone wishing to offer a public
19 comment, please step forward. Now, if there's
20 anyone here that want to make a public comment in
21 regards to a polling change, we're going to hold
22 that. But if it's anything other than just polling
23 changes, if someone wants to make a public comment,
24 you're now welcome to make the public comment.
25 Okay.

1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (indiscernible).

2 MR. SABIR: No. But, sir, that's a polling
3 place change, right?

4 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes, sir.

5 MR. SABIR: We're going to come back to that
6 when we do the polling place changes. Anyone else
7 here, other than a polling place change. Well, is
8 it in regards to the change, or you just want to
9 make a comment, just in general?

10 MS. JONES WIBLE: No. It's not in regards to
11 change is actually an issue with polling location at
12 the polling location?

13 MR. SABIR: Sure. You want to come up, then?

14 MS. JONES WIBLE: Sure. Good morning. My name
15 is Juanita Jones Wible. I'm the judge of elections
16 for 57-10. We're located at Pollock Elementary
17 School, and we have an issue with the where the
18 location of the parking lot is on one side of the
19 building and it's at least over 500 feet from the
20 accessible area for handicapped voters. And it
21 seems like we are deterring our handicapped voters
22 from coming in because the parking lot is so far
23 away and the parking spaces are so far away.

24 This person has to navigate the parking lot,
25 come up to the sidewalk, and then come all the way

1 across the front of the building, past the front
2 steps, all the way to the other end of the building
3 to get to the ramp, which sometimes the door isn't
4 even open for them to even access the building
5 itself. So that's another issue. But I would like
6 to see if we can request that there's a temporary
7 handicapped zone in front of the building, in front
8 of the actual handicap ramp so that these people
9 aren't killing themselves to get in.

10 My division itself has a paraplegic who is
11 using ventilator as well as a mobilized device to
12 get in, and he struggled and that man should not
13 have had to struggle, especially for his handicap.
14 So if there could be that section in front of the
15 building on Welch Road, if that could actually be
16 designated as a handicap location, just temporary
17 for that day, for those hours, that would be
18 fabulous.

19 We wouldn't have so many people turning away
20 because they're actually coming to the front steps,
21 and they're already exhausted because of the
22 struggle to get out of the parking lot. So if we
23 could do something with that, that would be
24 wonderful.

25 MR. SABIR: Thank you.

1 MS. JONES WIBLE: You're welcome.

2 MR. SABIR: Thank you. And thank you for your
3 service.

4 MS. JONES WIBLE: Thank you.

5 MR. SABIR: I really appreciate it. And
6 Charles Stroman is here. Charlie, raise your hand.
7 So be up to the meeting. You all can have a
8 conversation with Charlie.

9 MS. JONES WIBLE: Okay, great. Thank you.

10 MR. SABIR: Thank you. Was there anyone else
11 here with public comment? Okay. Thank you. We
12 will now move to report from the secretary for email
13 public comments Secretary Bluestein, are there any
14 email public comments?

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: All comments that were emailed
16 by 9:45 a.m. were shared with the Commissioners and
17 the deputies by 10:00 a.m. And have been provided
18 to each Commissioner at the beginning of the meeting
19 and are available at the public comment table. We
20 received one comment after last week's meeting from
21 Laura Morris related to a polling place change that
22 was decided at that meeting. I have reviewed the
23 comment and ask that it be moved into the record.

24 Professional staff have reached out to the
25 commenter and provided additional feedback.

1 MR. SABIR: Vice Chairwoman Deeley, did you
2 have an opportunity to review this public comment?

3 MS. DEELEY: I have also reviewed it and agree
4 it should be moved into the record.

5 MR. SABIR: I have also reviewed it. Secretary
6 Bluestein, please move us into the record. We will
7 now proceed to old business. We have a report from
8 our directors of Election Administration and
9 Operation which will be reported by Joseph Lynch and
10 Stephanie Reid.

11 MR. LYNCH: Morning Commissioners?

12 MR. SABIR: Good morning.

13 MR. LYNCH: This is our weekly Sunshine update
14 for March 27th, 2024. For our voter registration
15 report, we processed a total of 84,433 registration
16 applications so far. Out of these, 8,250 were sent
17 to us on paper. All applications are up-to-date,
18 and we are approved reading and making any necessary
19 corrections. 16 polling locations were changed
20 Insurer, and 9,987 voter ID cards were mailed out
21 because of those changes. The new street lists are
22 scheduled to be delivered on the 27th.

23 For the County Board Election report, we are
24 still accepting mail in and absentee ballot
25 applications and the deadline for the primary

1 election mail in applications is April 16th at 5:00
2 p.m. Voters can apply online at vote.Phila.gov. So
3 far, we've approved 77,956 vote by mail
4 applications, which is 3,229 more than last week's
5 reported numbers. We've processed a total of 47,588
6 paper applications and 30,368 electronic
7 applications.

8 We are currently up to date on process and mail
9 in and absentee ballot applications. Friday, April
10 12th, 2024, is the deadline for filing cycle 2
11 second Friday pre-primary campaign finance reports.
12 All candidates, committees, political action
13 committees or committees contributing to candidates
14 for office that have made expenditures to influence
15 a city election must file a report. For our
16 election Board report confirmation calls and emails
17 for Board workers continue.

18 We have confirmed a total of 6,434 Board
19 workers and 1,111 declines and left messages for
20 468. Additionally, we currently have 1,369 poll
21 workers registered for training so far. 4,587 have
22 attended seminar training and 1,193 have attended
23 express poll refresher training sessions. With the
24 online training now accessible, 811 poll workers
25 have completed training online. Our satellite unit

1 opened district 3 to the public on Monday, March
2 25th.

3 Additionally, we are in the lease draft phase
4 for six locations with one location in the letter of
5 intent phase. We are close to pursuing the letter
6 of intent phase for a location in district 4. For
7 district 1, we have received approval --

8 (Audio cuts to Ms. Reid)

9 MS. REID: Going hiring efforts with positions
10 for clerks, trades helpers, and temps. We've made
11 significant progress in hiring with the majority of
12 positions filled or in the process of being filled.
13 Our current workforce totals 171 employees
14 consisting of 143 civil service employees and 28
15 exempts. Within the civil service roles, we have 51
16 clerk 1s, 21 clerk 2s, 12 clerk 3s and 15 trades
17 helper positions.

18 These staffing levels represent a 25 percent
19 increase since the reorganization of the Board.
20 This has been a collective effort across all the
21 Commissioners offices and our human resource
22 department. I think everyone who's been working to
23 achieve full staffing levels. We're focusing on
24 continuing new hire activities and preparing for
25 orientations as well as planning for surge staffing.

1 Speaking of surge staffing, progress has been made
2 in scheduling polling place liaisons and conducting
3 training sessions.

4 We've seen strong participation with 70
5 individuals signed up for training. Our team leads
6 are actively reaching out to staff and we're
7 steadily confirming a car drivers and drop box
8 lockers to ensure smooth operations during the
9 search.

10 For information technology, various e-public
11 testing has been underway and interviews are ongoing
12 for technical support specialist in GIS positions.
13 We aim to have these positions ready for a vote next
14 week. We continue providing day to day IT support
15 to facilitate our operations.

16 In conclusion, I'm proud of the dedication and
17 hard work exhibited by each department. Thank you
18 for your commitment and relentless efforts. Thank
19 you.

20 MR. SABIR: Vice chair Deeley, do you have any
21 questions?

22 MS. DEELEY: I do not.

23 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have
24 any questions?

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

1 MR. SABIR: This completes our old business for
2 today's meeting. We will now proceed to new
3 business. We will begin by considering the first
4 agenda item under new business. Vice Chairwoman
5 Deeley, please put forth the motion.

6 MS. DEELEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I was
7 dismayed recently when I saw that our list of drop
8 boxes and there was only one additional drop box
9 from the 2023 general election. We have invested
10 hundreds to thousands of dollars into a camera
11 network to enable us to place drop boxes in
12 additional locations. We made progress adding
13 additional boxes before last election. I know that
14 after November much effort was made to survey new
15 sites. We have the cameras. We have the boxes.

16 I know there is a challenge of getting the
17 people to lock them, but we need to push to recruit
18 more city employees to volunteer and can't allow
19 that to slow us down or our drop box expansion. We
20 are not going to wake up tomorrow and have 75 drop
21 boxes. But every election we need to add more so
22 that we are working towards having them all over the
23 city. This being a presidential election year, the
24 voters of Philadelphia expect and deserve additional
25 services.

1 As their elected Commissioners it is our
2 obligation to ensure that they receive it.
3 Therefore, I motion that it is the sentiment of this
4 Board that there should be more than one additional
5 drop box added since the 2023 general election and
6 the Director of Election Administration and the
7 Director of Election Operations to install
8 additional drop boxes before the primary election.

9 MR. SABIR: Is there a second? Not hearing a
10 second. We will now move to the next agenda item,
11 polling location changes. We will hear from Mr.
12 Charles Stroman.

13 MR. STROMAN: Good morning, Commissioners.

14 MR. SABIR: Good morning, Charles.

15 MR. STROMAN: The first change I have is in 6th
16 Ward, the 17th Division, moving out of Discovery
17 Charter School to the first African Presbyterian
18 Church. And that's due to a refusal for state
19 testing.

20 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
21 professional staff, I move that we accept the
22 polling change for Ward Division. I'm sorry. Ward
23 6, Division 17. Is there a second?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

25 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call

1 the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice chair Deeley?

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

5 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

6 MR. STROMAN: Next change I have is in the 8th
7 Ward, in the 34th Division, moving out of the Land
8 Title Building to the Kimmel Center, and that's due
9 to a refusal.

10 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
11 professional staff, I move that we accept the
12 polling place change for Ward 8, Division 34. Is
13 there a second?

14 MS. DEELEY: Second.

15 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
16 the roll.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice chair Deeley?

18 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

20 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: The next change I have, I'm
22 lumping a couple Wards together. It's Ward 16,
23 Division 12, 13, 17, and 18 and in Ward 28, Division
24 1 and 18. All them moving from the Cecil B Moore
25 Rec Center to the Dobbins Technical High School.

1 And that's all due to construction.

2 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
3 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
4 polling place change for Ward 16, Division 12, 13,
5 17, Ward 18, Division 1 and 18.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

7 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
8 the roll.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

10 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

12 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

13 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 21st Ward,
14 the 43rd Division, moving out of the Andorra library
15 to the Summit Park Apartments, due to construction.

16 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
17 professional staff. I move that we accept the
18 polling place change for Ward 21, Division 43. Is
19 there a second?

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

21 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
22 the roll.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

24 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

1 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

2 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 23rd Ward,
3 the 14th Division moving out of the Philadelphia
4 Preparatory Charter School to the Baptist Worship
5 Center due to a refusal.

6 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
7 professional staff, I move that we accept the
8 polling place change for Ward 23, Division 14. Is
9 there a second?

10 MS. DEELEY: Second.

11 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
12 the roll.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

14 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

16 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

17 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 23rd Ward,
18 again in the 17th Division. Moving out American
19 Legion Post 224 to the Second Baptist Church of
20 Frankford. And that is due to construction.

21 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
22 professional staff, I move that we accept the
23 polling place change for Ward 23, Division 17. Is
24 there a second?

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

1 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
2 the roll.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

4 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

6 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

7 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 33rd Ward,
8 the 2nd Division moving out of Juniata Park Academy
9 to the Juniata Youth Club, and that's due to voter
10 convenience.

11 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
12 professional staff, I move that we accept the
13 polling place change for Ward 33, Division 2.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

15 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
16 the roll.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

18 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

20 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 35th Ward,
22 the 5th Division moving out of Cedar Grove Christian
23 Academy to the Philadelphia Protestant Home. And I
24 announced that last week. I addressed the concerns.
25 I spoke to the people at the Protestant Home, and

1 they're not going to ask voters to take a picture or
2 sign in. And also they will not allow another
3 Division to come in with them. It's only the
4 Division that they're in. So I address the
5 concerns.

6 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
7 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
8 polling place change for Ward 35 Division 5.

9 MS. DEELEY: Second.

10 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
11 the roll.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

13 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

15 MR. SABIR: Aye. So for 35, 9.

16 MR. STROMAN: Next change is 35th Ward, 9th
17 Division, moving out of Lawncrest Rec Center to the
18 Philadelphia.

19 MR. SABIR: Hold on one second. So did anybody
20 want to make public comment for 35th. You want to
21 come up? Let them sit there. Come on up. Then
22 come on speak on the microphone, you want to state
23 your name for the record? And thank you for coming
24 up and thank you for your service.

25 MR. MASON: Good morning.

1 MR. SABIR: Good morning.

2 MR. MASON: This is the first time I jumped in
3 the water here. So even as far as being on the
4 polls, again, I just jumped in. And I know I can go
5 a little further with the guidance of the Commission
6 Board. Again, I've been working the polls 35, 9,
7 and I found out that they will be moving. So I'm
8 here today just to involve myself into the new
9 location. So I believe I'm sitting right next to
10 the right man here.

11 MR. SABIR: The right person.

12 MR. MASON: Okay. So I feel honored today.
13 Thank you.

14 MR. SABIR: And thank you for your service. I
15 appreciate you. It's working the polls and
16 everything. Just a hard job, man. Democracy lies
17 with you. So thank you.

18 MR. MASON: Calvin Mason.

19 MR. SABIR: Sorry, first name, Calvin. Thank
20 you, Calvin. Please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: So that would be the 35th Ward,
22 9th Division moving out of Lawncrest Rec Center to
23 the Philadelphia Bible Fellowship due to
24 construction.

25 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of

1 professional staff, I move that we accept the
2 polling place change for Ward 35, Division 9.

3 MR. SABIR: Second.

4 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
5 the roll.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

7 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye, Chairman Sabir?

9 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

10 MR. STROMAN: Next change will be in the 35th
11 Ward again, the 10th Division, the 11th Division,
12 and the 25th Division, all moving out of Lawncrest
13 Rec Center to the Franklin School due to
14 construction.

15 MS. DEELEY: Second. Sorry. I'm getting ahead
16 of myself.

17 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
18 professional staff, I move that we accept the
19 polling place change for Ward 35, Division 10, 11,
20 and 25. Vice Chair Deeley now may second it.

21 MS. DEELEY: Second.

22 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
23 the roll.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

25 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

2 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

3 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 35th Ward
4 again, the 12th Division and the 13th Division move
5 out of Lawncrest Rec Center to the Prince of Peace
6 Lutheran Church due to construction.

7 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
8 professional staff, I move that we accept the
9 polling place change for Ward 35, Division 12 and
10 13. Is there a second?

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

12 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
13 the roll.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

15 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

17 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

18 MR. STROMAN: Next set of changes is in the
19 40th Ward, the 10th Division, 19th Division, 20th
20 Division and 26th Division, all moving out of
21 Southwest CDC to the William P. Post Roche number 21
22 at 6400 Paschall Avenue. And that's back to the
23 original location.

24 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
25 professional staff. I move that we accept the

1 polling place change for Ward 40, Division 10, 19,
2 20, and 26. Is there a second?

3 MS. DEELEY: Second.

4 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
5 the roll.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

7 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

9 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

10 MR. STROMAN: Next set of changes in the 40th
11 Ward. Again, the 13th Division and the 14th
12 Division moving out of Straight Gate Church to the
13 Ezekiel Baptist Church due to a refusal.

14 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
15 professional staff, I move that we accept the
16 polling place change for Ward 40, Division 13 and
17 14. Is there a second?

18 MS. DEELEY: Second.

19 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
20 the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

22 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye, Chairman Sabir?

24 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

25 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 43rd Ward,

1 22nd Division, and 23rd Division moving out of the
2 PGW Building to the Lenfest Center. And that is due
3 to the building closure.

4 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
5 professional staff, I move that we accept the
6 polling place change for Ward 43, Division 22,
7 Division 23. Is there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 MR. SABIR: Secretary, Bluestein, please call
10 the roll. I'm sorry. You have a public comment for
11 Ward 43, Division 22 and 23. Okay. You want to
12 come up and identify yourself? Thank you for coming
13 up. I appreciate you.

14 MS. BRADSHAW: My name is Chinita Bradshaw.
15 I'm a committee person for that Ward. We did get
16 the information about the closing of PGW only by
17 walking by seeing a sticker on the door. And we
18 received nothing from emails or anything of that
19 nature and anything from the Ward leader. State
20 Representative, and our Ward leader, Danilo Burgos,
21 and I worked diligently to find places that we could
22 go because a lot of the voters don't want to go to
23 the Lenfest.

24 And with that being said, we have picked about
25 five people that are sent to you. I mean, five

1 different places. They were all turned down. One
2 of them was turned down because of the crossing of
3 Broad Street. And I wanted to know why is that.

4 MR. STROMAN: I can address that. Crossing a
5 big major street like Broad Street. It actually
6 wasn't an improvement from the Lenfest Center, and
7 it's actually out of the Ward. Lenfest Center is
8 closer to them, two Divisions. As far as the other
9 sites that I was given, they are not handicap
10 accessible. And we cannot use a place with more
11 than one 6-and-a-half-inch step. So it's very
12 difficult sometimes to find a place. And that area
13 there is extremely difficult. There's many stores
14 and residences, not many places to pick.

15 MS. BRADSHAW: Well, one of the places we chose
16 was a hall that's handicapped accessible. And they
17 were willing to let us house there for this voting
18 process. And that was also turned down because of
19 the crossing of Broad Street. We did reach out to
20 individuals in the neighborhood that were willing to
21 assist with helping people cross the street. We
22 purchased the green reflector jackets and all that
23 kind of stuff.

24 And most of our voters are old voters that have
25 nieces, nephews, daughters, and sons that drive them

1 over to the polling place. And then some of them,
2 this might be the only time they get out and walk
3 the neighborhood, really and truly to come out and
4 vote. So the Lenfest is a secluded area where you
5 have to go down. The area where all of the women of
6 the night and drug dealers as well as users are all
7 on that block right across from Little Flower
8 School. It's a very deserted area.

9 MR. SABIR: Yes. I'll make a motion to table
10 this one. Is there a second?

11 MS. DEELEY: Second.

12 MR. SABIR: So we'll table the discussion for
13 Ward 43 Division 22nd, 23rd, and we'll do a little
14 bit more research over there.

15 MS. BRADSHAW: Okay.

16 MR. SABIR: We'll see so as of now, just let
17 you know what happened. We didn't vote on moving
18 it. We just moved to hold the conversation up. And
19 then we'll have a double conversation. Then we'll
20 vote on it --

21 MR. BASH: Okay.

22 MR. SABIR: -- And we will get more
23 information.

24 MS. BRADSHAW: And I just want to quickly say
25 the reason I'm here is because of the voters. We

1 have a great report with the Lenfest if it comes to
2 that, then it just has to be that. But with people
3 in the neighborhood helping to help us have
4 something closer, I just thought I would say that.

5 MR. SABIR: So is there any other locations
6 other than the one that you saw?

7 MS. BRADSHAW: Yeah, it was four more, but --

8 MR. SABIR: No. I'm saying not the ones that
9 we didn't do the investigation for. I'm saying.
10 But is there any ones other than that we didn't do
11 an investigation for as I'm asking?

12 MS. BRADSHAW: I think it may have been one,
13 but that was on Germantown Avenue. And if they go
14 down there, they might as well go probably to the
15 Lenfest Center.

16 MR. SABIR: So we'll look at investigate this a
17 little bit more.

18 MS. BRADSHAW: Thank you so much. Thank you
19 very much.

20 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 46th Ward,
21 the 4th Division moving out of the Global Leadership
22 Academy to the Philadelphia Health Center on Cedar.
23 And that's due to state testing.

24 MR. SABIR: I got you. That was just for 22nd
25 Division? So, Charlie we are going to go back to 43

1 for a second?

2 MR. STROMAN: Sure.

3 MR. SABIR: So that was just for the 22nd
4 Division, right?

5 MR. STROMAN: 22nd and the 23rd Division.

6 MR. SABIR: Okay.

7 MR. STROMAN: Yeah.

8 MR. SABIR: So we just tabling for the 22nd?
9 Correct.

10 MR. STROMAN: If that's what she wants, that's
11 fine. I mean, I can address that afterwards.

12 MR. SABIR: So we don't have any opposition or
13 anything for the 23rd Division. Correct. Like no
14 one's there for the 23rd.

15 MR. STROMAN: Correct.

16 MR. SABIR: I'm saying. But you came. You
17 comment on the 22nd Division? I'm asking you.

18 MS. BRADSHAW: No. 23rd

19 MR. SABIR: For the 23rd?

20 MS. BRADSHAW: Yes.

21 MR. SABIR: So nobody was here commented for
22 the 22nd Division? So, Commissioners, did you all
23 want to table 22nd and 23rd or did you all want to
24 vote on 22nd?

25 MS. DEELEY: I could second a vote on 22 if

1 there's nobody here to object.

2 MR. SABIR: We're going to 22. So. Charlie,
3 so is your recommendation to move Ward 43 Division
4 22nd. Is that correct?

5 MR. STROMAN: Correct.

6 MR. SABIR: Having heard that recommendation of
7 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
8 polling place change for Ward 43, Division 22. Is
9 there a second?

10 MS. DEELEY: Second.

11 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
12 the roll.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

14 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

16 MR. SABIR: Aye. So just for the record,
17 people is observing. We're going to table Ward 43,
18 Division 23. We have accepted Ward 43 Division 22nd
19 changed. So now we're looking for Ward 43, suitable
20 place for Ward 43, Division 23. Please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the.

22 MR. SABIR: Please proceed.

23 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 46 Ward
24 again, Ward 46, Division 5 and 6, moving out of Boys
25 Latin Charter School to the Philadelphia Health

1 Center on Cedar. And that's due to a scheduling
2 conflict.

3 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
4 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
5 polling place change for Ward 46, Division 5,
6 Division 6. Is there a second?

7 MS. DEELEY: Second.

8 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
9 the roll.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

11 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

13 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

14 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 46th Ward
15 again in the 11th Division. Moving out of the
16 People's Baptist Church to the Philadelphia Health
17 Center on Cedar, and it is due to a credit location.

18 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
19 professional staff, I move that we accept the
20 polling place change for Ward 46, Division 11. Is
21 there a second?

22 MS. DEELEY: Second.

23 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
24 the roll.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

1 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

3 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

4 MR. STROMAN: Next change is in the 47th Ward.

5 The 1st Division moving out of the Church of Faith

6 Deliverance Church to the National Temple Baptist

7 Church, and that's due to a conflict.

8 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of

9 professional staff, I move that we accept the

10 polling place change for Ward 47, Division 1. Is

11 there a second?

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

13 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call

14 the roll.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

16 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

18 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

19 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 47th Ward

20 again, the 2nd Division moving out of Church of

21 Faith Deliverance Church to the Beckett Gardens

22 Community Center. And that's due to a conflict.

23 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of

24 professional staff, I move that we accept the

25 polling place change for Ward 47, Division 2. Is

1 there a second?

2 MS. DEELEY: Second.

3 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
4 the roll.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

6 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

7 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

8 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

9 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 49th Ward,
10 the 2nd Division and the 21st Division moving out of
11 the Logan Branch Library to the York House
12 Apartments. And that's due to voter convenience.

13 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
14 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
15 polling place change for Ward 49, Division 2 and
16 Division 21. Is there a second?

17 MS. DEELEY: Second.

18 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
19 the roll.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

21 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

23 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

24 MR. STROMAN: Next changes in the 58th Ward,
25 12th Division, 33rd Division, 34th Division, and

1 38th Division. All moving from the Synagogue to the
2 Law school and that's due to a religious holiday.

3 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
4 the professional staff, I move that we accept the
5 polling place change for Ward 48, Division 12, 33,
6 34, and 38. Is there a second?

7 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

8 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
9 the roll.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

11 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

13 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

14 MR. STROMAN: Next set of changes. 62nd Ward,
15 17th Division and the 26th Division. Both moving
16 out of the Mayfair Theater to the Old Devon Store,
17 number 2. And that's due to a scheduling conflict.

18 MR. SABIR: Having heard the recommendation of
19 the professional staff, I move that we accept
20 polling place change for Ward 62, Division 17,
21 Division 26. Is there a second?

22 MS. DEELEY: Second.

23 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
24 the roll.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

1 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

3 MR. SABIR: I vote aye. Thank you, Charlie.

4 You all doing a great job, especially what you did

5 over to the 46th Ward, Division 5 and 6. I drive

6 down that street like every day. So the movement

7 from Boys Latin rank. You all do a great job.

8 MR. STROMAN: Thank you.

9 MR. SABIR: We will now move to the other

10 portion of our agenda. Vice Chairwoman Deeley, do

11 you have any other business to be raised at this

12 meeting?

13 MS. DEELEY: I do, Mr. Chairman, if I may. I

14 see that Ben Field is sitting out there, and I just

15 wanted to extend my appreciation for all his work on

16 behalf of the citizens of Philadelphia and this

17 Board and wish him all the best in his future

18 endeavors.

19 MR. SABIR: Ben, why don't you stand up so

20 everybody know where you are, Ben? Make noise for

21 Ben, all right? We too share that sentiment. 2020,

22 we were talking about how the people that was doing

23 elections in 2020. I know this election is going to

24 be the most important election we've had. I say it

25 every six months. But in 2020 was just special.

1 And we thank you. And you're not going that far.
2 You're going to be right next to our neighbor in
3 Montgomery County.

4 So you're going to be hearing from us
5 soon. We're still going to be talking and
6 communicating. Thank you for your service. Thank
7 you, Ben.

8 Secretary Bluestein, do you have any other
9 business to be raised at this meeting?

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you.

11 MR. SABIR: I have a few things I just wanted
12 to talk about. Just the importance of this election
13 is very crucial. But Passover. Election day will
14 be on and Passover. And as we see in poll locations
15 are being changed. We just wanted to make it clear
16 that our constituents from the Jewish community does
17 not have to make a choice between practicing their
18 religion or voting. We have satellite location that
19 will be open where you can cast your ballot before
20 election day. And we have the vote by mail system
21 that was signed into law by Governor Tom Wolf. So
22 we encourage all Philadelphians to exercise their
23 right to vote. And in addition to the drop boxes
24 that was raised earlier in this meeting, we also can
25 do mobile staff drop boxes. So I'm open to that.

1 And accessibility is critical for our elections and
2 for the general elections, we're definitely open to
3 more drop boxes being placed inside of the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 Thank you, Commissioners, as always, for being
6 here. Hearing no other business, a motion to
7 adjourn today's meeting. Is there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
10 the roll.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

12 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir.

14 MR. SABIR: Aye. Motion adjourn to passes.
15 The meeting is adjourned.

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
