4	JUDGE CRUMLISH: Good morning. I'd
5	like to call to order the meeting of
6	Philadelphia County Board of Elections for
7	April 5th, 2023.
8	First, as Chair, first, I'll
9	preserve the order and decorum of these
10	meetings. You should be on notice that
11	disruptive or interference with the ordinary
12	conduct of the meeting will be caused for
13	removal.
14	The Sunshine Act permits anyone
15	attending a public meeting to object to a
16	proceeded violation at any time during the time
17	of the meeting. If you choose to do so, please
18	state your objection. You'll be reminded that
19	the objection is not a opportunity for
20	litigation, interrogation or speech making.
21	We will now move to public comment.
22	Is there anyone here today that wishes to make
23	a public comment for the record?
24	Sir, I see you raising your hand.

- 1 You can stand. Identify yourself and where
- you're from. Mr. Lynch will give you the
- 3 microphone.
- 4 MR. LOMELI: Good afternoon. I'm
- 5 going to read from my file if you don't mine.
- 6 City Commissioners, Honorable Judges, and
- 7 Deputies, my name is Marcos Lomeli. I'm the
- Program Director at Ceiba. A community based
- 9 organization serving Philadelphia's Latino and
- 10 immigrant communities.
- We want to thank your office.
- 12 Especially this past September last year, the
- 13 motion on Language Access Expansion to triple
- 14 the number of languages our communities can
- vote in. With this action your office has
- 16 helped insure that democracy of Philadelphia
- includes every voice and strengthen our
- 18 democratic process.
- 19 A functioning democracy is one in
- which the voices of -- disadvantage are with
- the same intention as the wealthy and
- empowered.
- Philadelphia's Latino community is
- 24 an example of a community that faces many

- 1 challenges. High poverty rate, gun violence,
- ² public agencies and business. Despite of
- 3 these challenges of the Hispanic community to
- 4 the City can not be overstated.
- Growth in the Hispanic population
- 6 -- of the whole City and successfully offset
- ⁷ the population of other groups in the City.
- 8 Between 2010 and 2020 Philadelphia's Hispanic
- ⁹ whole population grew by 5 percent thanks to
- 10 25.6 percent growth in the Hispanic
- 11 population. But for Hispanic growth in the
- 12 City as a whole, Pennsylvania would have lost
- more than one seat in the redistricting
- 14 process. More than one congressional seat.
- Our growth continues to stay at
- 4,670 Latinos Philadelphians and 21,000 Latino
- 17 Pennsylvania's. Latino also feel that the
- 18 economic growth in the recent years between
- 19 2020 and 2022 Hispanic in Pennsylvania grew to
- 20 -- among the fastest growth in Hispanic market
- 21 by 112 percent. Hispanics are also helping
- 22 Pennsylvania's vitality.
- 23 As Pennsylvania's population grows
- older with the median age of 41 years old, the

- 1 Latino population median age is 26 years old.
- One of the biggest challenges
- 3 facing the Latino community is the history of
- 4 low voter turn out. The voter turn out of the
- 5 Latino wards in the City in the November 2021
- 6 election was 6 and 8 percent perspective.
- As the community grows it's voter
- 8 and City engagement has not grown. Elected
- 9 officials have been so bold to proclaim, "your
- 10 community does not matter as much for us
- because you do not vote".
- When we address those issues in
- our neighbors -- since education and
- 14 nonpartisan voter information is also
- 15 important in the Latino community because it
- is a community that is volnerable to
- misinformation and conspiracy theories.
- 18 The Washington Post recently
- 19 reported that 70 percent of Spanish language
- ²⁰ misinformation has stayed online compared to
- the 29 percent of English language
- 22 misinformation.
- 23 At Ceiba we believe that we should
- 24 be lower the barriers to voting. In

- 1 particular, we think that the presence of
- official mail-in ballot drop-boxes in the
- 3 neighborhoods with historically low turnout
- 4 would be a good way of lowering those
- ⁵ barriers.
- During last Novembers last General
- ⁷ Election there were no official mail-in ballot
- 8 drop-boxes in the portions of Eastern North
- 9 Philadelphia where the majority of Latinos
- 10 live.
- In fact, the mail-in ballot
- 12 drop-boxes located at Shissler Rec, Stenton
- 13 Playground, and -- Rec formed sort of a
- 14 Bermuda triangle ensuring that Latinos would
- be less likely to cast their votes using the
- 16 simple and effective pool.
- We respectfully request that the
- 18 Office of City Commissioners and their serious
- 19 consideration in placing one or more fixed
- 20 ballot drop-boxes in neighbors where majority
- of residents are Latinos.
- A few locations that are public
- 23 facilities with video surveillance already
- 24 setup, including the Lillian Marrero Library

- 1 located at 601 Lehigh, and Kensington High
- 2 School located on the 2000 block of
- 3 East Cumberland Street.
- If you don't like these examples,
- ⁵ I invite you to come take a drive with me
- 6 through the neighborhood. We can find other
- ⁷ locations.
- 8 We would especially like to see
- 9 these boxes setup in the 74 hours leading up
- 10 to the election, which research shows is when
- 11 ballot drop-boxes are most useful.
- 12 The Office of City Commissioners
- will once again demonstrate that Philadelphia
- 14 is at the national cutting edge of it's ending
- democracy to conclude all it's eligible
- 16 voters.
- Gracias for your attention on this
- 18 matter.
- JUDGE CRUMLISH: Thank you very
- 20 much. Do we have any other public comments?
- 21 Thank you very much.
- Mr. Furlong, do we have any
- 23 submitted comments?
- JUDGE FURLONG: We do. All

1 comments that were emailed by 9:45 a.m. were 2 shared with members of the Board and to the 3 Deputies at 10:00 a.m. 4 We received one comment from Robin 5 Aluko(ph). I've reviewed the comment and ask 6 that it be moved into the record. 7 JUDGE CRUMLISH: I also reviewed 8 the comment. Judge Johnson, have you had an 9 opportunity to review the comment? 10 JUDGE JOHNSON: I have not seen 11 it. 12 JUDGE CRUMLLISH: I'll have that 13 for you. 14 JUDGE JOHNSON: Thank you. 15 JUDGE CRUMLISH: As this is not a 16 matter before the Board today, I would ask 17 that Judge Johnson and Judge Furlong to have 18 both read this comment and to be received into 19 the record. 2.0 All in favor? 21 2.2 (Respond I.)

- we will call Mr. Lynch for the report.
- MR. LYNCH: Good morning. I'll
- 3 read the Sunshine Act Report for April 5th,
- 4 2023.
- 5 The County Board of Elections as
- of yesterday, they have approved 71,545 vote
- ⁷ by mail applications, which is 10,742 added
- 8 from March 15th. Of those, 43,793 are paper
- 9 applications, and 27,752 are electronic
- 10 applications. This includes the civilian
- overseas and the military voters.
- 12 We have a total of 1,798
- 13 applications waiting to be proceeded. Of
- those 1,610 are paper applications, and 188
- ¹⁵ are electronic applications.
- The County Board are currently
- working on multiple appeals filed regarding
- 18 candidacy objections. This is Vote.Phila.Gov
- 19 to follow our objection tracking.
- The last day to apply for a
- 21 mail-in for oversea ballot is May 9th. The
- 22 staff discovered obvious facial defects on
- ²³ unchallenged candidates affidavits. Qawi
- 24 Abdul-Rahman, the candidate for Court of

- 1 Common Pleas, Delscia Greg, candidate for
- ² Mayor, and Jacque Whaumbush, candidate for
- 3 Sheriff on the line where they list their ward
- 4 and division.
- 5 We consulted with the law
- 6 department. They advised the staff, the ward
- ⁷ and candidates residing in -- and should be
- 9 put -- what is printed next to the candidate's
- 9 name on the ballot. Not withstanding the
- incorrect information on the affidavit.
- 11 Therefore, Oawi Abdul-Rahman will
- 12 be listed in the 52nd Ward. Delscia Greg will
- be listed in the 56th Ward. And Jacque
- 14 Whaumbush will be listed in the 21st Ward.
- The Voter Registration Unit for
- the election cycle to date, they have
- 17 processed 102, 478 registration applications
- of which 4,550 were paper. All applications
- 19 are up to date. They have had 442 petitioners
- ²⁰ from the review and stipulate petitions. All
- 21 petitioner users are done. They have sent
- 7,491 I.D. card out this week.
- The Election Board, since Spring
- training began for poll workers on March 13th,

- 1 the unit has trained 904 people to date. The
- ² unit began doing makeup classes for people
- 3 that couldn't attend the fall trainings of
- 4 electronic poll pads.
- 5 They will do these trainings every
- ⁶ Friday until the week before the elections.
- ⁷ Last Friday they had 53 people show up for the
- 8 March -- I'm sorry. They had 53 people show
- ⁹ up last Friday, which was March 31st. That's
- doing pretty good, the makeup trainings for
- the poll pads. So that will be every Friday
- 12 leading up to the election.
- JUDGE CRUMLISH: Thank you,
- 14 Mr. Lynch.
- MR. LYNCH: Thank you.
- JUDGE CRUMLISH: That is very
- important work. We thank the staff for all
- 18 their hard work. That concludes old business.
- 19 Let's move to new business. Mr. Stroman is
- here to present polling place relocations.
- Do we have anyone here for
- 22 specific poll relocations.
- MR. SCOTT: Good afternoon,
- 24 Commissioners. Thank you for having me. My

- 1 name is John Scott. I am the former Ward
- leader at the 18th Ward, one of the effected
- 3 polling places on this list. They moved from
- 4 the Fillmore to the Fishtown Rec Center.
- 5 That's not my division, but I am at the
- ⁶ Fishtown Rec Center as of right now.
- I was a ward leader, and then my
- 8 predecessor, the ward leader before me worked
- ⁹ very hard to divide the division that had a
- 10 lot of high population in the two divisions
- 11 and split it along Girard Avenue, which is
- 12 about --
- The idea was to have fewer people,
- 14 particularly elderly people, crossing the
- 15 street to vote. So we worked very hard to
- 16 split the divisions that way. When a polling
- 17 place become available we moved the people to
- 18 a polling place where they didn't cross Girard
- ¹⁹ Avenue.
- So this change undoes that. I
- don't believe there us any data to support
- that move other than the comity person --
- 23 however, once we did that move -- we did that
- 24 a year ago. After we did that move we saw an

- 1 increase in in-person turnout in that
- ² division, at their new polling place, at the
- Fillmore.
- So as it stands right now, if we
- 5 move them back, I believe that we are
- 6 suppressing their vote because some of them
- 7 will be unwilling to walk up the hill to the
- 8 further away polling place that they used to
- 9 be at.
- There are numbers in the past that
- 11 shows that that's definitely an impact. A
- 12 couple years ago -- I have copies if you would
- 13 like them.
- JUDGE CRIMLISH: We can move this
- 15 as part of the record.
- MR. SCOTT: Yes. Thank you.
- On the first page, these are the
- 18 last four elections. As you can see in red,
- this is Division 18 and 19, in red prior to
- the change, which is where the purple bar is.
- 21 Division 18 and 19 were always laggard in
- terms of in-person turn out.
- Once we made the change in the
- 24 2020 primary the turn out got a little higher

- 1 in-person. By last year's general election is
- 2 almost on pare with the other divisions. You
- 3 can see from the percentages they were 10
- 4 percent or more. It is now only a few points
- ⁵ behind.
- The second page is the same
- ⁷ information but in absolute numbers. Division
- 8 19 is in yellow. As you can see in the first
- ⁹ two elections it lags. By the 2022 general
- 10 elections it is 3rd places as opposed to 4th
- 11 place division. So people have -- once they
- 12 learned about the new polling place they
- 13 actually showed up there more in-person. So
- 14 it's now inline with the other divisions.
- Finally on the third page. My
- 16 polling place at Fishtown Rec Center. I am a
- voter there. I vote in every electio. They
- currently would have approximately 1,000
- 19 people voting on a regular day, and about
- 20 2,000 people that would be registered there.
- 21 It is about half the size of the Fillmore
- 22 polling place. If we move that division to
- 23 Fishtown Rec Center my polling place goes up
- 30 percent than the previous polling place,

    which is going to be largely empty.

                So there are seven divisions

    total. I think it makes more sense to keep
    the four divisions at Fillmore where they're

    geographically closer. They won't have to
6
    cross a wide street. They won't have to climb
7
    up a large hill, and where the turnout numbers
8
    clearly show --

SCOTT: On Montgomery. So 20 it's --21 JUDGE FURLONG: Thank you. 22 JUDGE CRUMLISH: Thank you very 23 much, sir. We'll take that into

14	North Front Street to the Cramp School at 3449
15	North Master Street for voter convenance.
