CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning. I call to order the meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioners Board of Election for Wednesday, April 8, 2026. This meeting is in compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.

The Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three-member bipartisan board of elected officials in charge of elections and voter registration for the City of Philadelphia. Each Commissioner is elected to serve a four year term that coincides with the municipal election cycle for mayor and City Council. The Commissioners set and enforce departmental policies to administer voter registration and conduct elections in accordance with federal and state voter registration and election laws.

The City Commissioners were created by the Pennsylvania assembly in 1711 with a focus on taxation and held various regulatory powers throughout the centuries. The Commissioners started maintaining Voter lists in 1799 and took on more election related responsibilities, but didn't emerge in its current form until the adoption of the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter in 1951.

1 We will start off with public comments. Before
2 beginning their comments, commenters shall state where
3 they live or if they are not a resident of
4 Philadelphia and that they are a Philadelphia
5 taxpayer. Public comment is not an opportunity for
6 dialogue or Q and A, it is public comment, a chance
7 for you to tell us what you think. Each speaker will
8 have two minutes to speak. However, I may extend the
9 time at my discretion. Public comment must concern
10 matters on today's meeting agenda.

11 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve the
12 order and decorum of the meetings. As such, profane,
13 slanderous, discriminatory, personal attacks will not
14 be tolerated. If you wish to make a public objection
15 to a perceived Sunshine Act violation, please raise
16 your hand and I will recognize you. Outbursts will
17 not be tolerated. Anyone wishing to offer public
18 comment, please step forward.

19 MR. CUSTUDIO: Mr. Chairman, prior to the start
20 of the meeting. Can the record reflect that --

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, hold on for one second.
22 You have to ask for permission to be recognized, okay?
23 I was about to recognize that Vice Chair Lisa Deeley
24 is not here. I think everybody looking at you know
25 that Vice Chair Lisa Deeley is not here, okay?

1 MR. CUSTUDIO: She's attending via the phone.

2 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I got you. I got you, bro.

3 MR. CUSTUDIO: Okay.

4 CHAIRMAN SABIR: You're being disrespectful and
5 out of order. So hold up for one second. Okay?
6 Hearing no public comment, we will now proceed to
7 email comments. Before we proceed, Vice Chair Lisa
8 Deeley is attending by phone. As we all can see, Vice
9 Chair Lisa Deeley is not here. Nick Custodio, her
10 deputy, is in her stance.

11 Secretary Bluestein, who do we have any email
12 public comments?

13 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. All
14 comments that were emailed by 9:45 a.m. were shared
15 with the commissioners and deputies by 10:00 a.m. and
16 have been provided to each commissioner at the
17 beginning of the meeting and are available at the
18 public comment table. We received one comment for
19 this week's meeting from Danny Pavlich related to the
20 proposed polling place relocation for Ward 21,
21 Division 23. I have reviewed the comment and asked
22 that it be moved into the record.

23 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I have also reviewed the
24 comment. Please move them into the record.

25 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: I've also reviewed the

1 comment and ask that it be moved to the record.

2 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Secretary Bluestein.
3 We will now proceed to old business. First, we have a
4 report from our Directors of Elections Operation and
5 Administration, Mr. Joseph Lynch and Mr. Mark Johnson.
6 Joe, we'll start with you.

7 MR. LYNCH: Morning, Commissioners.

8 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Morning.

9 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

10 MR. LYNCH: Our public meeting update for April
11 8, 2026 at the election warehouse, the voting machine
12 service unit is working on finishing BlueCrest tests
13 and preparing for logic and accuracy testing and the
14 final test. The poll book unit has been updating the
15 network in box network and ensuring it works on all
16 poll books. The election materials unit has been
17 working to ensure that the supplies needed for our
18 poll workers are ordered, organized, and ready for
19 packing. We currently have 26 machine demos
20 scheduled. Eight are for our Involved at 17
21 trainings.

22 For our voter registration report, for the
23 election cycle to date, we have processed 97,694 voter
24 registration applications. 12,050 were paper and
25 85,644 were electronic. All applications are up to

1 date and are being reviewed. We are assisting with
2 processing return mail-in ballot applications. We
3 also mailed out 14,090 voter ID cards. As of
4 yesterday, the County Board of Elections has approved
5 70,439 vote by mail applications, which is 1,631 added
6 from last week's total. Of those, 40,848 are paper
7 applications and 29,591 are electronic applications.
8 This includes civilian, overseas, military, and
9 federal voters. We currently have a total of 103
10 electronic applications waiting to be processed.

11 On April 3, we sent out our first initial mailing
12 of UOCAVA ballots. We sent out 256 ballots to all
13 civilian, overseas, military, and federal voters who
14 requested a ballot. Voters will need to complete and
15 return their application to the County Board of
16 elections office by 5:00 p.m. on May 12 to vote by
17 mail for the primary election.

18 The Board Workers Unit is moving through to
19 spring training with 1,894 attending so far. The
20 Election Board Spring Training seminar schedule is
21 posted on our website vote.phila.gov. Weekly
22 reminders will go out to those who have not yet
23 attended. The unit has 4,563 poll workers confirmed
24 to work at the polling location so far. 756
25 confirmation messages have been sent to poll workers.

1 Also, 510 applications have been submitted for --
2 submitted for Involved at 17 program. Satellite
3 election officers are currently assisting. The public
4 offices -- public offices are open Monday through
5 Friday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

6 And that's all I have, Commissioners.

7 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Joe. Secretary
8 Bluestein, do you have any comments or questions for
9 Joe?

10 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Thank you Chairman. I do
11 not.

12 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Vice Chair Deeley, you have any
13 questions for Joe?

14 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Thank you. I do not. Thank
15 you.

16 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Joe. We'll proceed
17 to Mark.

18 MR. JOHNSON: Good Morning Commissioners and
19 Deputies.

20 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning.

21 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

22 MR. JOHNSON: This week we focus on finalizing
23 the Election Academy voter registration sessions along
24 with continuing -- this is from a communication and
25 engagement and language access standpoint -- continued

1 updates to SEO training material and graphics. We
2 also launched paid social media advertising for the
3 2026 primary alongside scheduled voter reminders and
4 outgoing organic contact. The Poll Worker Guide and
5 payroll handouts for inclusion in white boxes have
6 been finalized for print. We also completed the
7 tablecloth designs and coordinating feedback from all
8 your offices.

9 Outreach material signage has been prepared
10 including weatherproof signage for City Hall and
11 election day placard was submitted to PPA. We
12 continue coordination with the mail ballot vendor and
13 communication consultant and complete a transition of
14 ballot questions. The final Election Academy sessions
15 are this week, after which material will be repurposed
16 for ongoing voter education.

17 The final two spring Election Academy sessions
18 are taking place this week. One was canceled
19 yesterday due to technical issues at the DSG, but been
20 changed for today and moved till Thursday. Once these
21 sessions are completed, the slide contents will be
22 repurposed to social media sliders and voter education
23 material.

24 From a human resources standpoint, the workforce
25 planning and new hire budget checks are ongoing with

1 12 temporary employees starting this week. As of
2 April 3, 2026, the office has 176 total employees,
3 including 30 exempt employees and 146 civil service
4 employees. The bulk of staff includes 54 clerk ones,
5 25 clerk twos, 28 clerk three, seven trade helpers,
6 eight, eight voting machine mechanics. And there are
7 currently as of today on your sheets it's just one.
8 And there's a typo with primary -- with general, but
9 it's actually primary election. Nine temporary
10 employees remaining that are on -- that have been
11 onboarded as of yesterday.

12 So information technology, IT met with the state
13 CISA regarding policies associated with how our poll
14 books are being used during the election. IT also
15 continues to work with all units as we prepare for
16 upcoming primary elections to support readiness across
17 the operation.

18 Budget remains engaged in ongoing election
19 preparations efforts and continuing supported planning
20 associated with the upcoming primary elections. I
21 think we're doing pretty good financially. We're
22 making sure that all our vendors are actually sending
23 in all of their invoices ahead of time, at least
24 quotes, so that we can get them in the process earlier
25 and finance is appreciative.

1 Security coordination remains ongoing as we
2 continue preparing for the primary election. The next
3 scheduled election security meeting is scheduled for
4 April 16, and that's about it.

5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. Secretary Bluestein, do
6 you have any questions for Mark?

7 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. I do
8 not.

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Vice Chair Deeley, did you have
10 any questions?

11 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Thank you. I do not.

12 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Well, thank you. I'd like to
13 definitely commend the Election Academy, it's
14 dynamite. Everybody put their hard work together.
15 Thank you and I'm looking forward to being there
16 tomorrow. Really had a great time.

17 Okay. We will now proceed to new business. We
18 will begin to consider our first agenda item, polling
19 place changes. We'll hear from our polling place
20 investigation supervisor, Charlie Stroman.

21 MR. STROMAN: Good morning, Commissioners.

22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning, Charlie.

23 MR. STROMAN: I have 29 proposal changes, and the
24 first two are in the 5th Ward, the 7th Division, and
25 the 29th Division moving out of William Way Community

1 center to the Church of St. Luke and Epiphany. And
2 that's due to a refusal.

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
4 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
5 polling place change for Ward 5, Division 7 and 29.
6 Is there a second?

7 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

8 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
10 the roll.

11 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

12 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

13 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
14 Sabir?

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

16 MR. STROMAN: The next proposal is in the 11th
17 Ward, the third division, moving out of Heritage Park
18 Rec Center to the Apartments at Allegheny Avenue. And
19 that is due to a refusal.

20 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
21 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
22 polling place change for Ward 11, Division 3. Is
23 there a second?

24 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

25 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call

1 the roll.

2 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

3 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

4 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
5 Sabir?

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

7 MR. STROMAN: Next proposal is in the 21st Ward.
8 The 23rd Division moving out of the Mifflin School at
9 3624 Conrad Street to the New Bethel A.M.E Church of
10 Germantown, 3015 West Schoolhouse Lane. And that is
11 moving that division into the division.

12 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
13 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
14 polling place change for Ward 21 Division 23. Is
15 there a second?

16 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
18 the roll.

19 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

20 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

21 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
22 Sabir?

23 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

24 MR. STROMAN: Next one is the 22nd Ward 15
25 Division moving out of Cliveden House to the Pleasant

1 Rec Center. And that is due to the property being
2 vandalized.

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
4 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
5 polling place change for Ward 22, Division 15. Is
6 there a second?

7 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

8 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
9 the roll.

10 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

11 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

12 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
13 Sabir?

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed, sir.

15 MR. STROMAN: Next change will be in the 40th
16 Ward, the 37th Division moving out of the Residence at
17 753037 Dickens Place to Cibotti Rec Center and that is
18 due to a refusal.

19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
20 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
21 polling place change for Ward 40, Division 37. Is
22 there a second?

23 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
25 the roll.

1 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

2 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

3 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
4 Sabir?

5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

6 MR. STROMAN: Next two in the 48th Ward, the 7th
7 Division, and the 22nd Division moving out of St. John
8 Neumann Place II at 2627 Mifflin Street to the Vare
9 Recreation Center. And that is due to a refusal.

10 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
11 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
12 polling place change for Ward 48, Division 7 and 22.
13 Is there a second?

14 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
16 the roll.

17 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

18 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

19 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
20 Sabir?

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Okay, Charlie. We have
22 public comment for the next polling place change. Is
23 that correct?

24 MR. BOLTON: Yes.

25 MR. STROMAN: I can handle, Commissioner. I

1 spoke to them earlier. So, the Emanuel Rec Center was
2 closed down --

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: They want to make a public
4 comment. Come on.

5 MR. BOLTON: Yes. My name --

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Well, come on -- come on up.
7 Come on up. Thank you for coming up. We really
8 appreciate you. You know, it's always --

9 MR. BOLTON: It's very important.

10 CHAIRMAN SABIR: It's always great when we have
11 visitors and like to thank you. Thank you. And just
12 please say --

13 MR. BOLTON: Commissioners --

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Sir, just before you speak, just
15 say your --

16 MR. BOLTON: My name is Larry Bolton, committee
17 person, 50th Ward, 4th Division. And thank you for
18 allowing me this opportunity. Commissioners,
19 Commissioner Sabir, Secretary Brownstein, and
20 Commissioner Deeley.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, Bluestein. Bluestein.

22 MR. BOLTON: I'm sorry. My bad. Bluestein.
23 Okay. My concern is, when I heard you doing the roll
24 right, you were only talking about pretty much
25 consistently, one division. It might be more with the

1 changes. Okay? Now, Dorothy Emanuel, we've been in
2 there for about 10 years, and all, all elections are
3 important, right, but I -- this one is, kind of,
4 important because we're doing some things nationally
5 and, you know, locally, and I feel because people are
6 creatures of habit, right, we've been going there for
7 about 10 years, and like, we usually -- myself and
8 Vicki, she's a -- she's a committee person, and she's
9 in the 50th Ward, First Division. We, kind of, like,
10 the day before election, we, kind of, like, place the
11 machines in position and configurate, make sure
12 everybody's at a good outlet, put tables up for
13 everybody.

14 And so with this move, like, I could do Dorothy
15 Emanuel easily. Now, Enon is a much more structured
16 location, and pretty much that's my church, too. So I
17 want to make sure that all our voters can get down
18 there. It's, it's about, what, six blocks away?
19 About six blocks away. In, in those divisions that we
20 talked about, six of them. We have a lot of elderly
21 people, okay. And we want to make sure we got enough
22 signage and enough, enough signage in the neighborhood
23 directing the people where to go. And also they
24 receive some type of email communications or either
25 hand them out pamphlets to let them know where to go,

1 because it's a very highly active ward. Okay.

2 Now, the fact that Enon might be a little bit
3 easier for me, that's my church as well. And, like, I
4 was looking at it because Dorothy Emmanuel,
5 everybody's in the jump, okay? I looked at Enon,
6 Enon. Pretty much how you get -- if you come into the
7 polling -- if you come into the church in the lobby, I
8 can configure it to look like Dorothy Emanuel with the
9 machines, okay. Because we know that voters, they
10 will look at the table and they know where to go.
11 They don't necessarily know what division they are.
12 They look at the people at the table and they know
13 where to go.

14 So my concern is that we have a good voter
15 turnout at this new polling place. Okay. And I want
16 almost, like -- I want it because, like, it's a very
17 important election. I just want a good voter turnout
18 at the new polling place.

19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. Well, thank you.

20 MR. BOLTON: Okay.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. Hold on one second.
22 Secretary Bluestein, did you have any questions or
23 comments you wanted to say about this statement?

24 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. I
25 appreciate you coming out and giving us all that

1 information. It's really helpful for, you know, our
2 decision making process when we're moving polling
3 places. So I'm really grateful that you took the time
4 to come out. I guess the only question I have for
5 Charlie is it just looks from my notes that we can't
6 use Emanuel Rec Center because of mold, so we're not
7 able to use the building.

8 MR. STROMAN: That's correct.

9 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: So I guess my question for
10 you and for you, sir, is just understanding the
11 challenges of going to a new location and having to
12 set it up, is there any concern that you have with
13 Enon Tabernacle, or is it okay for now until we can
14 eventually get back?

15 MR. BOLTON: I know the, the director that will
16 handle that. And I don't know -- see, like, I don't
17 know how -- what -- how they -- like Enon, we could
18 put out the required signage on the wall in the
19 polling place. Required signs in the wall polling
20 place. And we can put the required signage outside,
21 outside --

22 MR. STROMAN: I think I can address all your
23 issues. So what I'll do is, and I can do this, we can
24 set the polling place up ahead of time. Being six
25 divisions first time, you're worried about people

1 being confused. We could take care of that. Signage
2 is absolutely my job to make sure it's done, and it
3 will be done. We hang three signs within the division
4 impacted. We hang a sign at the old, a sign at the
5 new, and then a week before election day, we hang the
6 same signs over again. Every voter in all the
7 divisions receive a new election card telling them of
8 the polling place.

9 But as far as the setup, I'll reach out to Enon
10 when I get back to make sure we can get in there early
11 to help set up. And what I always do is I'll always
12 invite the board workers to come help if they want to,
13 so they're not surprised the morning of election day.
14 That can all happen.

15 MR. BOLTON: Okay. Excuse me.

16 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, just one -- just one
17 second.

18 MR. BOLTON: Okay.

19 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Vice Chair Deeley, you wanted
20 to make a comment?

21 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Yeah, I was just going to
22 reiterate what Charlie just said, sir. We do
23 appreciate your taking the time. We know it's quite a
24 journey, certainly from the 50th Ward to the
25 warehouse. So we recognize how significant this

1 change is for you. Every voter will get a postcard
2 alerting them of the change and we will do our due
3 diligence with regard to signage. And as Charlie
4 said, the staff will be helpful as possible in making
5 sure that the setup at Enon is as seamless as it could
6 be. We recognize it's an inconvenience, especially
7 after voting at Emanuel for so long. But it is out of
8 our control, and our professional staff will do
9 everything they can to make sure that this transition
10 is seamless. And thank you again for coming down.

11 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: And, Charlie, our
12 understanding this is -- it's been represented to you
13 that this change will just be for this -- just the
14 primary?

15 MR. STROMAN: It's, it's mold. So I would assume
16 they're going to have it cleaned up for the next
17 election after this, I would assume. But I always
18 stay in touch with (indiscernible).

19 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Okay.

20 MR. STROMAN: All right. Can I have your cell
21 phone number?

22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. Is, is it possible -- and
23 I don't know any -- the commissioners feel. I mean, a
24 lot of this information really, kind of -- really
25 didn't come across my desk. I would like to -- we

1 maybe could table this to the next meeting before we -
2 - to, to take a, a vote on that?

3 MR. STROMAN: And are you unhappy with the
4 location?

5 MR. BOLTON: No, I'm fine with the location, but
6 I want the signage I'm referring to, not necessarily
7 directional signage, but I was actually talking about
8 the ballots that, you know, the ballots that we put up
9 for, you know, different ballots and other
10 information. We usually put it up behind the tables,
11 you know, you know, for the -- for that division. We
12 usually do that for each division. Okay. Go ahead.

13 SPEAKER 1: Can I kind of explain that? Because
14 I'm the election judge.

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Yes, ma'am.

16 MR. BOLTON: Okay.

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: If you want to come up and put
18 your name on the record. Thank you for coming up,
19 too. We appreciate you coming on up.

20 SPEAKER 1: Good morning. I'm the election judge
21 for the 50th Ward 4th Division, and I came today --
22 first of all, let me say this is one -- to come and
23 see as long as I've been an election judge, which is
24 good seeing you again, because I saw you when you gave
25 me a certificate for over 40 years in this --

1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you.

2 SPEAKER 1: -- in this thing.

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I saw you coming back. You're
4 serving again.

5 SPEAKER 1: Yeah.

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. We appreciate you.
7 Appreciate you.

8 SPEAKER 1: But I think it was a concern of some
9 of the election judges how to place ballots on the
10 wall. Will we be able to place ballots on the wall at
11 Enon? Because I know I've never seen anything on
12 their walls in that family life Center.

13 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Well, what I would like to do, I
14 would like to personally take a -- take a trip there.
15 Let me take a look at it.

16 SPEAKER 1: Okay.

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Let's see exactly what's going
18 on. If y'all want to connect with us while we go out
19 there.

20 MR. BOLTON: Okay.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: We could -- we could talk and
22 just do a walk through and just see, you know.
23 Exactly what's going on.

24 SPEAKER 1: Okay.

25 MR. STROMAN: And that's becoming an issue in

1 several places with stuff on the walls. There's
2 churches that are telling me they don't -- they don't
3 want any.

4 MR. BOLTON: Right.

5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I understand.

6 MR. STROMAN: So they're putting easels up and do
7 what they can. So I can talk to them about that too.

8 SPEAKER 1: Okay. Yeah, that was my concern --

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, so we'll just --

10 SPEAKER 1: -- as the election judge and, and I
11 know we'll be able to get in there the day before and
12 we can help whoever's there, but --

13 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, so --

14 SPEAKER 1: -- ballots outside on the wall. I
15 don't know whether they like stuff on the wall outside
16 of the church.

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: So we'll just look a little bit
18 closer into this and we'll just -- we'll just table
19 this.

20 SPEAKER 1: Okay. Thank you very much.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: And then we'll come back --

22 SPEAKER 1: And it's the first time, all this
23 time, and first time coming to one of these meetings.
24 And it's really informative.

25 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. Thank you.

1 Appreciate that.

2 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I say one
3 thing?

4 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Yes, you may.

5 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: All right, thank you. I
6 just want to clarify for the record, when you say
7 ballots on the wall, you mean the pink sheets,
8 correct? The sample ballots?

9 SPEAKER 1: The pink sheets. The sample ballots.

10 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: So I just want to clarify
11 that for the record for anyone who's watching the
12 meeting --

13 SPEAKER 1: For the outside on the walls can be -
14 -

15 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: -- that's the, the sample
16 ballot posters that are the pink sheets, not actual
17 ballots. Thank you.

18 MR. BOLTON: You're right.

19 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I know.

20 SPEAKER 1: Oh, God no.

21 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I appreciate it. Thank
22 you.

23 CHAIRMAN SABIR: And thank you for coming again.
24 We really appreciate that. We'll definitely -- we'll,
25 we'll figure this out.

1 MR. STROMAN: Chairman, should I announce the
2 50th anyway, even though we're, we're going to table?
3 You want me to announce it now?

4 CHAIRMAN SABIR: No, we're just going to table
5 it.

6 MR. STROMAN: Hold off?

7 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Yeah, we're going to hold off on
8 that. We'll go to the next one. See what the next
9 ward and division is?

10 MR. STROMAN: That's fine. Next one is the 52nd
11 Ward, the 13th Division. Move out of Fairview Arms
12 Apartments to the Settlement Music West on Wynnefield
13 Avenue. And that is back to the original location.

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
15 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
16 polling place change for Ward 52nd Division 13. Is
17 there a second?

18 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
20 the roll.

21 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

22 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

23 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
24 Sabir?

25 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

1 MR. STROMAN: Next five will be in the 55th Ward,
2 25th Division, 26th Division, 27th Division, 28th
3 Division, and 29th Division, all moving out of the
4 Vogt Rec Center to the Disston Rec Center. And that
5 is due to a rebuild project.

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
7 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
8 polling place change for Ward 55 Division 25, 26, 27,
9 28, and 29. Is there a second?

10 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

11 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
12 the roll.

13 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

14 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

15 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
16 Sabir?

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

18 MR. STROMAN: Next two are in the 58th Ward, the
19 5th Division, and the 21st Division. Moving out of
20 Calvary Chapel, 13500 Philmont Avenue to the Somerton
21 Methodist Church at 13073 Bustleton Avenue, and that
22 is due to refusal.

23 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
24 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
25 polling place change for Ward 58, Division 5 and 21.

1 Is there a second?

2 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
4 the roll.

5 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

6 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

7 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
8 Sabir?

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

10 MR. STROMAN: Next one is the 59th Ward, 21st
11 Division, moving out of the Lingelbach School at 6340
12 Wayne Avenue to the Wesley Enhanced Living. And that
13 is due to voter convenience.

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
15 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
16 polling place Change for Ward 59, Division 21. Is
17 there a second?

18 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
20 the roll.

21 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

22 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

23 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
24 Sabir?

25 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

1 MR. STROMAN: Next six are in -- next six are in
2 the 65th Ward, and this can get confusing. So the
3 first two will be 6515 and 6522. Moving out of
4 Holmesburg Youth Club to the New Foundations Charter
5 School and that is due to the building being sold.

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
7 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
8 polling place change for Ward 65, Division 15 and 22.
9 Is there a second?

10 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

11 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
12 the roll.

13 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

14 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

15 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
16 Sabir?

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

18 MR. STROMAN: Next two are again in the 65th
19 Ward, 16th Division and the 18th Division. Moving out
20 of Holmesburg Rec Center to New Foundations Charter
21 School. Again to the building being sold.

22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
23 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
24 polling place change for Ward 65, Division 16 and 18.
25 Is there a second?

1 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

2 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
3 the roll.

4 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

5 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

6 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
7 Sabir?

8 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

9 MR. STROMAN: Last two are in the 65th Ward
10 again, 19th Division and the 21st Division. Moving
11 out of Holmesburg Youth Club to the Holmesburg Rec
12 Center. Same thing, the building got sold.

13 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Having heard the recommendation
14 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
15 polling place change for Ward 65, Division 19 and 21.
16 Is there a second?

17 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

18 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
19 the roll.

20 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

21 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

22 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
23 Sabir?

24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Thank you, Charlie.

25 MR. STROMAN: You're welcome.

1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Really appreciate you. That was
2 our last item on our agenda. Before we adjourn, Vice
3 Chair Deeley, do you have any other business to be
4 raised at this meeting?

5 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: I have none. Thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have
7 any other business to be raised at this meeting?

8 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I motion we adjourn today's
10 meeting. Is there a second?

11 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Second.

12 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
13 the roll.

14 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

15 VICE CHAIR DEELEY: Aye.

16 SECRETARY BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman
17 Sabir?

18 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Thank you. This meeting's
19 adjourned.
