3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning. I call to order
4 the meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioners
5 sitting as the Board of Elections for Wednesday, April
6 22nd, 2026. This meeting is in compliance with the
7 Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.

8 I would like to recognize that Chairman Sabir is
9 attending this meeting telephonically while we are --
10 while he is visiting our mail ballot print vendor, and
11 Vice Chair Deeley is not in attendance. We will start
12 off with public comments. Before beginning their
13 comments, commenters shall state where they live or if
14 they are not a resident of Philadelphia, that they are
15 Philadelphia taxpayer.

16 Public comment is not an opportunity for dialogue
17 or Q and A. It is public comment, a chance for you to
18 tell us what you think. Each speaker will have two
19 minutes to speak. However, I may extend that time at
20 my discretion. Public comment must concern matters on
21 today's meeting agenda. Finally, it is my
22 responsibility to preserve the order and decorum of
23 the meetings.

24 As such, profane, slanderous, discriminatory,
25 personal attacks will not be tolerated. If you wish

1 to make a public objection to a perceived Sunshine act
2 violation, please raise your hand and I will recognize
3 you. Outbursts will not be tolerated.

4 Anyone wishing to offer public comment, please
5 step forward. If you are here to comment on a
6 proposed polling place change, I will recognize you
7 when that specific polling place changes is up later
8 in the meeting. Hearing no public comment, we will
9 now proceed with emailed public comments.

10 As of 9:45 a.m., there were none. All right. We
11 will now move to old business. First, we will have a
12 report from our Director of Election Operations,
13 Joseph Lynch, followed by a report from our Director
14 of Election Administration, Mark Johnson. Joe, you
15 may proceed.

16 MR. LYNCH: Yes, thank you. Good morning,
17 Commissioners.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

19 MR. LYNCH: This is our public meeting update for
20 April 22nd, 2026. At the election warehouse, all
21 units have been busy preparing for the upcoming
22 election. The voting machine service unit
23 successfully completed a logic and accuracy testing on
24 Tuesday, April 21st.

25 The team is getting ready to do the final test on

1 the remaining fleet of the XLs. The e-poll book unit
2 has been finishing preparations for its operations and
3 upcoming testing. The election materials unit has
4 been working to ensure that the supplies needed for
5 our poll workers are ordered, organized, and ready for
6 packing.

7 We currently have 15 machine demos scheduled.
8 One is for our last involved at 17 training. To date,
9 our voter registration report, Delaware and Spring
10 Garden, has processed 113,580 voter registration
11 applications.

12 17,600 were paper and 95,980 were electronic.
13 All applications are up-to-date and are being
14 reviewed. The unit is also assisting with mail-in
15 ballot applications and helping with the machine
16 demonstrations.

17 As of yesterday, the County Board of Elections
18 approved 73,351 vote-by-mail applications, which is
19 1,310 added from last week's total. Of those, 42,460
20 are paper applications and 30,891 are electronic
21 applications. This includes civilian, overseas,
22 military, and federal voters.

23 We currently have a total of 955 electronic
24 applications waiting to be processed. Voters will
25 need to complete the -- to complete and return their

1 applications to the County Board of Elections office
2 by 5:00 p.m. on May 12th to vote-by-mail for the
3 primary elections. We are currently printing and
4 preparing our first initial mailing of ballots.

5 We will send out just under 73,000 ballots late
6 afternoon on Thursday, April 23rd. ID verification
7 letters have gone out to voters who either did not
8 include the required proof of identification on their
9 absentee/mail-in ballot application or whose proof of
10 identification could not be verified by the County
11 Board of Elections Office.

12 Voters who have received this letter may submit
13 their proof of ID to the County Board of Elections via
14 email at phillyelection@phila.gov, fax, US mail,
15 telephone, or in-person. Voters have until midnight
16 Tuesday, May 26th, to return their proof of
17 identification for the general primary and special
18 election. The Board Worker -- Board Workers unit has
19 been conducting our spring training seminars with
20 2,709 participants so far. Online training went live
21 on Monday, April 20th, 2026.

22 And both the online courses and the spring
23 training seminar schedules are available on our
24 website at vote.phila.gov. Weekly reminders will be
25 sent to those who have not yet attended a training

1 session. Currently, 6,943 poll workers have been
2 confirmed to work at our polling locations. 723
3 confirmation messages have been sent to the poll
4 workers.

5 Also, 586 applications have been received for our
6 Involved at 17 program. Satellite election offices
7 are currently assisting the public. Offices are open
8 Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. We are
9 hoping that all SEO satellite election offices,
10 including City Hall, for mail-in ballot requests with
11 the earliest opening on Thursday or Friday of this
12 week. An announcement will be posted on our website
13 soon. Thank you. That's all I have.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Joe. Chairman Sabir,
15 do you have any questions for Joe?

16 MR. SABIR: No. I just want to say, again, thank
17 you for the operation side. You guys and gals have
18 been doing such a great job. And, you know, it's
19 definitely reflected in the work, you know, so I
20 definitely want to say thank you.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. Vice Chair
22 Deeley, do you have any questions for Joe?

23 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. Mark, you may
25 proceed.

1 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning, Commissioners. HR
2 continues to make strong progress on workforce
3 readiness. The primary focus this week is onboarding
4 and orientation of our final group of temporary staff
5 to support the primary election.

6 HR is also refining and streamlining orientation
7 materials to improve efficiencies and consistencies
8 across the onboarding process. Workforce planning and
9 budget alignment for new hires remains ongoing. From
10 a -- from a staffing standpoint, as of April 17th, we
11 have a total employees of 190,30 exempts, and 160
12 civil service employees.

13 We currently have 15 temporary staff supporting
14 the primary elections. Overall, HR is in a solid
15 position heading into the final ramp-up phase. From a
16 communication standpoint, communications has been
17 heavily focused on ballot accuracy, public meetings,
18 and election visibility.

19 Key updates, ballot question number 3 has been
20 removed across all materials. Mail ballots, website
21 content, and translate resources to ensure consistency
22 heading, heading ahead of distribution. Updates in
23 republished ballot content across multiple languages
24 support accessibility and compliance. And social
25 media outreach continues to perform strongly, reaching

1 over 384,000 people last week with increasing
2 engagement especially on Instagram.

3 The team is also finalizing E30 timeline material
4 and talking points for commissioners, deputies, and
5 elected officials. Coordination continues with the
6 Department of State and communication partners to
7 maintain aligned messaging. Additionally, preparation
8 for mail ballot distributions are underway including
9 coordination with vendors and continued development of
10 public-facing material.

11 IT operations remains focused on election
12 readiness and infrastructure support. The election
13 night reporting system is currently in testing.
14 Sample ballots and ballot access files are now live
15 and available to the public.

16 The election board virtual training platform has
17 officially launched. Satellite election officers
18 hours are being extended with IT staff scheduled to
19 support those operations. Equipment deployment is
20 underway including Balotar (phnoetic) laptops being
21 delivered to the SEOs this week.

22 On the infrastructure side, key projects such as
23 Bravo's installation for access control generator
24 procurement and facility upgrades are progressing.
25 The main challenges continue to be workflow

1 adjustments related to the shore system, but the team
2 is actively working with state partners to stabilize
3 and improve processes. From a security standpoint,
4 we've had our -- last week, we had our security
5 partnership meeting, or all of our partners have been
6 informed what we're requiring from them and have
7 agreed to provide those services.

8 Contract security personnel will begin coverage
9 at satellite offices, city hall, and -- not the
10 warehouse, but satellite office, city hall, and DSG
11 starting on April 27th. City hall won't begin until,
12 I believe, that's the 16th of Friday, before the
13 election itself. The next security meeting is
14 scheduled for April 30th.

15 Yesterday, we hosted the Philadelphia Sheriff's
16 Office here at the warehouse to discuss election
17 support. We had one change that we wanted to do with
18 them signing and assisting with the drop boxes. They
19 have agreed to provide that assistance.

20 And overall coordination with our law enforcement
21 and security partners remains strong as we move into
22 our education phase. Voter engagement efforts
23 continue to expand across the city with strong
24 community presence. Multiple outreach events were
25 conducted across libraries, community centers, and

1 cultural organizations with direct voter education,
2 hands-on voting machine demonstrations.

3 We continued engagement with community partners
4 is helping to expand reach, particularly among first-
5 time voters and underrepresented groups. Several
6 upcoming events are scheduled throughout this week and
7 into the next, including senior centers, libraries,
8 and large community festivals. Language access
9 support remains ongoing including translation efforts
10 and coordination with community organization.

11 The team is maintaining a consistent presence in
12 the community and reinforcing awareness of key
13 election dates and voting options. And from a budget
14 and finance standpoint, we continue to monitor
15 election-related spending and preparing for upcoming
16 financial needs tied to the primary election. I
17 believe we, for most units, have already turned in
18 quotes from their vendors and from their consultants
19 associated with anticipated spending so that we can
20 make sure that we can pay people as soon as the
21 primary election is over.

22 Therefore, we won't be able to bring a lot of
23 that debt into the next fiscal year. And that's it.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Mark. Chairman Sabir,
25 do you have any questions for Mark?

1 MR. SABIR: Again, I'd just like to echo, you
2 know, thanks from the administrative side. I see a
3 lot of the hard work, you know, the guys and girls
4 would definitely appreciate you and all your work.
5 And thank you. I really appreciate you.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. Vice Chair
7 Deeley, do you have any questions for Mark?

8 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. We will now move to
10 new business. We will begin to consider our first
11 agenda item, which is polling place changes. We will
12 hear from our polling place investigation supervisor,
13 Charlie Stroman.

14 MR. STROMAN: Good morning, Commissioners.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

16 MR. STROMAN: I have 10 items on the agenda. The
17 first two are in the 18th Ward, 14th Division, and the
18 15th Division, moving out of Tajeet residence to the
19 Cruise Rec Center, and that is due to a refusal.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Having heard the recommendation
21 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
22 polling place change for Ward 18, Divisions 14 and 15.
23 Is there a second?

24 MR. SABIR: Second.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: I will now call the roll. Vice

1 Chair Deeley?

2 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

4 MR. SABIR: Aye.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Charlie, you may proceed.

6 MR. STROMAN: Next five are in a 55th Ward, 25th
7 Division, 26th Division, 27th Division, 28th Division,
8 and the 29th Division moving out of the distant rec
9 center to the Arts and Music Inc., and that is due to
10 a refusal.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Having heard the recommendation
12 of the professional staff, I move that we accept the
13 polling place change for Ward 55, Divisions 25, 26,
14 27, 28, and 29. Is there a second?

15 MR. SABIR: Second.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: I will now call the roll. Vice
17 Chair Deeley.

18 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

20 MR. SABIR: Aye.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Charlie, you may proceed.

22 MR. STROMAN: Next three are in the 57th Ward,
23 the 2nd Division, the 24th Division, and the 25th
24 Division. Moving out of the Aviation Institute to the
25 Thomas Home Elementary School, and that's moving it

1 into the ward.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: It is my understanding that my
3 colleagues would like to table this recommendation to
4 the following week. Is that correct?

5 MR. SABIR: Yes, that's correct. That's the 57th
6 Ward, right?

7 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes.

8 MR. SABIR: Yes.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. So we will table that
10 one to the future meeting. All right. Anything else,
11 Charlie?

12 MR. STROMAN: That's all I have.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. Before we adjourn,
14 Vice Chair Deeley, do you have any other business to
15 be raised at this meeting?

16 MS. DEELEY: I have none. Thank you.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. Chairman Sabir, do
18 you have any other business to be raised at this
19 meeting?

20 MR. SABIR: Well, I was very excited, you know,
21 that we are going to be able to cast our ballot before
22 the May 19th election. So I definitely would like,
23 you know, all of my colleagues to definitely get the
24 word out there to let Philadelphia know that they can
25 cast their ballot before May 19th.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. With that
2 being all on the agenda, I move that we adjourn
3 today's meeting. Is there a second?

4 MR. SABIR: Second.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I will now call the roll. Vice
6 Chair Deeley?

7 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

9 MR. SABIR: Aye.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. This meeting is
11 adjourned.

12 MR. SABIR: Thank you.

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
