1 MR. SABEER: Good morning. Call to order
2 the meeting of the Philadelphia City
3 Commissioners Board of Elections for
4 Wednesday, April 29th, 2026. This meeting is
5 in compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine
6 Act. Philadelphia City Commissioners are
7 three-member bipartisan board of elected
8 officials in charge of elections and voter
9 registrations for the City of Philadelphia.

10 Each commissioner is elected to serve a
11 four-year term that coincides with the
12 municipal election cycle for Mayor and City
13 Council. The commissioners set and enforce
14 departmental policies to administer voter
15 registration and conduct elections in
16 accordance with federal and state voter
17 registration and election laws.

18 The City Commissioners were created by
19 the Pennsylvania assembly in 1711, but they
20 focus on taxation and held various regulatory
21 powers throughout the centuries. The
22 commissioners started maintaining voter lists
23 in 1799 and took on more election-related
24 responsibilities but didn't emerge in its
25 current form until the adoption of

1 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter in 1951.

2 We will start off with public comments.
3 Before beginning their comments, commoners
4 will state where they live or if they are not
5 a resident of Philadelphia and that they are
6 Philadelphia taxpayers. Public comment is not
7 an opportunity for dialogue or Q&A. It is
8 public comment, a chance for you to tell us
9 what you think. Each speaker will have two
10 minutes to speak, however, I may extend the
11 time at my discretion.

12 Public comment must concern matters on
13 today's meeting agenda. Finally, it is my
14 responsibility to preserve the order and
15 decorum of the meetings as such
16 (indiscernible), slanderous, discriminatory,
17 personal attacks will not be tolerated. If
18 you wish to make a public objection to a
19 perceived Sunshine Act violation, please raise
20 your hand, and I will recognize you.
21 Outbursts will not be tolerated.

22 Anyone wishing to offer public comment,
23 please step forward.

24 Hearing none, we'll now move to our email
25 report. Secretary Bluestein, are there any

1 email public comments?

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Chairman. As
3 of 9:45 a.m., there were no email public
4 comments.

5 MR. SABEER: Thank you very much. We
6 will now proceed to old business. First, we
7 have report from our Director of Election
8 Operation and Administration, Mr. Joe Lynch
9 and Mark Johnson. Joe, we'll start with you.

10 MR. LYNCH: Sure. Good morning,
11 Commissioners.

12 MR. SABEER: Good morning.

13 MR. LYNCH: This is our public meeting
14 update for April 29th, 2026. At the election
15 warehouse, all units have been busy preparing
16 for the upcoming election. The Voting Machine
17 Service Unit is working on the final test.
18 The E-Poll Book Unit has been finishing
19 preparations for its operations and upcoming
20 testing.

21 The Election Materials Unit has been
22 working to ensure that the supplies needed for
23 all poll workers are ordered, organized, and
24 ready for packing. We currently have six
25 machine demos scheduled. The request form

1 will close on May 3rd and will not be
2 available again until the day after we certify
3 the election.

4 To date, in our voter registration
5 report, we have processed 122,286 voter
6 registration applications. Of those, 21,750
7 were paper and 100,536 were electronic. All
8 applications are up to date and are being
9 reviewed. The last day to register to vote or
10 change your voter registration is Monday, May
11 4th, 2026.

12 Also, the second shipment of street list
13 came in this past Monday. The County Board of
14 Elections approved 77,691 vote by mail
15 applications, which is 4,340 added from last
16 week's total. Of those, 43,134 are paper
17 applications and 34,557 are electronic
18 applications.

19 This includes civilian, overseas,
20 military, and federal voters. They are
21 currently called up on processing. Voters
22 will, will need to complete and, and return
23 their application to the County Board of
24 Elections office by 5:00 p.m. on May 12th to
25 vote by mail for the primary election.

1 Also, as of yesterday, April 28th, 76,321
2 ballots have been sent to voters with 1,265
3 being returned. Those numbers are without 200
4 -- that's without the 231 federal, federal
5 voters being sent ballots with 27 of those
6 being returned.

7 ID verification letters have gone out to
8 voters that either did not include their
9 required proof of identification on their
10 absentee/mail and ballot applications or their
11 proof of identification could not be verified
12 by the County Board of Elections office.

13 Voters who have received this letter may
14 submit their proof of ID to the County Board
15 of Elections via email at phillyelection at
16 phila dot gov, fax, US mail, telephone, or in
17 person. Voters have until midnight on
18 Tuesday, May 26th, to return their proof of
19 identification for the general primary and
20 special election.

21 The County Board of Elections office
22 located in City Hall, Room 140, is open for,
23 for in-person mail ballot services. Voters
24 can request an absentee, mail in, or
25 replacement ballot in person -- return it all

1 in the same visit. Office hours are 9:00 a.m.
2 to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Friday,
3 May 8th, 2026, is the deadline for the filing
4 cycle -- second Friday, Pre-Primary Campaign
5 Finance Reports.

6 All candidates, committees, political
7 action committees, or a committee contributing
8 to candidates for office that had made
9 expenditures to influence the City's election
10 must file a report. The Board Workers Unit
11 has been conducting their spring training
12 seminars with 3,020 in person participants and
13 696 online participants so far.

14 Both the online training and the in-
15 person spring training seminar scheduled are
16 available on our website at vote dot phila dot
17 gov. Weekly reminders will be sent out to
18 those who have not yet attended our training
19 sessions. Currently, 7,326 poll workers have
20 been confirmed to work for the -- at our
21 polling locations. 450 confirmation messages
22 have been sent to our poll workers.

23 Also, 618 applications have been received
24 for Involved at 17 Program of which 392 have
25 been processed and trained. Satellite

1 elections offices are currently assisting the
2 public. Offices are open Monday through
3 Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and Saturday
4 and Sunday schedule is 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
5 That's all I have, Commissioners. Thank you.

6 MR. SABEER: Thank you, Joe. Feister
7 Dilley (phonetic), did you have any questions?

8 MS. DILLEY: I have none. Thank you.

9 MR. SABEER: Secretary Bluestein, did you
10 have any questions?

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: I do have one question
12 for Joe, Chairman.

13 Joe, do we have an update on the couple
14 dropboxes that have been offline because of
15 the camera?

16 MR. LYNCH: Yes, I'm glad you asked me
17 about that. There are still two, two camera
18 issues out at Pleasant Rec (phonetic) and the
19 Jimmy O' Connor Recreation Center. IT
20 department's working on -- currently they're
21 working with the camera guys to try and get
22 them up and working.

23 And obviously, Vogt Playground was taken
24 out of the -- that's taken offline because of
25 construction. So yeah. But thanks for the

1 heads-up. Sorry about that. I should have
2 put that in my report.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Okay. So thank you, Joe.

4 MR. LYNCH: And I'll tell you what? I
5 will send it in. I'll follow up with IT this
6 morning and see what's going on with that, and
7 I'll get back to you.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you.

9 MR. LYNCH: All right.

10 MR. SABEER: And real quick, so is all of
11 that pretty much updated on the website?

12 MR. LYNCH: Yes, it, it is updated on the
13 website. Yes.

14 MR. SABEER: Thank you.

15 Good morning, Mark.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning, Commissioner.
17 All right. From election administration side,
18 as we get closer towards the primary election,
19 all units have been focused on move from just
20 planning to actual execution. Human resources
21 continues to maintain a strong focus on
22 workforce readiness and compliance.

23 This week, the primary focus is on
24 ensuring all staff are up to date on required
25 annual and mandatory City trainings. HR is

1 continuing to streamline onboarding materials
2 to improve efficiencies as we scale
3 operations, and workforce planning and budget
4 alignment for staffing remains ongoing. As a
5 whole, our total employees are 195, 30 exempt,
6 165 civil servant employees.

7 Temporary staffing has increased to 21 in
8 support of the primary election. Overall, HR
9 remains in a strong position as you move into
10 peak operational periods. And we were able to
11 onboard almost all the staffing individuals
12 into the right locations to make sure they
13 have access to the things they need to get
14 their jobs done.

15 Communications this week --
16 communications focused heavily on the rollout
17 of key election milestones including mail
18 ballot availability and upcoming voter
19 registration deadlines. A successful press
20 conference was held on April 27th at SEO3,
21 supported by strong content development,
22 partner coordination, and follow-up.

23 Communication supported SEO openings and
24 mail ballots sent out messaging across both
25 web and social platforms. Updates and talking

1 points for the 2026 primary were developed and
2 compiled including coordination with the Law
3 Department and Mayor's Office to ensure
4 alignment.

5 Continued expansion of advertising,
6 social media content, and toolkits to support
7 voter education and amplify messaging across
8 City partners. I believe I've gone to most of
9 the SEOs to make sure that at least from a
10 security standpoint they were open and people
11 have what they needed, and for the most part,
12 they were functioning well.

13 Additional efforts include vendor
14 coordination for ballot, mail ballot tracking,
15 ongoing language access reporting and planning
16 for upcoming voter registration initiative.
17 Overall, communication continues to play a
18 critical role ensuring the public is informed,
19 engaged, and prepared for the upcoming
20 election.

21 From an IT standpoint, IT continues to
22 operate at a high level and remains fully
23 aligned with election execution. All Bellator
24 laptops have been delivered ensuring full
25 operation readiness across SEOs. Time clock

1 installation, I believe, was completed
2 yesterday across all our offices -- are in
3 progress -- well, they were in progress, but I
4 believe they were completed last night.

5 All full (indiscernible) data pool is
6 scheduled for today in support of system
7 accuracy and readiness. The RF you can see
8 work in warehouses. The RFID strut system has
9 been installed and is pending network
10 activation by OIT, which will enhance asset
11 tracking and chain-of-custody visibility,
12 which will be very important during this
13 upcoming election.

14 IT continues to maintain the commission's
15 infrastructure and support staff across all
16 operational areas. Field operations and
17 system deployment remains aligned with
18 election timeline with no disruptions to
19 service. There are currently no reported
20 challenges or critical issues from an IT
21 standpoint, and operations are running as
22 expected with both election tasks and daily
23 functions proceeding smoothly.

24 As a side note, we did bring some of our
25 IT staff and met with the City police for

1 their bag-and-stick operation. And I believe
2 we're currently better aligned as we move
3 forward to the changes that we're going to
4 make for delivery -- for, for that bag-and-
5 stick (phonetic) operation on the night of
6 election.

7 Voter engagement continues to be strong
8 and consistent across the City. Outreach
9 events across libraries, senior centers, and
10 community organizations continue to deliver
11 voter awareness and education. Strong
12 engagement with multilingual communities with
13 continued emphasis on accessibility and
14 resource distribution.

15 Teams are actively addressing voter
16 questions related to mail-in ballots,
17 registration, primary participation. And
18 upcoming events this week and next continues
19 to expand our reach across key communities and
20 demographics. Despite some weather-related
21 cancellation, the team remains adaptable and
22 continue to build strong community
23 partnerships.

24 From a budget and finance standpoint, we
25 continue to monitor election-related

1 expenditures. If we move forward into the
2 primary cycle, coordination remains ongoing to
3 ensure all operation needs, staffing,
4 equipment, outreach. And communications are
5 properly supported and budget alignments
6 continues across departments to ensure
7 resources are positioned effectively during
8 this peak period.

9 As a side note, we've done really well
10 with making sure our vendors have either given
11 us a quote what they're expected to spend
12 during this election period. And so
13 hopefully, we won't be able to carry a lot of
14 -- we'll be able to pay most of our vendors
15 for the services they participated during
16 election prior to the next budget cycle.

17 I can't say it's going to be 100 percent
18 because we can't control. Sometimes the
19 vendors don't put in their -- vendors --
20 their, their vouchers quick enough. But we
21 have -- vendors are good. And they're
22 cooperating fully with us to make sure that
23 they get -- we get what we need and they get
24 compensated accordingly.

25 And from a security standpoint, we have

1 second to last bi-weekly security partners
2 meeting scheduled for this Thursday where we
3 continue coordination with law enforcement
4 public safety partners. We recently met with
5 Philadelphia Police Department as I met at
6 police headquarters.

7 They're already on our line. We should
8 have our -raining for -- the police for as far
9 as the bag-and-stick operation has been
10 scheduled. I believe it's going to be May
11 13th. There'd be two sessions as always.

12 Contract security coverage went well for
13 Monday. That's when we had security at all
14 the SEOs and City Hall and DSG that -- believe
15 that went well. We only had one hiccup at one
16 SEO where the guard came in super late, but
17 that had -- that was addressed. And we also
18 met with our security contractor yesterday as
19 far as to make sure that we are handling how
20 we exchange information at their location.

21 Electronic access system are currently
22 being installed on the sixth floor of DSG
23 further strengthening our facility security.
24 So yesterday, they were completing the task,
25 but they haven't -- it's not 100 percent, so

1 it's not activated yet.

2 But it should be activated by sometime
3 next week. So now we'll have our offices at
4 least DSG and all the satellite office will be
5 on the same system. They'll be able to badge
6 in. We'll be able to control our, our
7 facilities a lot better from a security
8 standpoint, ensure our employees are protected
9 properly. And that's all I have.

10 MR. SABEER: Thank you, Mark.

11 Vice Chair Dilley, do you have any
12 questions?

13 MS. DILLEY: Thank you. I have none.

14 MR. SABEER: Secretary Bluestein?

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. I don't have
16 any questions.

17 MR. SABEER: Thank you, Mark. Again, I'd
18 like to say thank you -- again, you, Joe,
19 everybody else in the department.
20 Professionalism has been excellent.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.

22 MR. SABEER: That is our last item on the
23 agenda before we adjourn. Vice Chair Dilley,
24 do you have any other business to be raised at
25 this meeting?

1 MS. DILLEY: Thank you. I have none.

2 MR. SABEER: Secretary Bluestein, do you
3 have any business to be raised in this
4 meeting?

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I don't have anything to
6 add. Thank you.

7 MR. SABEER: Hearing no other business, a
8 motion to adjourn today's meeting. Is there a
9 second?

10 MS. DILLEY: Second.

11 MR. SABEER: Secretary Bluestein, please
12 call the roll.

13 MR. LYNCH: Vice Chair Dilley.

14 MS. DILLEY: I.

15 MR. LYNCH: I vote I. Chairman Sabeer.

16 MR. SABEER: I. This meeting is
17 adjourned.

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
