8	a three-member bipartisan Board of elected officials
9	in charge of elections and voter registrations for the
10	county of Philadelphia.

- 7 It is public comment, a chance for you to tell us
- 8 what you think. Each speaker will have two minutes to
- 9 speak, however, I may extend the time at my
- 10 discretion. Public comment must concern matters on
- 11 today's meeting agenda. Finally, slanderous,
- 12 discriminatory, personal attacks will not be
- 13 tolerated. If you wish to make a public objection to
- 14 the perceived Sunshine violation, please raise your
- 15 hand and I will recognize you. Outbursts will not be
- 16 tolerated.
- 17 Anyone wishing to offer public comment, please
- 18 step forward. Hearing no public comment, we will now
- 19 move to report from Secretary Bluestein for emailed
- 20 public comments. Secretary Bluestein, are there
- 21 emailed public comments?
- MR. BLUESTEIN: There were no public comments
- 23 emailed by 9:45 a.m.
- MR. SABIR: Thank you. We will now proceed to
- 25 Old Business. We have a report from our Directors of

- 1 Election Administration and Operation, which will be
- 2 reported by Joseph Lynch and Stephanie Reid.
- 3 MR. LYNCH: Good morning, Commissioners.
- 4 MR. SABIR: Good morning.
- 5 MR. LYNCH: We're just working on finalizing the
- 6 primary election. It's coming to an end and gearing
- 7 up for the November election. Looking forward to
- 8 that, and looking forward to working with all three
- 9 commissioners offices and their staffs. Thank you.
- 10 MS. REID: Good morning, Commissioners.
- 11 Likewise, we're looking forward to working with all of
- 12 you and your staffs. And I just want to say again, a
- 13 deep thank you to all of you and to all of our staff
- 14 who have been working tirelessly for the last,
- 15 honestly now, four or five weeks, having the
- 16 opportunity to stand out there with them and do some
- 17 of these tasks. They really truly are the heroes of
- 18 democracy. So just want to be sure that they know how
- 19 much we appreciate them.
- 20 MR. SABIR: Thank you. Vice chair Deeley, did
- 21 you have any questions?
- MS. DEELEY: I do not.
- 23 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you have any
- 24 questions?
- MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

- 1 MR. SABIR: We will now move to the next agenda
- 2 item. Mail ballot sufficiency determination is made
- 3 by our Supervisor of Elections, Dana Eckroade.
- 4 MS. ECKROADE: Good morning, Commissioners.
- 5 MR. SABIR: Good morning, Dana.
- 6 MS. ECKROADE: So we're going to start with
- 7 missing signature for the mail and ballot sufficiency
- 8 determination for the 2024 general primary. So for a
- 9 missing signature, we had 701 ballots returned.
- 10 MR. SABIR: I'm sorry, can you say that number
- 11 again?
- 12 MS. ECKROADE: 701.
- MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I have a few questions
- 14 for Dana.
- 15 MR. SABIR: Sure.
- 16 MS. DEELEY: Dana, it's my understanding that
- 17 this category includes the blank ballots, for example,
- 18 ballots neither signed nor dated that were previously
- 19 reported as its own separate category, not just those
- 20 missing, only a signature. Is that correct?
- MS. ECKROADE: Yes, that is correct.
- 22 MS. DEELEY: I believe that in 2020 -- in the
- 23 2023 general, this would have been about 142 ballots,
- 24 and in the primary, it would have been about 114
- 25 ballots. Does that sound correct?

- 1 MS. ECKROADE: That is correct.
- MS. DEELEY: So we saw about a five time increase
- 3 in voters not signing their ballots?
- 4 MS. ECKROADE: That's correct.
- 5 MS. DEELEY: Thank you, Dana.
- 6 MS. ECKROADE: You're welcome.
- 7 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman brief -- thank you.
- 8 MR. SABIR: Vice Chair Deeley, is there something
- 9 that you want to add?
- 10 MS. DEELEY: Nothing further.
- 11 MR. SABIR: Good.
- 12 MS. ECKROADE: Okay. So ballots not enclosed in
- 13 secrecy envelope we had 555.
- MR. SABIR: All right. So for each category,
- 15 Dana, we're going to do a motion for each one and
- 16 we're going to vote on each category.
- 17 MS. ECKROADE: Okay.
- 18 MR. SABIR: Okay.
- 19 MS. ECKROADE: Do you want to start over?
- 20 MR. SABIR: No, just hold tight. You got it.
- 21 Secretary Bluestein, did you want to ask Dana a
- 22 question on that topic?
- 23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no questions for this
- 24 topic. Thank you.
- 25 MR. SABIR: Okay. I motion that this Board does

- 1 not accept ballots with a missing signature. Is there
- 2 a second.
- 3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.
- 4 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman.
- 5 MR. SABIR: Hold on, hold on, hold on. Vice
- 6 Chair Deeley. You want to make a comment before we
- 7 vote on this?
- 8 MS. DEELEY: Yeah. I have a brief remark on the
- 9 motion, please.
- 10 MR. SABIR: Sure.
- 11 MS. DEELEY: I know that much was made about the
- 12 redesign of the envelopes, and the new design has done
- 13 a tremendous job addressing the missing date category.
- 14 But I think we need to take another look at the
- 15 signature line because we cannot have these kind of
- 16 numbers of voters whose vote is set aside for failing
- 17 to sign their ballot. If nothing is done, this
- 18 category will be in the thousands in November. That's
- 19 when we will see a much higher demand of the mail
- 20 ballots. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I vote. Yeah, I
- 21 vote.
- 22 MR. SABIR: Okay. All right. So the motion was
- 23 on the floor. It was seconded by Secretary Bluestein,
- 24 and now we're going to go to vote. Secretary
- 25 Bluestein, please call the roll.

- 1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.
- 2 MS. DEELEY: Aye.
- 3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- 4 MR. SABIR: Aye. Okay. Dana, you can go to the
- 5 next category.
- 6 MS. ECKROADE: Ballots not enclosed in secrecy
- 7 envelope 555.
- 8 MR. SABIR: Secretary -- I'm sorry. Vice Chair
- 9 Deeley, did you want to make a comment on this one?
- 10 MS. DEELEY: I do not. Thank you.
- 11 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you want me
- 12 to comment on this?
- 13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I do not.
- MR. SABIR: Okay. I motion that this Board does
- 15 not accept ballots that are not enclosed in a secrecy
- 16 envelope. Is there a second?
- 17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.
- 18 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 19 roll.
- 20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- 21 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- 22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- 23 MR. SABIR: Aye. Dana, we can move to the next
- 24 category.
- MS. ECKROADE: Missing date, 164.

- 1 MR. SABIR: Okay. Vice Chair Deeley, do you have
- 2 to make a comment on this motion.
- 3 MS. DEELEY: I have no questions for Dana. But I
- 4 do have a remark on the motion once you're ready.
- 5 MR. SABIR: That's fine. You want to come -- go
- 6 ahead. Vice Chair Deeley, you can make your comment.
- 7 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.
- 8 MR. SABIR: Sure.
- 9 MS. DEELEY: I have long maintained that whether
- 10 or not the voter writes a date on the envelope, it is
- 11 not material in determining whether or not such
- 12 individual is qualified under state law to vote in
- 13 such election. However, this has been the subject of
- 14 a multiyear federal legal battle which we were a party
- 15 advancing this argument. Yesterday, the Third Circuit
- 16 issued an order denying our petition for rehearing. I
- 17 still believe we were correct and that the count --
- 18 and that the court erred.
- 19 But with the recent Third Circuit opinion and the
- 20 makeup of the Supreme Court, we appear to be towards
- 21 the end of our battles in court. The only avenue left
- 22 is for the legislature to finally fix this, put
- 23 partisanship aside and do what is best for the voters.
- Once again, I would like to applaud the redesign
- 25 of the envelope for dramatically reducing this

- 1 category. Previously, this was our largest category,
- 2 with 1,944 in last year's general and 1,539 in the
- 3 primary. Thank you.
- 4 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you want to
- 5 make a comment?
- 6 MR. BLUESTEIN: I would just add that I
- 7 completely agree with Commissioner Deeley. And
- 8 unfortunately, this category shouldn't even be a
- 9 problem because the dates are not important for
- 10 whether a ballot should or should not be counted. But
- 11 we'll have to move forward with the court decisions we
- 12 have. Thank you.
- 13 MR. SABIR: I motion that this Board does not
- 14 accept ballots with a missing date. Is there a
- 15 second?
- 16 MS. DEELEY: Second.
- 17 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please go to
- 18 roll.
- 19 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- 21 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- 22 MR. SABIR: Aye. Then let's move to the next
- 23 topic.
- MS. ECKROADE: Incorrectly dated, 309.
- MR. SABIR: Okay. Vice Chair Deeley, you want to

- 1 say something about this motion?
- 2 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I have remarks
- 3 on the motion. While the redesign of the ballot did a
- 4 great job in addressing the not dated ballots, I think
- 5 we are falling short with this category. We had 385
- 6 in last year's general when we counted 84,735 mailed
- 7 ballots and 257 in the primary when we counted 72,858
- 8 ballots. This election, we are at 309, but only
- 9 counting 68,317 mailed ballots. So our number is
- 10 about the same with less ballots.
- 11 My observation has been that people do not always
- 12 know the correct number for each month. They would
- 13 write a three or a five for April instead of a four,
- 14 which would put their ballot outside of the date
- 15 range. I would like the staff to consider removing
- 16 the boxes for the month so that voters would have the
- 17 option to write out the month. And like other
- 18 counties prefilling in the year. Thank you.
- 19 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you have
- 20 anything you wanted to add?
- MR. BLUESTEIN: No, thank you.
- 22 MR. SABIR: So I motion that this Board does not
- 23 accept ballots that were incorrectly dated. Is there
- 24 a second?
- 25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

- 1 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 2 roll.
- 3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.
- 4 MS. DEELEY: (No audio)
- 5 MR. SABIR: Go to the next topic, Dana.
- 6 MS. ECKROADE: Date damaged by the post office.
- 7 We have three. This is ballot 1. That's the second
- 8 ballot. And the third ballot.
- 9 MR. SABIR: Okay. Vice Chair Deeley, would you
- 10 make a comment on this?
- 11 MS. DEELEY: I do not, Mr. Chairman.
- MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you want to
- 13 say something?
- MR. BLUESTEIN: I do not.
- 15 MR. SABIR: Okay. I'd like a motion that this
- 16 Board accept ballots with dates that were determined
- 17 to have been damaged by the post office. Is there a
- 18 second?
- 19 MS. DEELEY: Second.
- 20 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 21 roll.
- MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- MR. SABIR: Aye. Dana, you want to go to the

- 1 next topic?
- 2 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification. No Social
- 3 Security number or driver's license on SURE file we
- 4 have four.
- 5 MR. SABIR: Okay. Vice Chair Deeley, would you
- 6 want to make a comment on this motion?
- 7 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Thank you. I
- 8 have a question for Dana. Dana, these voters received
- 9 our ID verification letters and they responded by
- 10 filling out the form that we sent them or contact them
- 11 -- or contacting us in another way, correct?
- 12 MS. ECKROADE: Correct.
- MS. DEELEY: So these voters, it would be
- 14 impossible to verify using the form. They would have
- 15 to send us a copy of their photo ID, correct?
- 16 MS. ECKROADE: That is correct.
- 17 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. Nothing further. Mr.
- 18 Chairman.
- 19 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein.
- 20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Question for Dana. Did the
- 21 voters numbers that they provided fail the initial
- 22 HAVA check?
- MS. ECKROADE: Yes.
- MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, quick comment
- 25 before we have a motion, I would just say that for

- 1 these categories, I rely on section 3146.8 of the
- 2 Election Code where it says in part, "If an elector
- 3 fails to provide proof of identification that can be
- 4 verified by the County Board of Elections by the 6th
- 5 calendar day following the election, then the absentee
- 6 ballot or mail in ballot shall not be counted.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, a
- 8 qualified absentee elector shall not be required to
- 9 provide proof of identification, if the elector is
- 10 entitled to vote by an alternative ballot under the
- 11 voting accessibility for the elderly and canon capped
- 12 act." So my question on this is, have we looked into
- 13 whether the voters in this category and the next
- 14 category meet the criteria under the voting
- 15 accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act, and
- 16 if there are any ballots in this category that do not
- 17 meet that criteria?
- 18 MS. ECKROADE: So we do -- the majority of these
- 19 voters are over the age of 65.
- 20 MR. BLUESTEIN: All of them?
- MS. ECKROADE: All except one.
- 22 MR. BLUESTEIN: So I would just suggest from my
- 23 own perspective that we should only be counting the
- 24 ballots that meet that criteria and not the one ballot
- 25 that doesn't.

- 1 MR. SABIR: So I motion that this Board accepts
- 2 ballots for no Social Security or driver's license or
- 3 SURE file. Is there a second?
- 4 MS. DEELEY: Second.
- 5 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 6 roll.
- 7 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- 8 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- 9 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay. Chairman Sabir?
- 10 MR. SABIR: I vote aye. Dana, you want to go to
- 11 the next topic?
- 12 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification ID provided
- 13 opposite of what is on the SURE file. We have six.
- MR. SABIR: Sure. Vice Chair Deeley.
- MS. DEELEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I do have
- 16 a question for Dana.
- 17 MR. SABIR: Sure.
- 18 MS. DEELEY: These voters received our ID
- 19 verification letters and they responded by filling out
- 20 the form that we sent them or contacting us in another
- 21 way, correct?
- MS. ECKROADE: Correct.
- MS. DEELEY: And they provided the opposite of
- 24 what we needed, correct?
- 25 MS. ECKROADE: Correct.

- 1 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.

- 3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no comments. Thank you,
- 4 sir.
- 5 MR. SABIR: So I motion that this Board accepts
- 6 ballots in which the voter provided information that
- 7 was opposite of what is on SURE file. Is there a
- 8 second?
- 9 MS. DEELEY: Second.
- 10 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 11 roll.
- 12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- 14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay. Chairman Sabir?
- MR. SABIR: Aye. Dana, you want to go to the
- 16 next topic?
- 17 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification. No response.

- 23 ballots when the voter signed the declaration envelope
- 24 in the incorrect location, but properly dated the
- 25 envelope is there a second?

- 3 roll.
- 4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- 5 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

- MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- MR. SABIR: Aye. So, Dana, is there any vote for

- 1 this last category?
- 2 MS. ECKROADE: Yes, we received one right before
- 3 the deadline. So we have one ID verification. ID
- 4 doesn't match the SURE file.
- 5 MR. SABIR: Vice Chair Deeley?
- 6 MS. DEELEY: I have nothing.
- 7 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein?
- 8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have nothing.
- 9 MR. SABIR: I motion that this Board does not
- 10 accept ballots in which the voter submitted
- 11 information that does not match the SURE files. Is
- 12 there a second.
- 13 MS. DEELEY: Second.
- MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the
- 15 roll.
- MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?
- 17 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.
- 18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?
- 19 MR. SABIR: Aye. Thank you, Dana, for all the
- 20 hard work, and that you and your staff do each
- 21 election. I see you up here, I see you at 142. I see
- 22 you getting busy, and I appreciate you and your staff.
- 23 Thank you.
- MS. ECKROADE: Thank you.
- MR. SABIR: We will now move to the other

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- 1 business portion of our agenda. Vice Chair Deeley, do
- 2 you have any other business to be raised at this
- 3 meeting?
- 4 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I'll be just like to
- 5 offer a suggestion for the staff with regard to these
- 6 last few categories where the voter incorrectly filled
- 7 out their envelope by signing the return envelope, the
- 8 return address or whatever. If we could reach out to
- 9 them and just get some feedback from them to see why,
- 10 you know, did they find that the instructions were
- 11 unclear or did they, you know, they didn't read it or,
- 12 you know, it would be interesting to know if they
- 13 could tell us, you know, why they did make that
- 14 mistake.
- 15 And then it would also be good for us to let them
- 16 know that going forward that they did, however, make,
- 17 you know, they should have signed it on their back.
- 18 And, Dana, I echo what the chairman said. Thank you
- 19 for an outstanding job as always, you and your staff.
- 20 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have any
- 21 other business raised at this meeting?
- MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.
- 23 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Commissioners.
