<p style="text-align: right;">Page 3</p> <p>1 P R O C E E D I N G S</p> <p>2 (11:00 a.m.)</p> <p>3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning. I call to order</p> <p>4 the meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioners</p> <p>5 Board of elections for Wednesday, May the 7, 2025.</p> <p>6 This meeting is in compliance with the Pennsylvania</p> <p>7 Sunshine Act. The Philadelphia City Commissioners are</p> <p>8 a three-member bipartisan board of elected officials</p> <p>9 in charge of elections and voter registrations for the</p> <p>10 city of Philadelphia.</p> <p>11 Each commissioner is elected to serve a four-year</p> <p>12 term that coincides with the municipal election cycle</p> <p>13 for mayor and city council. The commissioner set and</p> <p>14 enforce departmental policies to administer voter</p> <p>15 registration and conduct the elections in accordance</p> <p>16 with federal and state voter registration laws --</p> <p>17 election laws.</p> <p>18 The city commissioners were created by the</p> <p>19 Pennsylvania assembly in 1711 with a focus on taxation</p> <p>20 and/or various regulatory powers throughout the</p> <p>21 centuries. The commissioners started maintaining</p> <p>22 voter lists in 1799 and took on more election related</p> <p>23 responsibilities, but didn't emerge in its current</p> <p>24 form until the adoption of Philadelphia's Home Rule</p> <p>25 Charter in 1951.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 5</p> <p>1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you very much. We will</p> <p>2 now proceed to old business. First we have report</p> <p>3 from our director of operation, Mr. Joseph Lynch.</p> <p>4 MR. LYNCH: Morning commissioners.</p> <p>5 (Good morning.)</p> <p>6 MR. LYNCH: Our report for public meeting for May</p> <p>7 7th for our voter registration report for the current</p> <p>8 election cycle, we have processed 102,013 voter</p> <p>9 registration applications of which 4,550 were</p> <p>10 submitted on paper. Delaware and Spring Gardener is</p> <p>11 currently reviewing all applications and correcting</p> <p>12 any mistakes as necessary. The final 5,305 ID cards</p> <p>13 will be mailed out today.</p> <p>14 The county board of elections as of Tuesday we</p> <p>15 approved 70,608 vote by mail and absentee applications</p> <p>16 which is 4,111 added from last week's total. Of those</p> <p>17 40,345 are paper applications and 30,263 are</p> <p>18 electronic applications. This includes military and</p> <p>19 civilian overseas voters. All processing is currently</p> <p>20 up to date.</p> <p>21 On May 5th, 2025, we sent out our first initial</p> <p>22 mailing of ballots. We have sent out 68,933 ballots</p> <p>23 for the 2025 municipal primary and special election.</p> <p>24 Our satellite office in city hall room 140 is now</p> <p>25 open. Voters can request a mail in or replacement</p>


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<p style="text-align: right;">Page 6</p> <p>1 ballot in person and return it all on the same visit. 2 Office hours are Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 3 5:00 p.m. 4 Voters who will like to vote by mail for the May 5 20 municipal primary and special election can also 6 apply for a mail in or absentee ballot at 7 vote.phila.gov. The deadline to apply is Tuesday, May 8 13th at 5:00 p.m. (clears throat) Excuse me. 9 Satellite election offices satellites 1 through 10 10 are also open. Office hours are 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 11 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. 12 on Saturday and Sunday. These locations also offer 13 mail ballot services -- mail-in ballot services. 14 Friday, May 19, 2025 is the deadline for filing 15 cycle 2 second Friday preprimary campaign finance 16 reports. All candidates, committees, political 17 committees, or a committee contributing to candidates 18 for office that have made expenditures to influence a 19 city election must file a report. 20 ID verification letters have gone out to voters 21 that either did not include the required proof of 22 identification on or absentee mail-in ballot 23 application or their proof of identification cannot be 24 verified by the county board of elections office. 25 Voters who have received this letter may submit</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 8</p> <p>1 will begin by considering our first agenda item, a 2 motion to approve 2025 primary election ballot canvas 3 procedures. Is there a second? 4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second. 5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Does anyone wish to make a 6 comment before we proceed to vote? 7 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I would like to 8 motion to table this question so that the staff may 9 have time to undo the change that was made to the 10 credentialing procedure. A change which is 11 unnecessary and will make it harder for watchers and 12 the parties to get their credentials. 13 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. So we have our director 14 of safety and security here, Mark Johnson. He made a 15 recommendation at deputy's meeting. Mark, you want to 16 come on up and explain why you made the 17 recommendation? 18 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning, commissioners. 19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Hold on. Make sure -- hold on. 20 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning, commissioners. 21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning, Mark. 22 MR. JOHNSON: Is there a question -- a particular 23 question? 24 MS. DEELEY: I have a motion on the table, but I 25 don't have a question.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 7</p> <p>1 their proof of ID to the county board of elections via 2 email at phillyelections@phila.gov, fax, US mail, 3 telephone, or in person. 4 Voters have until midnight May 27th to return 5 their proof of identification for the municipal 6 primary and special election. The board workers unit 7 is continuing our spring training sessions and 2,737 8 poll workers have attended the trainings. 9 Online, online training is available. So far 882 10 have completed the training online. Thanks to the 11 involved 17 program we have -- we have placed 305 12 students as board workers. We will continue 13 confirming poll workers for the election. We've 14 already received confirmations for 7,866 poll workers. 15 Thank you. That's all I have. 16 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you Joe. Vice Chair 17 Deeley, do you have any questions? 18 MS. DEELEY: I have none. 19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have 20 any questions? 21 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you. 22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thanks Joe. 23 MR. LYNCH: Thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: This completes our old business 25 for today. We will now proceed to new business. We</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 9</p> <p>1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. I will -- no, I 2 understand. Before we even get to the motion part, 3 whether we second or not, I just wanted to let our 4 director -- because I'm saying that he -- what you're 5 referring to, he made a recommendation to the change 6 about the credentialing. So I wanted to let him sort 7 of explain that, why he did it. 8 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Traditionally and in the 9 past for credentialing approval, any party or 10 individual candidate could recommend observer or 11 watcher who could ask for credentials to come and 12 observe operations here at the warehouse. 13 Their option was they -- I mean, their actions 14 would have to be, they would make the request to our 15 office. We would approve it or deny it. They would 16 go to the 8th district police district in which we 17 would have some city (indiscernible) walker, some 18 part-time tenants working down there who would 19 distribute those preprinted badges to them and they 20 would show up at the front gate with their, some type 21 of government ID and their preprinted credential, and 22 they would be allowed access to a building. 23 So with that process through, my assessment is 24 there was two problems. Our preprinted badges did not 25 have a picture, they didn't have any unique</p>

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<p style="text-align: right;">Page 10</p> <p>1 identifications on it. So -- and we were preprinting 2 them in advance. So for example, last year -- I 3 think, last election we printed some close to a little 4 over 1,100 or 1300 badges. We only gave out 217 which 5 left 1,000 badges just floating around the city that 6 we have no idea where they went and who they belonged 7 to.</p> <p>8 In my changes, the only thing I did in our 9 changes is that we supplemented actually passing out 10 IDs to individuals, actual credentials, we've given 11 them an email stating that you have the right to come 12 to our campus to observe elections. And when you get 13 here then we will issue a badge after you come in and 14 take a picture with you -- picture of you so we can 15 put on a badge that actually meet best practices when 16 it comes to security.</p> <p>17 Outside of that, we didn't make any additional 18 changes. The other change we made was instead of 19 giving it out at the 8th district with employees that 20 we really don't know, temp workers, and I believe we 21 would have anywhere from two to three at the 8th 22 district, passing these badges out in bulk to people 23 that they don't know. We're a soft target, so we 24 don't really know these people and we don't have the 25 ability to vet observers and watchers before they get</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 12</p> <p>1 of retiring I was asked to return. I did two more 2 years. I worked as the director of safety and 3 security for Girard College for a few years. A 4 private contractor -- a security contractor that did a 5 lot of schools and private government contracts -- 6 government, what do you call those -- hospitals and 7 manufacturing plants here locally.</p> <p>8 I was the police chief at Cheyney University and 9 then I came here. I'm also certified by the American 10 Society of Industrial Security as a certified security 11 professional. I met those four standards and now I'm 12 here.</p> <p>13 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. So you're basically 14 not a rent-a-cop?</p> <p>15 MR. JOHNSON: No, I'm not.</p> <p>16 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Has some, some great credentials 17 and from your recommendation, is basically going to 18 save our department more money and make the policies 19 and procedures a little more safety for us.</p> <p>20 MR. JOHNSON: And I also want to -- I also want 21 to say I do understand that, you know, just based on 22 prior history, a lot of you guys -- this is my -- you 23 know, I, I don't -- the elections are new to me, so I 24 did want to make sure that I understood the concerns 25 of particularly the commissioners. And I -- and I</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 11</p> <p>1 here.</p> <p>2 In my mind, it's a cost savings because we can do 3 a lot of that in-house. We could print less badges. 4 We have more oversight of who we give it to and we get 5 firsthand observations of who these people are, and we 6 can do it with less personnel because it's inside of 7 our space.</p> <p>8 So I believe -- my recommendation, I believe 9 those changes, one is more -- makes us more secure and 10 is more efficient from a cost. I believe there might 11 be some issue with how we administratively implemented 12 this.</p> <p>13 So if there's any questions about that -- but I 14 believe I engaged, I mean, most of the commissioners, 15 at least all the deputies, verbally in person before 16 requesting that we present this as at the deputies 17 meeting, in which I wrote it up and I presented it at 18 the deputies meeting.</p> <p>19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. And what -- just, I 20 guess, for the record, you know, like, what was like 21 your background before you was a director of safety?</p> <p>22 MR. JOHNSON: My professional background?</p> <p>23 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Yeah. Work experience.</p> <p>24 MR. JOHNSON: I retired from the FBI after 25 to 25 27 years because I retired once and after four months</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13</p> <p>1 think that's why I verbally engaged everyone, just get 2 an idea of what your concern is. And one of the major 3 concerns was, they want to make sure that -- you guys 4 wanted to make sure that when people come on campus, 5 we at least have some idea, at least during that 6 election period, of who they are. If it was me I 7 probably would have made some additional changes if, 8 if I -- if I existed in a vacuum. But I realized I do 9 not exist in a vacuum.</p> <p>10 So without tipping over the apple cart 11 completely, I really felt a reasonable -- a reasonable 12 change would be -- instead of just giving out the 13 badges, let's give out an email and have them vet. I 14 think it's important that we can control those 15 credentials and we make sure the credentials are -- 16 they're not hard to duplicate, but to make them as 17 difficult to duplicate as possible and be able to 18 account for them when we give them out.</p> <p>19 So instead of giving out 1,300 let's only give 20 out 50 and we only going to have 50 people here 21 because they're physically here. So I just thought 22 that was just a reasonable -- a reasonable adjustment 23 to our, our policy as a whole.</p> <p>24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. Does anyone want to 25 second Lisa Deeley's motion? Okay. Hearing no second</p>

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<p style="text-align: right;">Page 14</p> <p>1 we will now proceed to vote. Secretary Bluestein, 2 please call the roll. 3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley. 4 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I would like to just 5 respectfully speak on the motion. So I have expressed 6 to the staff numerous times in my opposition to the 7 change in the credential procedures. I believe that 8 it will make it much harder for watchers and the 9 parties to get their credentials. Plus it brings 10 possible conflict, 317 people possibly, back to our 11 doorstep. 12 We learned what works for credential distribution 13 and what does not work during the 2020 election. Our 14 previous procedures reflected that and a change is not 15 warranted. I was asked for -- I respectfully 16 requested a meeting with stakeholders so that they 17 would have -- they would be aware of the possible 18 change and we could address any issues and they could 19 have been discussed. That meeting never took place 20 and therefore I will be voting no. 21 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir. 22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Motion passes. Next item 23 on our agenda. 24 MR. JOHNSON: Allowed to leave? 25 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Just stick around -- just stick</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 16</p> <p>1 certainly, we do respect your -- all that -- all that 2 experience and the work that you do here. So, please, 3 don't believe that there's anything other than that. 4 I just also feel as though the experience that we 5 bring to bear to this, you know, should also have some 6 weight. And I would just like to state for the record 7 my opposition to the language in the notice that was 8 included with the initial mailing of the mail ballots. 9 That's it, Mr. Chairman.
