CHAIR: Called to order the meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioners Return Board for Friday, May 29, 2026. This meeting is in compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.

Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three member bipartisan board of elected officials in charge of elections and voter registrations for the City of Philadelphia. Each Commissioner is elected to serve a four-year term that coincides with the municipal election cycle for Mayor and City Council.

The Commissioners set and enforce departmental policies to administer voter registration and conduct elections in accordance with federal state voter registration election laws.

City Commissioners were created by The Pennsylvania Assembly 1711 with a focus on taxation. Held various regulatory congress throughout the centuries. The Commissioners started maintaining voter lists in 1799. Took on more election-related responsibilities. Didn't emerge into its current form until the adoption of

1 Philadelphia Home Charter 1951.

2 We start off with public comments. Before  
3 beginning their comments, commenters shall state  
4 where they live or if they're not a resident of  
5 Philadelphia and that they are a Philadelphia  
6 taxpayer.

7 Public comment is not an opportunity for  
8 dialogue or Q and A. This public comment is a  
9 chance for you to tell us what you think. Each  
10 speaker will have two minutes to speak. However,  
11 I may extend the time at my discretion. Public  
12 comment must concern matters on today's meeting  
13 agenda.

14 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve  
15 the order and decorum of the meetings as such  
16 profane, slanderous, discriminatory, personal  
17 attacks will not be tolerated. If you wish to  
18 make a public objection to a perceived Sunshine  
19 Act violation, please raise your hand and I will  
20 recognize you. Outbursts will not be tolerated.

21 Anyone wishing to offer public comment,  
22 please step forward. Having none we will now  
23 proceed to email comments.

24 Secretary Bluestein, were there any email  
25 public comments?

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: As of 10:45 a.m. there were  
2 no email public comments.

3 CHAIR: We will now proceed to new business.  
4 We begin by considering our first agenda item  
5 under new business. Provisional ballot  
6 sufficiency determination. These categories will  
7 be presented by our Board of Registration  
8 Administrator, Kevin Richardson.

9 MR. RICHARDSON: Good morning,  
10 Commissioners. Okay. Our first category is, we  
11 have 18 ballots that had no board worker  
12 signatures on them at all.

13 CHAIR: I move that this board counts  
14 provisional ballots in this category. Is there a  
15 second?

16 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, if I may?  
17 Remarks on the motion. It is the board members'  
18 responsibility to sign their section of the  
19 provisional ballot envelope. I do not believe  
20 that the voters should be disenfranchised for  
21 mistakes made by election board workers.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I please  
23 ask, Kevin ---?

24 CHAIR: Yes, you may.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, are there any

1 questions about the chain of custody of these  
2 ballots?

3 MR. RICHARDSON: None.

4 CHAIR: Is there a second?

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

6 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the  
7 roll.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

9 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

11 Chairman Sabir.

12 CHAIR: Aye.

13 Please proceed.

14 MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. The next category is  
15 not in the system. Staff determined the people  
16 were not registered. We have 115 ballots.

17 CHAIR: I move that this board does not  
18 count provisional ballots in this category. Is  
19 there a second?

20 MS. DEELEY: Second.

21 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the  
22 rule.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

24 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

25 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

1 Chairman Sabir?

2 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

3 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is  
4 registered out of county. We have 150 ballots.

5 CHAIR: I move that this board does not  
6 count provisional ballots in this category. Is  
7 there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

10 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

12 Chairman Sabir?

13 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

14 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is the  
15 voter has been canceled. There's 20 ballots.

16 CHAIR: I move that this Board does not  
17 count out original ballots in this category. Is  
18 there a second?

19 MS. DEELEY: Second.

20 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
21 roll.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

23 MS. DEELEY: Ayes.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

25 Chairman Sabir?

1 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

2 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is where  
3 the staff determined that the voter vote in person  
4 at the polling place. We have 46 ballots.

5 CHAIR: I move that this board does not  
6 count provisional ballots in this category. Is  
7 there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 CHAIR: Mr. Bluestein, please call the roll.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

11 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

13 Chairman Sabir?

14 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

15 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is where  
16 the voter had a mail-in ballot that was already  
17 counted. There were 17 ballots.

18 CHAIR: I move that this Board does not  
19 count provisional ballots in this category. Is  
20 there a second?

21 MS. DEELEY: Second.

22 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call  
23 roll.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

25 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

2 Chairman Sabir?

3 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

4 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is where  
5 the voter failed to sign the provisional ballot.

6 CHAIR: I move that this Board does not  
7 count provisional ballots in this category. Is  
8 there a second?

9 MS. DEELEY: Second.

10 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call the  
11 roll.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

13 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

15 Chairman Sabir?

16 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

17 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category is where  
18 the voter only signed once on the provisional  
19 ballot. There was 45 ballots.

20 CHAIR: Vice Chair Deeley, do you want to  
21 make a comment?

22 MS. DEELEY: Yes. I have questions for  
23 Kevin on this category.

24 CHAIR: Please proceed.

25 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, was there a signature on

1 the envelope?

2 MR. RICHARDSON: There was one voter  
3 signature on the envelope. Yes.

4 MS. DEELEY: Was the staff able to compare  
5 that signature to the registered voter in the SURE  
6 system.

7 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, they were.

8 MS. DEELEY: In all cases, the signature was  
9 determined to be genuine?

10 MR. RICHARDSON: That is correct.

11 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, did all the voters in  
12 this category sign on the left side and not on the  
13 right side? Or did some sign on the right and not  
14 on the left?

15 MR. RICHARDSON: Some on the left, some on  
16 the right.

17 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I would like to  
18 request this category be broken out into two  
19 different votes. One that deals with the voters  
20 that signed in location one, but not two. And  
21 another for voters that signed in two, but not  
22 one.

23 The reason for this is because in RE canvas  
24 of provisional ballots in the 2024 primary  
25 election, it deals with the former and there has

1 not been a case that deals with the left. Each  
2 has offered a different line of the election.

3 Thank you.

4 CHAIR: Need a second. Second?

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, I'll second  
6 the Vice Chair's motion. I have no problem with  
7 swinging at the two separate motions in this  
8 voting on the ballots.

9 CHAIR: Okay.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I don't have a problem with  
11 it.

12 CHAIR: What's the ---?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Do you have those numbers,  
14 Kevin.

15 MR. RICHARDSON: No, I don't.

16 CHAIR: So let's take a --- let's take a  
17 five-minute recess. Let's break everything up.  
18 Come back.

19 ---

20 (WHEREUPON, A PAUSE IN THE RECORD WAS HELD.)

21 ---

22 MR. RICHARDSON: Okay. Commissioners, we  
23 did the breakdown. It turns out there's 45  
24 signatures on the left, zero on the right.

25 CHAIR: So I believe that this board does

1 not count violence in both categories. Is there a  
2 second?

3 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, may I make  
4 remarks on the motion?

5 CHAIR: Sure.

6 MS. DEELEY: My previous statements apply  
7 here, but as I stated earlier, the court case that  
8 created this category only deals with the voters  
9 who signed in line one, but not line two. Those  
10 voters ran a PAL of 25 PS3050. These voters  
11 complied with line three around a failed line two.  
12 It is a difference. While it's very technical,  
13 there is not a case that applies here. As Kevin  
14 stated, these voters were determined to be  
15 genuine, qualified voters. I believe that these  
16 voters should not be disenfranchised. Thank you.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Chairman, I'll second the  
18 motion.

19 CHAIR: Please call roll.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

21 MS. DEELEY: No.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

23 CHAIR: Aye. Please proceed.

24 MR. RICHARDSON: Okay.

25 The next category is we had one federal

1 voter tried to vote by provisional bail. There  
2 was one federal voter. No ballots were in the  
3 declaration envelope. There were three of those  
4 and there were 18 naked ballots.

5 CHAIR: I move that this board does not  
6 count ---.

7 MS. DEELEY: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman. I  
8 have a question for Kevin on this category.

9 CHAIR: Sure.

10 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, with these voters  
11 determined to be registered voters?

12 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

13 MS. DEELEY: They signed the Affidavit.  
14 Correct?

15 MR. RICHARDSON: Correct.

16 MS. DEELEY: So the only thing wrong with  
17 these ballots is that they are not inside a  
18 secrecy envelope.

19 Correct?

20 MR. RICHARDSON: That is correct.

21 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. Thank you, Mr.  
22 Chairman.

23 CHAIR: Do we have a second on the motion?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I'll second the motion to  
25 not ---.

1 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, remarks on the  
2 motion.

3 CHAIR: Please proceed.

4 MS. DEELEY: I believe whether or not a  
5 ballot is in a secrecy envelope not material in  
6 determining whether or not such individual is  
7 correct qualified under state law to vote in such  
8 elections. But unlike the mail ballots, where the  
9 voters are filling them out on a kitchen table,  
10 these voters are doing this process in a polling  
11 place. The Judge of Election should be  
12 instructing them to place their ballot in a  
13 secrecy envelope. So this is a poll worker error  
14 that we should not be punishing the voter for.

15 Furthermore, the difference here is that  
16 provisional ballots are outlined in federal law.  
17 To Help America Vote Act end, this is a federal  
18 election. State law determines if someone is  
19 eligible to vote. If we determine these voters to  
20 be registered and that they sign the Affidavit and  
21 that they have not already voted in any other way,  
22 then we must count them. PA law has extra  
23 hurdles, but putting a ballot in a secrecy  
24 envelope has no bearing on whether or not someone  
25 is qualified to vote. I believe that the

1 Pennsylvania law is in conflict with the Help  
2 America Vote Act. This has not --- this has not  
3 been the sub --- this has not been the subject of  
4 recent court challenges. And therefore, I believe  
5 that these ballots should count.

6 CHAIR: Commissioner Bluestein, do you want  
7 to comment?

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I  
9 would just say that I --- I agree with  
10 Commissioner Deeley's sentiments, but  
11 unfortunately I think we're bound by state laws.

12 CHAIR: Please call the roll.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

14 MS. DEELEY: No.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

16 CHAIR: Chair. All right. Thank you.

17 MR. RICHARDSON: Thank you, Commissioners.

18 CHAIR: Vice Chair Deeley, did you have any  
19 other business to raise at this meeting?

20 MS. DEELEY: I have none. Thank you.

21 CHAIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you have  
22 any other business to be raised at this meeting.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you.

24 CHAIR: Of course, as always, I say thank  
25 you to the staff. And as always, I'd like to say

1 Eid Mubarak to all the practicing Muslims who are  
2 celebrating Eid al-Adha, a three-day celebration.  
3 And today marks the third day of the celebration.  
4 Thank you, Commissioners.

5 COURT REPORTER: Does the transcript usually
