3	CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning. And I call to
4	order the meeting of the Philadelphia City
5	Commissioners Board of Elections for Wednesday,
6	October the 15th, 2025. This meeting is in compliance
7	with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.
8	The Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three-
9	member, bipartisan board of elected officials in
10	charge of elections and voter registration for the
11	City of Philadelphia. Each Commissioner is elected to
12	serve a four-year term that coincides with the
13	municipal election cycle for mayor and City council.
14	The Commission has set and enforced departmental
15	policies to administer voter registration and conduct
16	elections in accordance with Federal and State voter
17	registration and election laws.
18	The City commissioners were created by the
19	Pennsylvania Assembly in 1711 with a focus on taxation
20	and held various regulatory powers throughout the
21	century. The commissioners started maintaining voter
22	lists in 1799 and took on more election-related
23	responsibilities, but didn't emerge into its current
24	form until the adoption of Philadelphia's Home Rule
25	Charter in 1951.

Page 4 We will start off with public 1 Public comment. comments. Before beginning their comments, commenters 2 shall state where they live or, if they are not a 3 4 resident of Philadelphia, that they are a Philadelphia 5 taxpayer. Public comment is not an opportunity for dialogue or Q and A. It is public comment, a chance 6 7 for you to tell us what you think. Each speaker will 8 have two minutes to speak. However, I may extend the time at my discretion. Public comment must concern 9 10 matters on today's meeting agenda. 11 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve the 12 order and decorum of the meetings; as such, profane, slanderous, discriminatory, or personal attacks will 13 14 not be tolerated. If you wish to make a public 15 objection to a perceived Sunshine Act violation, please raise your hand and I will recognize you. 16 Outbursts will not be tolerated. 17 Anyone wishing to offer public comment, please 18 19 step forward. But before we -- I know there are 20 people here. If you're planning on making a public comment about a polling place to change, well, wait 21 for that part of the agenda. 22 23 Are you here to make a public comment? Oh, he's 24 here to observe it. We don't get that many visitors. 25 Thanks for coming. Okay.

Page 5 I didn't hear or understand what 1 SPEAKER 1: 2 you're saying. 3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I'm sorry. I said, were you 4 here for public comment? 5 SPEAKER 1: No. I'm here for information. CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay, good. Well, welcome, 7 welcome. We don't get that many visitors often, so I 8 said thank you for coming. 9 Having no public comment, we will now proceed to 10 email comment. Secretary Bluestein, are there any email public 11 12 comments? MR. BLUESTEIN: As of 9:45 a.m., there were no 13 14 email public comments. 15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you very much. 16 We will now proceed to old business. First, we 17 have a report from our Directors of Election Operations and Administration, Mr. Joseph Lynch and 18 19 Mr. Mark Johnson. 20 Joe, we'll start off with you. MR. LYNCH: Good morning, Commissioners. 2.1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning. 22 23 MR. LYNCH: This is our public meeting update for October 15th, 2025. At the Election Warehouse, the 24 25 Voting Machine Services Unit finished final repairs

1	and made sure all machines that required a repair were
2	final tested, time-checked, reset, and cleared for
3	election day. They're also getting all the machines
4	ready to ship.
5	The E-Poll Book Unit is working to ensure the
6	electronic poll books are fully prepared and
7	operational for election day. The Election Materials
8	Unit has been working to ensure that the supplies
9	needed for our poll workers are ordered, organized,
10	and ready for packing.
11	For the election cycle to date, the O'Hara and
12	Spring Garden has processed 114,274 voter registration
13	applications, of which 109,224 were electronic and
14	5,050 were paper. All applications are up to date.
15	As of Tuesday, the County Board of Elections
16	approved 92,334 vote-by-mail and absentee
17	applications, which is 6,704 added from the last
18	week's total. Of those, 51,848 are paper applications
19	and 40,486 are electronic. This includes military and
20	civilian overseas voters. We currently have 228
21	electronic applications waiting to be processed. A
22	total of 92,462 ballots have been sent out. So far,
23	we've received 29,772 ballots through the United
24	States Postal Service and 3,062 through drop boxes,
25	for a total of 32,834 valid ballots. This total does

- 1 not include the UOCAVA ballots.
- 2 The County Board of Elections Office, located at
- 3 City Hall, Room 140, is open for in-person mail ballot
- 4 services. Voters can request an absentee, mail-in, or
- 5 replacement ballot in person and return all in the
- 6 same visit. Office hours are 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.,
- 7 Monday through Friday, and 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on
- 8 Saturday and Sunday.
- 9 Voters who would like to vote by mail for the
- 10 November 4th municipal elections can apply for a mail-
- in or absentee ballot at vote.phila.gov. The deadline
- 12 to apply is Tuesday, October 28th at 5:00 p.m.
- 13 ID verification letters have gone out to voters
- 14 that either did not include the required proof of
- 15 identification on their absentee/mail-in ballot
- 16 application, or the proof of identification could not
- 17 be verified by the County Board of Elections Office.
- 18 Voters who have received this letter may submit their
- 19 proof of ID to the County Board of Elections via
- 20 email, phillyelection@phila.gov; fax, U.S. mail,
- 21 telephone, or in person. Voters have until midnight
- 22 on November 10th to return their proof of
- 23 identification for the municipal election.
- 24 Cycle five second Friday pre-election campaign
- 25 finance reports are to be completed by City candidates

2	following deadline for the County Board to receive all				
3	reports is October 24th, 2025.				
4	The Board Workers Unit is finishing up its fall				
5	training seminars with 2,260 participants already in				
6	attendance. The schedule is posted on our website.				
7	3,985 Board workers completed online trainings, which				
8	is available on our website. Weekly reminders are				
9	being sent to poll workers who have not yet confirmed				
10	their attendance. Confirmation calls for all wards				
11	continue, and so far we have confirmed 6,599 poll				
12	workers.				
13	Satellite election offices are open to the public				
14	with staff available from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.,				
15	Monday through Friday, and 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on				
16	Saturday and Sunday. Locations are listed on our				
17	website at vote.phila.gov. Drop boxes throughout the				
18	City are open for voters to drop off their ballots.				
19	Thank you. That's all I have, Commissioners.

10	With just a few weeks remaining, our six
11	administrative units remain focused on operational
12	readiness and supporting the integrity of the election
13	process, budget, and procurement. The team continues
14	to manage ongoing budget activities, including the
15	renewal of key contracts and the processing of
16	encumbrances across multiple financial systems.
17	Efforts remain focused on ensuring that all
18	invoices and vendor payments are completed in a timely
19	manner to support election operations. The Department
20	is also reviewing legacy accounts and reconciling
21	outstanding financial items from past fiscal years to
22	maintain full compliance and transparency. Immediate
23	priorities include finalizing contract renewals,
24	monitoring expenditures, and aligning remaining funds
25	to ensure all operational needs are met leading up to

- 1 the general election.
- 2 Communications this week. The Communications
- 3 Unit focused on public-facing voter education and
- 4 internal coordination with upcoming media events. The
- 5 team created and posted social media content
- 6 highlighting voter registration reminders, office
- 7 closures, and poll worker recruitment graphics. They
- 8 finalized and distributed new flyers for satellite
- 9 office hours, drop box locations, and alternative
- 10 ballot return sites while continuing updates to the
- 11 2025 General Election social media toolkit.
- 12 The revised poll worker training video was
- 13 finalized and uploaded, and website content was
- 14 updated to include unverifiable ballot quidance and
- 15 translated material for white boxes. Communications
- 16 also supported press logistics for both the upcoming
- 17 voter registration deadline press conference and the
- 18 Lieutenant Governor's event, which was held this
- 19 morning. They assisted PSA with poll workers events
- 20 at SEO 9 to 10, managed the Department's press inbox,
- 21 and coordinated PSA content corrections with media
- 22 consultants.
- 23 Engagement Unit: The Engagement Team continues
- 24 citywide voter outreach through our several successful
- 25 events. Staff distributed resources and demonstrated

10/15/2025 Page 11 1 voting machines at locations including Beyond Literacy, Congressional Redoubt Salaam, Parkway 2 Central Library, and the North Beach Regional Library. 3 4 Residents expressed appreciation for the 5 availability of translated material and opportunities to learn about the voting process. One memorable 6 7 interaction came from a voter education session where 8 a father explained to his young son that voting means 9 choosing candidates who represent our values and 10 protect our rights. 11 Additional outreach took place at the Thomas F. Donatucci Library and the Philadelphia Fire Department 12 13 Engine 20. The team is also preparing to participate 14 in the upcoming taste of the Philippines events as 15 part of the PECO Multicultural Series later this 16 month. 17 Human Resources: workplace planning continues as the team manages staffing, training, and transaction-18 19 related activities. Temporary staff orientations are 20 ongoing, which should be coming to a close. I think

2	election. This breakdown includes 54 clerk I's, 32
3	clerk II's, 20 clerk III's, 8 trade helpers, and 8
4	voting machine mechanics.
5	The Information Technology Unit remains focused
6	on election night preparations, including police route
7	mapping and polling place optimization analysis. They
8	are actively configuring the cell phones used by the
9	Poll Workers Unit and have successfully activated all
10	assigned devices. All camera-monitoring drop box
11	locations are currently active and recording as
12	required. The IT Department is also working closely
13	with the City Commissioners Investigation Unit to
14	ensure all polling locations are accurately documented
15	and mapped for election day operations.
16	In addition, IT Unit is coordinating with the
17	Police Department reports and control units to
18	finalize polling place data for the election voting
19	material collection. The team continues to support
20	technical operations across all satellite offices and
21	remain voter-facing platforms to ensure accessibility
22	and accuracy.
23	From a security standpoint, coordination
24	continued with the Philadelphia Police Department,
25	OEM, and contracted partners. This team remains

- 1 focused on securing staff, facilities, and voters
- 2 throughout the election period.
- 3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Mark.
