5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning. I  
6 call the October 19, 2022, meeting of the  
7 Philadelphia City Commissioners to order.

8 First, I will preserve the order and  
9 decorum of these meetings. Everyone in  
10 attendance should be on notice that shouting  
11 out or interrupting the proceedings will not  
12 be tolerated.

13 Those who violate this will be asked to  
14 leave.

15 The Sunshine Act permits anyone  
16 attending a public to object to a perceived  
17 violation at any time during the meeting. If  
18 you choose to do so, please succinctly state  
19 your objection. Objecting is not an  
20 opportunity for speechmaking.

21 We will now move to public comment.  
22 Commenters shall state where they live, or if  
23 they are not a resident of Philadelphia, that  
24 they are a Philadelphia taxpayer.

1           Public comment is not an opportunity  
2           for dialogue or Q&A; it is public comment, a  
3           chance for to you tell us what you think.

4           Each speaker shall have two minutes.  
5           However, I may extend this time at my  
6           discretion. All public comments must be  
7           relevant or germane to Board business.

8           Finally, it is my responsibility to  
9           preserve the order and decorum of the  
10          meetings. As such, profane, slanderous,  
11          discriminatory or personal attacks will not be  
12          tolerated.

13          Please note we will be doing place  
14          changes later in the meeting. So anyone  
15          wishing to be heard on a polling place change  
16          should wait until that time.

17          Is there anyone here for public  
18          comment -- then you'll wait that's fine.  
19          Anybody here for public comment not related to  
20          polling place changes?

21                 MR. NOTARIANNI: I am.

22                 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Please step forward  
23                 and state your name for the record.

24                 MR. NOTARIANNI: Francis Notarianni,

1 13th and Spruce. I'm here on behalf of  
2 Restoring Integrity and Trust in Elections.

3 We submitted a letter last night and  
4 I'm just here to call to your attention in  
5 detail of our broadest points: The broadest  
6 being that the reconciliation process, Act 88,  
7 can't serve as a justification to scale back  
8 the reconciliation process or to eliminate the  
9 reconciliation process.

10 Reconciliation must continue. It's  
11 proven effective in the past. In 2020, for  
12 example, it's caught 40 cases of illegal  
13 double voting.

14 Act 88 -- we think any concerns with  
15 reconciliation in Act 88 are misplaced. If  
16 the election code is followed to it's letter  
17 and implemented to it's letter, then there  
18 will be no delay or interruption in the  
19 canvassing of voting because the  
20 reconciliation that would occur would be  
21 between mail-in ballots and provisional  
22 ballots, and not mail-in ballots and the poll  
23 book.

24 We think that reconciliation is

1 entirely consistent with Act 88. It would not  
2 be considered an interruption in the  
3 canvassing process. It is actually part of  
4 the canvassing process.

5 It's part of the -- reconciliation is  
6 required by the election code, and it's  
7 required by Act 88.

8 And it's to interpret Act 88 in a  
9 manner that would require the election process  
10 to go expeditiously but incorrectly would be  
11 an absurd interpretation, and absolutely not  
12 what the General Assembly attended.

13 And finally to the extent that Act 88  
14 does require or would result in the loss of  
15 funds because of the reconciliation process,  
16 which again we assert it does not -- it's  
17 reconciliation is plainly part of --

18 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Two minutes, sir.

19 MR. NOTARIANNI: -- canvassing and it's  
20 totally within Act 88 but to the extent it's  
21 not the duty to safeguard against fraud and --

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Sir, it's two  
23 minutes. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Thank you.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: We will now move to  
2 Commissioner Bluestein for e-mailed public  
3 comment.

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: All comments  
5 that were e-mailed by 9:45 a.m. were shared  
6 with the commissioners and the deputies at  
7 10:00 a.m., and have been provided to each  
8 commissioner at the beginning of the meeting,  
9 and are available at the public comment table.

10 We received two comments. And I have  
11 reviewed the comments, and ask that they be  
12 moved into the record.

13 COMMISSIONER SABIR: I too have  
14 reviewed those comments, and I ask that they  
15 be put into the record.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I have also  
17 reviewed it. Please move those comments into  
18 the record.

24 We will now proceed with old business.

1 I call on Joe Lynch to read the report from the  
2 executive director.

3 MR. LYNCH: Good morning,  
4 Commissioners.

5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning, Joe.

6 MR. LYNCH: The Sunshine report for  
7 today, October 19th, 2022:

8 The voter registration unit, for the  
9 election cycle to date, they have processed  
10 188,758 registration applications of which  
11 78,850 were paper applications.

12 They have a backlog of 3,800 paper  
13 applications. DPU rooms are working on  
14 registrations.

15 All the street lists are in. The  
16 documents unit is working on the mail street  
17 lists and time stamping all incoming  
18 applications.

19 The correspondence unit is working on  
20 cancellations and assisting with voter  
21 registration applications. Our mobile drop  
22 box team started yesterday.

23 The County Board of Elections report on  
24 Tuesday, October 11th: We opened our

1 satellite office at City Hall, room 140.

2 To date, they have produced 95 mail-in  
3 and absentee ballots for eligible voters  
4 over-the-counter. They will be issuing  
5 replacement ballots up to Election day.

6 Anyone who needs a replacement ballot  
7 or would like to receive their mail-in or  
8 absentee ballots in person may come into the  
9 office, room 140, Monday through Friday, 9:00  
10 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

11 As of yesterday, they have approved  
12 140,186 vote-by-mail applications, which is  
13 13,398 added from last week's total.

14 Of those, 85,932 were paper  
15 applications, and 54,254 are electronic  
16 applications. This is including civilian,  
17 overseas military, and permanent ballot voters  
18 who applied in the primary.

19 Ballot application processing is caught  
20 up through Friday. There are approximately  
21 857 paper applications and 749 electronic  
22 applications waiting be processed.

23 They have mailed out 134,412 mail-in  
24 and absentee ballots. Of those numbers,



1 34,213 to date have been returned.

2 Of the 1,208 UOCAVA ballots sent out,  
3 184 had been returned.

4 The last day to register to vote is  
5 October 24th. And the last day to apply for a  
6 mail-in ballot is November 1st.

7 The board workers working the poll so  
8 far to date is 5,831. Voicemails left for  
9 board workers is 347. Board worker refusals  
10 is 1,568.

11 Schedule for upcoming training is  
12 1,367. And confirmed for taking in-person  
13 training is 1,890. Board workers that have  
14 trained online so far is 1,281 to date.

15 That's all I have Commissioners.

16 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you, Joe.

17 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Thanks, Joe.

18 If there's anyone here to -- oh, I'm  
19 sorry I now call on Nick Custodio with the  
20 report from the deputies.

21 MR. CUSTODIO: Good morning,  
22 Commissioners.

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning, Nick.

24 MR. CUSTODIO: On Friday, city workers

1 installed a drop-box at Kingsessing Recreation  
2 Center, 4901 Kingsessing Avenue. Box was  
3 opened and publicized on Vote.Phila.gov.

4 With this placement, we have completed  
5 the placements authorized by the Board.

6 Per Commissioner Deeley's September  
7 28th motion, we scheduled staffed mobile drop  
8 off events around the city. Times and  
9 locations have been publicized on  
10 Vote.Phila.Gov.

8 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you, Nick.

9 We will now proceed to polling place  
10 relocations.

11 If there is anyone here that wishes to  
12 come forward, and provide comment on a polling  
13 place change, I ask that you come forward in  
14 the order that you came in please.

15 Proceed.

16 MR. HOLT: Good morning, Commissioners.

17 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning,  
18 please state your name.

19 MR. HOLT: Yes, my name is Nathaniel  
20 Holt. I am a Democratic Ward Executive  
21 Committee member for Ward 22, Division 7.

22 And I and many others in the  
23 neighborhood were informed of a polling  
24 location change only this past week. I,

1 myself found out on Sunday.

2 So what happened was that our normal  
3 location, the elevator is out of order. And  
4 it's not able to be fixed in time for election  
5 day.

6 So, of course, it makes sense that the  
7 location is moved. We were told that the new  
8 location will be at the Germantown Jewish  
9 Center on Ellet Street.

10 However, my co-committee person Polly  
11 Wise (ph) and I, several others in the  
12 neighborhood as well as the Tenant Council  
13 president of our public housing building that  
14 is in the division are very concerned about  
15 that location.

16 For not only just the distance for  
17 which folks need to walk but specifically for  
18 the large number of seniors, many of whom have  
19 disabilities, and don't have a car themselves.

20 Most specifically, the residents of the  
21 Emlen Arms PHA building in the division.

22 And so throughout this week, I've been  
23 working along with your office, who I have  
24 been in close touch with, as well as the

1 building manager of the Emlen Arms Building,  
2 the Tenant Council Presidents of the Emlen  
3 Arms Building their names are Terry, Perry and  
4 Bill Knox (ph) respectively, as well as  
5 Zachary McNeil, the vice president of resident  
6 programs for PHA.

7 And just this morning, I was informed  
8 by a member of your office, that the vice  
9 president for PHA.

10 All of these people I have referenced  
11 fully express support for the location to be  
12 at the Emlen Arms Building, which is fully ADA  
13 compliant and has a very large spacious  
14 lunchroom that is on the first floor and  
15 easily accessible.

16 This would solve the problem for our  
17 low-mobility disabled seniors being  
18 enfranchised in this election.

19 And furthermore, the Emlen Arms  
20 location has the added benefit of being on the  
21 same block as the Commodore Barry Irish  
22 Center, allowing for much easier redirection  
23 of voters who inevitably turn up there.

24 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you.

1 Good morning.

2 MS. JONES-WIBLE: Good morning. My  
3 name is Juanita Jones-Wible. I'm the judge of  
4 elections for Ward 57, Division 10, where our  
5 polling place is also being changed.

6 And it's a change that should have  
7 probably been told to our voters in May when  
8 they came to vote and letting them know that  
9 this would be a tentative thing that's going  
10 to happen since Pollock Elementary School was  
11 actually slated for construction since April.

12 There was notice placed out there on  
13 the school district website in July. However,  
14 we're just now getting notice that we're going  
15 to be moving, and this isn't on the website.

16 As far as checking voter status, we're  
17 still being told to go to Pollock Elementary  
18 School.

19 I mean this is not enough time for some  
20 of our neighbors to actually be able to get  
21 there, voters to get there if they are  
22 handicapped or they're non-driving.

23 You're putting them into an area that  
24 is congested. And it's going to be very

1           difficult for them to get to.

2                   It is a small church that has been  
3 chosen, and there is handicap accessibility  
4 there, but the size is very small.

5                   And also theres a lot of issues with  
6 smokers on the grounds when it's at Pollock  
7 let alone this area, which is quite congested  
8 and poll volunteers and workers are going to  
9 be out there smoking, which is going to make  
10 it very difficult for people with asthma,  
11 especially me, I have asthma and it's set off  
12 by cigarette smoke.

13                   I have complained so many times by  
14 going there going to the polling place and  
15 actually going to vote and walking through  
16 streams of smoke. That's another issue.

17                   The other issue is the pavement itself  
18 and how far handicap voters will have to move  
19 just to get into the polling location. And  
20 also the street that they would have to come  
21 up.

22                   If they are walking, it is not a  
23 brightly lit street in that section of the  
24 street. And there have been issues around the



1 neighborhood that have made it very unsafe for  
2 some of these senior citizens to be out there  
3 walking when it's dark and when it's late for  
4 them.

5 And this is a serious issue and it  
6 should have been notified, all our voters  
7 should have been notified in May even if it  
8 was just a little bit of a flyer up that said  
9 that there was a tentative change, this is  
10 going to be under construction, it's going to  
11 happen.

12 There is no notification that this  
13 information was out there since April, and  
14 nobody has told anybody in this area.

15 And there are how many polling  
16 locations or divisions in there -- I think  
17 there's like 12 -- 12 divisions in Pollock,  
18 and that's a lot of voters that are just now  
19 getting notified of this.

20 And we're not even sure of where we're  
21 going because none of that information is on  
22 the website or anywhere.

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Is  
24 there anyone else here to speak on about --

1           come forward.

2                       MR. NICOLO: Good morning, Madam  
3           Chairman, and fellow Commissioners. My name  
4           is Jim Nicolo. I'm the 63rd Republican Ward  
5           Chairman.

6                       We had requested a polling place  
7           change. In Fox Chase School, we have  
8           divisions 4, 9, 10 and 12.

9                       So it's four divisions voting in Fox  
10          Chase School. Adjacent to Fox Chase School is  
11          Fox Chase Playground and both areas share the  
12          same parking lot.

13                      So our original request was to move  
14          divisions four and nine to Fox Chase School,  
15          but what I'd like to do is table it for this  
16          election, and just take notes on what happens  
17          at Fox Chase School, you know, for crowd  
18          control.

19                      Our original request was for crowd  
20          control. But, as I said, I'd like to table it  
21          for this election, look at the crowds, take  
22          some notes and then maybe come back next time.

23                      Okay, thank you very much.

24                      CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you.

1 MR. NICOLO: Oh my address.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Please.

3 MR. NICOLO: 63rd Ward, 18th Division.  
4 My address is 9000 Cargill Lane, Philadelphia,  
5 19115.

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you, sir. We  
7 will now move to -- is anybody else here to  
8 speak on a polling place change?

9 Seeing none, we will now move to  
10 Charlie Stroman with polling place  
11 relocations.

12 MR. STROMAN: Good morning,  
13 Commissioners.

14 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Good morning.

15 MR. STROMAN: As of right now, we have  
16 707 sites versus 705 from last -- Hello. Did  
17 you hear that? Want me to go over that?

18 We have 707 sites versus 705 from last  
19 year.

20 Now I'm going to move to the changes.

21 In the 8th Ward in the 19th Division,  
22 moving from Franklin Institute to the Moore  
23 College of Art and Design. That was due to a  
24 refusal.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Were there signs  
2 posted to reflect this change?

3 MR. STROMAN: All signs were posted no  
4 later than Friday. We start the process on  
5 Wednesday, we continue Thursday, and, if not  
6 finished Thursday, we do it Friday.

7 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. I  
8 motion that we approve the proposed move Ward  
9 8, Division 19.

10 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

11 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner  
12 Bluestein, please call the roll.

13 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner  
14 Deeley?

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.  
17 Commissioner Sabir?

18 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Proceed -- oh, I'm  
20 sorry I'm getting ahead of myself. Polling  
21 change place 8th Ward, 19th Division has been  
22 approved unanimously.

23 Please proceed.

24 MR. STROMAN: Next change will be in

1 the 8th Ward, 23rd Division moving from the  
2 Franklin Institute, again due to a refusal, to  
3 the Riverside Presbyterian Apartments, which  
4 is back to the original location.

5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we  
6 approve the proposed move 8th Ward, 23rd  
7 Division.

8 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner  
10 Bluestein, please call the roll.

11 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner  
12 Deeley?

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.  
15 Commissioner Sabir?

16 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

17 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Polling place  
18 change 8th Ward, 23rd Division has been  
19 approved unanimously.

20 Please proceed.

21 MR. STROMAN: Next change will be in  
22 the 11th Ward in the 6th Division moving out  
23 of Resurgence Church due to a refusal to the  
24 Apartments at Allegheny Avenue.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we  
2 approve the proposed move 11th Ward, 6th  
3 Division.

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner  
6 Bluestein, please call the roll.

7 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner  
8 Deeley?

9 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

10 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.  
11 Commissioner Sabir?

12 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

13 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Polling place  
14 change 11th Ward, 6th Division has been  
15 approved unanimously.

16 Please proceed.

17 MR. STROMAN: Next change would be in  
18 the 12th Ward in the 7th Division moving out  
19 of the Faith Chapel Church, which is a  
20 refusal, to the Haitian Evangelical Baptist  
21 Church.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we  
23 approve the proposed move 12th Ward, 7th  
24 Division.

1 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

2 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner

3 Bluestein, please call the role.

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner

5 Deeley?

6 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

7 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

8 Commissioner Sabir?

9 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

10 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Polling place  
11 change 12th Ward, 7th Division has passed  
12 unanimously.

13 Please proceed.

14 MR. STROMAN: Next two changes I'm  
15 going to lump together in the 18th Ward, 14th  
16 Division, and the 15th Division, moving out of  
17 Tajdeed Residences to Al-Aqsa Islamic Society.  
18 That is basically the same community. It's  
19 just across the street.

20 But I just wanted to bring this to a  
21 hearing so voters weren't messed up of where  
22 to go.

23 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: So it's the same  
24 facility?

1 MR. STROMAN: Same facility, it's  
2 across the street, yeah.

3 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we  
4 approve the proposed moves 18th Ward, 14th  
5 Division, 18th Ward, 15th division.

6 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

7 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner  
8 Bluestein, please call the roll.

9 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner  
10 Deeley?

11 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

12 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.  
13 Commissioner Sabir?

14 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Yes. If I may  
15 before I vote, I just wanted to say that the  
16 correct pronunciation is Al-Aqsa Islamic  
17 Society.

18 I know this because when I graduated  
19 from college, I was a teacher at that school  
20 right there. Thank you. I vote aye.

21 MR. STROMAN: Thank you.

22 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Thank you. Polling  
23 place change 18th Ward, 14th and 15th  
24 Divisions has passed unanimously.



1 Please proceed.

2 MR. STROMAN: Next change will be in  
3 the 22nd Ward in the 4th Division moving out  
4 of Commodore Barry Irish Center due to the  
5 elevator being broken to the Germantown Jewish  
6 Center that would be 22, 4.

7 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: I motion that we  
8 approve the proposed move 22nd Ward, 4th  
9 Division.

10 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Second.

11 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Commissioner  
12 Bluestein, please call the roll.

13 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Commissioner  
14 Deeley?

15 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.  
17 Commissioner Sabir?

18 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

19 CHAIRWOMAN DEELEY: Polling place  
20 change 22nd Ward, 4th Division has passed  
21 unanimously.

22 Please proceed.

23 MR. STROMAN: Next two changes are  
24 again in the 22nd Ward in the 6th Division and

**RE: Public Comment on Act 88 Concerns**

Dear Commissioners:

On behalf of Restoring Integrity and Trust in Elections (RITE), I write regarding issues described in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* story of October 17, 2022, under the headline *Philly might scale back a process for catching double votes—because of GOP 'election integrity' rules*. Specifically, the article asserts that the Commissioners are planning to eliminate processes and procedures for preventing duplicate voting out of an unjustified concern that they somehow might jeopardize certain funding authorized by Act 88 of 2022. These protections must not be abandoned. And as this letter demonstrates, they cannot lawfully be abandoned. Auditing for double voting is required by law and is absolutely vital to election integrity. For example, in the 2020 Primary Election alone, Philadelphia identified 40 instances of illegal double voting. Cases like those and undoubtedly other cases would slip through the cracks were the plan identified in the article to be implemented. All systems that have been used in the past to prevent impermissible duplicate voting should remain in place and in full force. Indeed, the city should be looking for ways to strengthen them—not weaken them.

For the reasons explained below, the Commissioners cannot use Act 88 as a justification for jeopardizing election integrity. The tension between Act 88 and election integrity described in the *Inquirer* article is wholly illusory. And even if it were real, the City's obligation to protect election integrity must always win out over its desire for Act 88 funds.

*First*, the concern expressed in the article about delays to reconcile with the poll books is misplaced: if the City executes Election Code procedures correctly on the front end, then delays that might conceivably implicate Act 88 become unlikely to the vanishing point. To illuminate, under 25 P.S. § 3146.6(b) (concerning absentee ballots) and the companion provision at 25 P.S. § 3150.16(b) (concerning mail-in ballots), only three things can happen when a person who has been *sent* a mail-in ballot shows up at a polling station. One, if their return has been noted in the polling book, they cannot vote.

§ 3146.6(b)(1); § 3150.16(b)(1). Two, if their return has not been noted, they can tender their mail-in ballot, have it spoiled, and vote in person. Three, if their return has not been noted, they can cast a provisional vote. § 3146.6(b)(2)-(3); § 3150.16(b)(2)-(3). **No other options exist.**

Thus, provided the City Commissioners are providing each polling station before Election Day with the current information, as required by law, on who has been sent a mail-in/absentee ballot, the City would **never** need to stop the mail-in/absentee count to see if a given elector showed up to vote in person. This is the case precisely because an elector trying to vote by more than one method will either have been turned away or allowed to vote a provisional ballot that will be rejected in light of the receipt and counting of their mail-in/absentee ballot. *See* 25 P.S. § 3050(a.4)(5)(ii)(F); *see also In re Allegheny Cty. Provisional Ballots in the 2020 Gen. Election*, No. 1161 CD 2020, 2020 WL 6867946, at \*4 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2020). Stated as simply as possible, if the Commissioners generate poll books and later provide supplemental poll books immediately before Election Day with the most up-to-date information on who has requested a mail-in/absentee ballot, then the canvass of the mail-in/absentee ballots, 25 P.S. § 3260.2-A(J)(1)-(2) (Act 88), will proceed with all necessary speed because there will be fewer potential double-votes to identify, and they will be in the form of provisional ballots that were cast by mail-in/absentee electors.

Of course, for this system to work as intended to minimize and eliminate duplicate votes, poll workers must be adequately trained with respect to the proper check-in procedures for all voters who appear to vote on Election Day. This training must include instructing poll workers to carefully check the poll book and supplemental poll book for all voters checking-in, verifying their absentee voting status, and then determining whether the voter is permitted to vote a regular ballot (returns and spoils their mail ballot on election day), provisional ballot (has requested a mail ballot), or not permitted to vote again (has returned a mail ballot). We respectfully request that you confirm that the City has fulfilled its obligation in this regard, so that the voters of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth writ large can have maximum confidence that their election will not be tainted by the scourge of duplicate voting.

*Second*, even if the process described above were to breakdown, no conflict exists between the City's duty to canvass under Act 88 "without interruption" and its duty to prevent unlawful double voting. This is so because the process for detecting duplicate votes (auditing ballots against poll books) is activity squarely within the scope of what legally constitutes continuous canvassing. Far from being a "stoppage" in canvassing that might threaten Act 88 funds, such an audit is a necessary pre-condition to the canvassing referenced in Act 88. The audit is part of completing the review of mail-in/absentee ballots required by the Election Code, 25 P.S. § 3146.8 (describing procedure for






canvassing absentee and mail-in ballots), and Act 88. 25 P.S. § 3260.2-A(J)(1)-(2). Indeed, canvassing involves the process of “gathering ... ballots after the final pre-canvass meeting and the counting, computing and tallying of the votes reflected on the ballots.” 25 P.S. § 2602. Duplicate ballots are not “votes,” and to the extent they have been allowed to be mixed into the ballots gathered after the final pre-canvass, they must be weeded out before the votes can be properly counted, computed, and tallied. Thus, the process of auditing for and excluding improper ballots is both a duty imposed by the Election Code and incorporated by reference by Act 88 as a condition precedent to receiving the funds it authorizes. An interpretation of Act 88 that reads into it the result that millions of dollars are conditioned on fast but inaccurate tallies is “absurd,” and hence plainly not the interpretation the Legislature intended. 1 Pa.C.S. § 1922(1).

*Third*, above all else, the City Commissioners have an express statutory duty to “investigate election frauds,” 25 P.S. § 2642(i), of which duplicate voting is a well-established form. *See generally In re Pa. Gen. Election for Snyder County Com’r*, 841 A.2d 593, 597 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2004) (providing “double voting” as an example of “fraud”); *see also* 25 P.S. § 3548 (imposing statutory duty to enforce election law subject to criminal penalties). Thus, even if it is the case that fulfillment of your statutory duties to ensure election integrity results in a loss of funds under Act 88—an extremely dubious proposition—that is a sacrifice the Election Code and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania require. *See* 25 P.S. § 2642(g) (imposing duty to “inspect systematically and thoroughly the conduct of primaries and elections in the several election districts of the county to the end that primaries and elections may be honestly, efficiently, and uniformly conducted”). Simply put, a desire to secure certain funds cannot justify rendering the City’s elections more vulnerable to a known species of fraud—double voting, which happened 40 times just two years ago. Doing so would not only violate the Election Code, but also the U.S. and Pennsylvania Constitutions by allowing unlawful vote dilution. Finally, seeking funds under Act 88 is optional, but eliminating fraud in your certified tallies is not.

I appreciate your attention to these concerns. We look forward to receiving prompt confirmation that Philadelphia will not abandon or scale back processes and procedures that have been in place prevent duplicate voting in the upcoming election.

I ask that you consider this to be a public comment which is required to be addressed at the next meeting of the City Commissioners, scheduled for Wednesday, October 19, 2022 as I am unable to attend in person. Thank you for your kind courtesies in that regard.

I make this public comment to gain clarity for election board workers, poll watchers and candidates regarding election procedures. I understand that poll worker training for the upcoming election has focused on teaching the use of electronic pollbooks. If the workers will instead be relying on the old paper poll book system, please advise as to any safeguards put in place regarding voters who register to vote or apply for a mail in or absentee ballot after the pollbooks are printed. As I understand it, pollbooks will be sent to the printer prior to the November 1, 2022 deadline to apply for a mail in or absentee ballot.

I realize that the Commissioners had implemented a system of supplemental pollbooks lists in previous elections to serve as a bulwark against those electors voting on the machine but that method depends on the workers' diligence in checking the supplements.

Specifically, I request information regarding how Philadelphia will assure that it is complying with the requirement that voters with outstanding mail/absentee ballots are only permitted to vote a provisional ballot as required by 25 P.S. §§ 3146.3(e), 3150.16(b).

I understand that in the 2022 Primary, during canvassing, any mail ballots that might have been requested after the pollbooks were printed were segregated until it could first be confirmed that the voters had not voted in person. I write to ask if you will also be implementing a similar procedure for the 2022 General Election. I understand based on recent press reports that Philadelphia is considering not using this system again in the upcoming November election based on fears that it would violate the provisions of Act 88. Act 88 merely requires the canvassing process "to continue without interruption." A procedure utilized during the canvass process to verify the legality of mail and absentee ballots and prevent accidental double-voting falls squarely within the parameters of "canvassing" activities and complies with Act 88 so long as those and other activities part of the canvassing process, including the counting of ballots, continue "without interruption."
