1 P R O C E E D I N G S

2 (11:00 a.m.)

3 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Good morning. I'm going to call
4 to order the meeting of the Philadelphia City
5 Commissioner's Board of Election for Wednesday,
6 October 23rd. This meeting is in compliance with the
7 Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.

8 The Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three-
9 member bipartisan board of elected officials in charge
10 of elections and voter registration for the City of
11 Philadelphia. Each Commissioner is elected to serve a
12 four-year term that coincides with the municipal
13 election cycle for Mayor and City Council. The
14 Commissioners set and enforce departmental policies to
15 administer voter registration and conduct elections in
16 accordance with federal and state voter registration
17 election laws.

18 The City Commissioners were created by the
19 Pennsylvania Assembly in 1711 with a focus on taxation
20 and held various regulatory powers throughout the
21 centuries. The Commissioners started maintaining
22 voter lists in 1799 and took on more election related
23 responsibilities, but didn't emerge into its current
24 form until the adoption of Philadelphia's Home Rule
25 Charter in 1951.

1 We will start off with public comments. Before
2 beginning their comments, commenters shall state where
3 they live or if they are not a resident of
4 Philadelphia, and that they are a Philadelphia
5 taxpayer. Public comment is not an opportunity for
6 dialogue or Q and A. It is public comment, a chance
7 for you to tell us what you think.

8 Each speaker will have two minutes to speak.
9 However, I may extend the time at my discretion.
10 Public comment must concern matters on today's meeting
11 agenda.

12 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve the
13 order and decorum of the meetings. As such, profane,
14 slanderous, discriminatory, or personal attacks will
15 not be tolerated. If you wish to make a public
16 objection to a perceived Sunshine violation, please
17 raise your hand and I will recognize you. Outbursts
18 will not be tolerated.

19 Anyone wishing to offer public comment, please
20 step forward. Good morning.

21 MS. RHOE: Good morning.

22 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Please state and spell your
23 first and last name for the record and proceed with
24 your comments.

25 MS. RHOE: Debbie Rhoe, D-E-B-B-I-E R-H-O-E.

1 Teamwork and Community -- teamwork and communication
2 is extremely important between the Philadelphia City
3 Commissioners, committee people, and poll workers. I
4 am a committee person and in so many ways I'm like
5 Kamala Harris. I want to serve voters with joy and
6 professionalism.

7 However, I have not gotten the required support
8 from the Philadelphia City Commissioners in the past,
9 nor in this present time. For example, in the past,
10 during Obama's presidential election, five additional
11 divisions were added to my polling place at the Church
12 of the Advocate in North Philadelphia.

13 I got no additional support from the Philadelphia
14 City Commissioners. Therefore, my small team at that
15 time, which consists of the Judge of Elections, the
16 Minority Whip, the Majority Whip, two clerks and two
17 machine operators, organized a strategic plan with
18 professionalism and joy that served 4,000 voters
19 smoothly.

20 However, the Philadelphia City commissioners had
21 cut payroll by the limits they placed on how many
22 payroll positions were available for signed payout.
23 Consequently, my team and I did not realize signed
24 payout cuts happen until the end of the night. There
25 was only one space on the payroll to pay one machine

1 operator instead of two operators, and only one space
2 available to pay one clerk instead of two clerks.

3 The economy was in a chaotic free fall to hell.
4 If you recall, during Barack Obama's administration,
5 these workers were laid off, didn't have jobs, and
6 they really needed that money. Unfortunately, after a
7 court hearing with the Philadelphia City
8 commissioners, my team members were denied payment.

9 The team worked hard, and we were crucial
10 participants that helped put Obama in the White House.
11 The team was upset. Word got out into the streets of
12 North Philadelphia that my division 3212 about how
13 they weren't paid by the City of Philadelphia
14 commissioners and I haven't had a good team since.

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Ma'am.

16 MS. RHOE: Because --

17 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Excuse me, ma'am. Your time is
18 up.

19 MS. RHOE: Can I just ask for maybe 30 more
20 seconds, please? Because of the above unfortunate
21 situation, I unknowingly hired curbside bullies that I
22 now ask the city commissioners to remove and replace
23 with students and adults to work with and perhaps meet
24 prior to the election on November 5, 2024, so that
25 3212 will be equipped to serve the voters with joy and

1 professionalism.

2 I repeatedly ask staff members that are employees
3 of the City of Philadelphia Commission to remove them.

4 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. I gave you another
5 30 seconds.

6 MS. RHOE: To remove --

7 CHAIRMAN SABIR: And thanks for coming and --

8 MS. RHOE: Oh, is that it? That's it?

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: That's it. But if you leave
10 your contact information, we'll definitely follow back
11 up with you.

12 MS. RHOE: I hope so, because this is a really
13 important election and Kamala Harris needs every vote
14 that she can get. And I really need the support
15 because me as a committee person -- you know, and
16 that's why a lot of people don't vote, because, you
17 know, they're tossed to the side, they're overlooked,
18 you know.

19 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. Thank you, ma'am.

20 MS. RHOE: It's really sad.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you for coming up, ma'am.
22 Thank you.

23 MS. RHOE: I left a message online as well.

24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, ma'am.

25 MS. RHOE: So how would you get in touch with me?

1 CHAIRMAN SABIR: If you just sit back to the end
2 of the meeting, we'll make sure we get all your
3 contact information.

4 MS. RHOE: Okay.

5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Don't go nowhere. Thank you for
6 coming up.

7 Is anyone else here for public comment? There
8 are none, we will now move to a report from the
9 Secretary.

10 Email public comments. Commissioner Bluestein,
11 are there any public comments?

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: There were no email public
13 comments by 9:45 a.m.

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you very much. We will
15 now proceed to old business. First, we have a report
16 from our Directors of Election Administration and
17 Operations, Mr. Joe Lynch and Ms. Stephanie Reed.
18 Joe, we'll start off with you.

19 MR. LYNCH: Yes, morning Commissioners. This is
20 our Sunshine update for October 23rd, 2024. The
21 warehouse unit is wrapping up machine preparations and
22 getting ready for shipping machines to the polling
23 locations.

24 For our voter registration report, the election
25 cycle to date we have processed over -- we have

1 processed 425,538 voter registration applications.
2 223,650 of those applications were paper. As of right
3 now, we have a backlog of 19,150 applications. On
4 Monday, we mailed out 82,661 ID cards. Delaware and
5 Spring Garden, extending the hours until 9:00 p.m. to
6 eliminate any backlog.

7 As of Tuesday, we have approved 199,552 vote by
8 mail and absentee applications, which is 17,247 added
9 from last week's total. Of those, 99,648 are paper
10 applications and 96,715 are electronic applications.
11 This includes military, civilian, overseas, and
12 federal voters.

13 We currently have a total of 13,576 applications
14 waiting to be processed. Of those, 2,750 are paper
15 applications and 13,576 are electronic applications.
16 As of October 22nd, we have sent out 195,311 vote by
17 mail ballots for the 2024 general election. Voters
18 who have not yet received their ballot or need a
19 replacement ballot can visit our website to request a
20 replacement ballot or they can visit one of our
21 satellite election offices for assistance.

22 ID verification letters have gone out to voters
23 that either did not include the required proof of
24 identification order, absentee/mail in ballot
25 application or their proof of identification could not

1 be verified by the County Board of Elections office.
2 Voters who have received this letter may submit their
3 proof of ID to the County Board of Elections via email
4 at phillyelection@phila.gov, fax, US mail, telephone,
5 or in person.

6 Voters have until 5:00 p.m. on Nov. 12th to
7 return their proof of identification for the General
8 Election. Voters can visit our satellite office in
9 City hall room 140 to request a mail in or replacement
10 ballot in person and return it on the same visit.
11 Office hours are Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to
12 5:00 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday 10:00 to 4:00.

13 Voters who would like to vote by mail for the
14 November 5th General Election can apply for a mail in
15 absentee ballot at vote.phila.gov. The deadline to
16 apply is Tuesday, October 29th at 5:00 p.m.

17 Cycle 5 Second Friday Pre-Election Campaign
18 Finance Reports are to be completed by city candidates
19 and their committees as of October 21st, 2024. The
20 following deadline for the County Board to receive all
21 reports is October 25th, 2024.

22 The election board unit is working on confirming
23 board workers through calls and emails. They have
24 confirmed 8,357 so far, but 431 have declined and
25 we've left 148 voicemails. In General Election

1 training sessions, 3,178 board workers attended and
2 1959 confirmed for scheduled training.

3 We would like to remind Philadelphia voters that
4 we have 10 satellite election offices open seven days
5 a week. Registered voters can apply, receive, fill
6 out, and turn in their mail in ballot at any satellite
7 Office until Tuesday, October 29th. We also provide
8 replacement balance for a full set of list of offices
9 and services. You can visit vote.phila.gov for the
10 satellite election offices.

11 Thank you. That's all I have.

12 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Joe. Vice Chair
13 Deeley, did you have any questions?

14 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. I have none.

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you
16 have any questions?

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. I have none.

18 CHAIRMAN SABIR: I just had one question. You
19 don't have to answer it right now, but I guess just
20 that list that we posted, like, you know, how many
21 people got the issues with the mail in ballots got
22 rectified?

23 MR. LYNCH: How many issues as far as what?

24 CHAIRMAN SABIR: You know, the list that we sent
25 out, like, how many people came and got replacement

1 ballots --

2 MR. LYNCH: Oh, who rectified or -- I don't know
3 that. I don't have that.

4 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. You can get --

5 MR. LYNCH: I can get it for you. Yeah.

6 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Yeah, I just wanted to know that
7 again. Okay. Next up.

8 MS. REED: Good morning, Commissioners. I'm
9 pleased to address you today and share updates from
10 our administration report for October 23rd, 2024.

11 This past week, with only two weeks to go, we
12 continued our preparations for the general election.
13 In budget and procurement, the team has been focused
14 on normal processing of invoices and purchase orders,
15 addressing any related issues as they arise. We're
16 working with procurement to get our final orders
17 approved for the general election.

18 In communications, we've been designing requested
19 materials, including social media graphics, updated
20 poll worker documents, and signage for the warehouse
21 and City Hall. Requested materials were also produced
22 for canvassing by the mayor's office. Additionally,
23 we've been planning for general election
24 communications, including sessions with our
25 consultants and providing input for the paid media

1 campaign.

2 We're excited to share that transit ads are up
3 and the rest of the campaign is ramping up quickly.
4 We're also excited to share that a post on X about
5 replacing ballots with issues went viral, being
6 reshared over -- as of this morning, 547 times.
7 Hopefully that helps that number that you're referring
8 to be a little higher.

9 Regarding engagement, we're distributing
10 materials at the Northeast Regional Library, Senior
11 Expo, H Mart, Oregon Market, and First Oriental
12 Market. Our efforts also involve sharing flyers for
13 poll workers and interpreters, encouraging voter
14 registration, recruiting bilingual interpreters, and
15 engaging with the community through feedback and
16 questions at events.

17 We continue identifying hair salons, temples, or
18 churches where we can distribute election materials.
19 We're scheduled to table at five community events in
20 the coming week.

21 In human resources, our total workforce stands at
22 223 employees, with 188 in civil service and 35
23 exempt. This includes 56 clerk Is, 33 clerk IIs, 17
24 clerk IIIs, 9 trades helpers, 9 voting machine techs,
25 and 43 temps. We're continuing with final new hire

1 activities for the general election.

2 Our IT team completed setting up all IT
3 components for the last two satellite election
4 offices. They've been updating surveys and signup
5 forms, posting notices, and maintaining our website.
6 They've also been working on the call center, asset
7 retrieval center and poll worker dashboard. The team
8 tested the call center dashboard this weekend, and the
9 test went very well.

10 I know I say this each week, but I'm so impressed
11 with our staff. They're doing a remarkable job
12 getting everything prepared and keeping up with the
13 increased workload. Thank you to each of you for
14 everything you're doing.

15 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you. Vice Chair Deeley,
16 did you have any questions?

17 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. I have none.

18 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, did you
19 have any questions?

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. I have none.

21 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Okay. Thank you. This
22 completes our old business for today. So that was our
23 last item on the agenda.

24 Before we adjourn, Commissioner Deeley, do you
25 have any other business to be raised at this meeting?

1 MS. DEELEY: Thank you, sir. I have none.

2 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Commissioner Bluestein, do you
3 have any other business to be raised at this meeting?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you. I do not.

5 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Thank you, Commissioners.

6 Hearing no other business, I motion to adjourn today's
7 meeting. Is there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call
10 the roll.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley?

12 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir.

14 CHAIRMAN SABIR: Aye. Meeting is adjourned.

15 (The meeting was adjourned.)
