5 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Good
6 morning. I call the November 2, 2022
7 meeting of the Philadelphia City
8 Commissioners to order.

9 First, I will preserve the
10 order and decorum of these meetings.
11 Everyone in attendance should be on
12 notice that shouting out or interrupting
13 the proceedings will not be tolerated.
14 Those who violate this will be asked to
15 leave. The Sunshine Act permits anyone
16 attending a public meeting to object to a
17 perceived violation at any time during
18 the meeting. If you choose to do so,
19 please succinctly state your objection.
20 Objecting is not an opportunity for
21 speechmaking.

22 We now will move to public
23 comment. Commenters shall say where they
24 live, or if they are not a resident of

1 Philadelphia, that they are a
2 Philadelphia taxpayer. Public comment is
3 not an opportunity for dialogue or Q&A.
4 It is public comment, a chance for you to
5 tell us what you think.

6 Each speaker shall have two
7 minutes. However, I may extend this time
8 at my discretion. All public comments
9 must be relevant or germane to Board
10 business.

11 Finally, it is my
12 responsibility to preserve the order and
13 decorum of the meetings. As such,
14 profane, slanderous, discriminatory, or
15 personal attacks will not be tolerated.

16 Is there anyone here for public
17 comments?

18 (No response.)

19 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: We will
20 now move to Commissioner Bluestein for
21 e-mailed public comments.

22 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: There
23 were no e-mailed public comments as of
24 9:45 a.m. this morning.

1 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank
2 you, Commissioner.

3 We will now move to old
4 business, and I'll call on Joe Lynch to
5 read the report from the Executive
6 Director.

7 MR. LYNCH: Good morning,
8 Commissioners.

9 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Good
10 morning, Joe.

11 MR. LYNCH: Today's Sunshine
12 report for 11/2/2022, the County Board
13 report: Since opening our satellite
14 office at City Hall Room 140, they have
15 provided 1,466 voters with voting vote by
16 mail or with receiving a replacement
17 ballot. They will be issuing replacement
18 ballots up until Election Day. Anyone
19 who needs a replacement ballot can come
20 to City Hall Room 140 Wednesday through
21 Friday and Monday between the hours of
22 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. and Election Day
23 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

24 As of yesterday, they have

1 approved 163,601 vote-by-mail
2 applications, which is 14,101 added from
3 last week's total. Of those, 94,506 were
4 paper applications and 69,095 are
5 electronic applications. This is
6 including civilian overseas, military,
7 and permanent ballot voters who applied
8 in the Primary. Ballot application
9 processing is caught up through Friday.
10 There are approximately 308 paper
11 applications and 412 electronic
12 applications waiting to be processed.

13 Of that, 1,460 UOCAVA ballots
14 were sent out; 446 have been returned.

15 County Board of Elections must
16 receive voted mail-in and civilian
17 absentee ballots by 8:00 p.m. on Election
18 Day, November 8th.

19 Report for the Voter
20 Registration Unit: The last day to
21 receive voted military and overseas
22 absentees is November 15th. Ballots must
23 be submitted for delivery no later than
24 11:59 on November 7th.

1 For the election cycle to date,
2 we have processed 242,114 registration
3 applications, of which 114,150 were paper
4 applications and 2,279 mail-in/voter
5 registration applications. All
6 applications have been entered.

7 Yesterday they sent out 38,000 ID cards
8 from the final weeks of the election
9 cycle. They are currently printing the
10 polling place change ID cards. Both DPU
11 rooms are proofing the apps and labeling
12 ID cards. Correspondence is labeling ID
13 cards. Documents is mailing ID cards.

14 The Election Board confirmed
15 numbers for people that are working -- I
16 got to look at that. I'll have to get
17 that number back to you. There was a
18 misprint.

19 Voicemails left was 323.
20 People not working this election was
21 1,186. Scheduled for upcoming training
22 is 1,000. Confirmed for taking in-person
23 training, schools, is 3,327, and to date,
24 there was 1,852 people trained online.

1 Polling place update: The
2 polling place for Ward 63 Division 7 has
3 been relocated by court order to the
4 Lafayette Redeemer Health located at 8580
5 Verree Road.

6 That's all I have.

7 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank
8 you, Joe.

9 We will now move to new
10 business. I have a motion that we will
11 approve the November 2022 Absentee and
12 Mail-in Ballot/Application Challenge
13 Procedures that we posted with the agenda
14 and is available on the public comment
15 table.

16 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:
17 Second.

18 COMMISSIONER DEELEY:
19 Commissioner Bluestein, please call the
20 roll.

21 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:
22 Commissioner Deeley.

23 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote

1 aye.

2 Commissioner Sabir.

3 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

4 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: The
5 motion to approve the Absentee and
6 Mail-in Ballot/Application Challenge
7 Procedures has passed unanimously.

8 I have a second motion. I am
9 making a motion to approve the canvass
10 procedures, but first I want to say a few
11 words.

12 Despite the many efforts to
13 attack Philadelphia's elections in both
14 courts and the court of public opinion,
15 we have always been leaders in election
16 integrity. This includes both doing a
17 reconciliation process after Act 77 was
18 passed to catch any human error that may
19 occur with a new process as well as being
20 leaders in post-election audits in
21 Pennsylvania.

22 Recently, former President
23 Trump and others have been attacking
24 Philadelphia because they say our canvass

1 takes too long. Indeed, one Pennsylvania
2 legislator has written to me to insist
3 that our canvass should be as fast as
4 possible. In Act 88, the legislature was
5 clear to stress the importance of
6 canvassing continuously until complete.

7 But even as some outside actors
8 try and leverage the time it takes to
9 process ballots against us, another
10 organization has filed a lawsuit and
11 appears to intend to go to court to try
12 to slow down our canvass by asking the
13 court to require us to perform a
14 reconciliation process.

15 We will not be intimidated by
16 these external efforts to undermine
17 confidence in Philadelphia's elections
18 and will go forward with the processes we
19 believe are proper and appropriate under
20 the Election Code and our authority as
21 the County Board. The Election Code and
22 these procedures provide ample assurances
23 for the security of the vote in
24 Philadelphia. The constant attacks we

1 hear are not grounded in fact and are
2 aimed at hurting democracy, not enabling
3 it.

4 Therefore, I motion that we
5 approve the 2022 General Election Ballot
6 Canvass Procedures that we posted with
7 the agenda and is available on the public
8 comment table.

9 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: Before
10 I second the motion, I would like to say
11 something as well.

12 So like Commissioner Deeley
13 said, let me start by noting that I am
14 aware a lawsuit has been filed in the
15 Court of Common Pleas in Philadelphia
16 seeking to force Philadelphia to pause
17 its canvass on mail-in and absentee
18 ballots to review public records from
19 Election Day. I will not comment on
20 ongoing litigation, no matter how
21 baseless, but I do want to explain the
22 processes to reassure Philadelphians that
23 their votes will be counted and that our
24 voting processes in Pennsylvania are

1 secure and provide all the protections
2 necessary for Pennsylvanians to have
3 confidence in the outcome of the
4 election.

5 After Act 77 was passed
6 creating an entirely new mail-in ballot
7 process for Pennsylvania, Philadelphia
8 went above and beyond the requirements of
9 the Election Code to check and make sure
10 no voters mistakenly voted twice, both on
11 a voting machine and by mail. We did
12 this because the entire Act 77 process
13 was new, both to poll workers and voters,
14 and we recognized that while we focused
15 on education and training, human error
16 might occur.

17 In the 2020 Primary, the first
18 election with no excuse vote by mail, we
19 put significant resources into
20 Philadelphia's above and beyond
21 reconciliation process and found 40
22 people who had cast two ballots out of
23 175,176 ballots that were counted by the
24 Philadelphia Board of Elections. Since

1 then, we have continued our training for
2 poll workers and education of the public
3 as well as repeated our reconciliation
4 process. In the past three elections, we
5 haven't found any cases of this
6 occurring. That means out of 61,893
7 mail-in ballots counted in the 2021
8 Primary, 74,110 mail-in ballots counted
9 in the 2021 General, and 78,633 mail-in
10 ballots counted in the '22 Primary, there
11 were zero instances of double voting.
12 And this makes sense. The Election Code
13 process works. Voters are now more aware
14 of the rules surrounding mail-in ballots.
15 We are more efficient at notifying voters
16 that their ballots have been received,
17 and our poll workers understand the
18 process better as well.

19 Philadelphia has taken
20 extraordinary steps during the transition
21 to include mail-in voting in Pennsylvania
22 than other counties, including the second
23 largest county, Allegheny, who has never
24 taken this effort. Our attention to

1 these checks did come with challenges.
2 As we all know, Philadelphia was targeted
3 with complaints about not canvassing
4 ballots as quickly as other counties,
5 because we were going the extra mile
6 during the pre-canvass. The result of
7 those efforts demonstrate that this
8 additional work is neither necessary nor
9 helpful any longer.

10 Importantly, the past year the
11 legislature passed Act 88 to provide
12 resources for and incentivize counties to
13 conduct the canvass as quickly as
14 possible to avoid the sort of timing
15 issues that were part of the conflict we
16 experienced in 2020. Act 88 emphasizes
17 this in saying, quote, "The County shall
18 begin pre-canvassing at 7:00 a.m. on
19 Election Day and shall continue without
20 interruption until each mail-in and
21 absentee ballot received by 7:00 a.m. on
22 Election Day is pre-canvassed." And Act
23 88 continues, "The County shall begin
24 canvassing mail-in ballots and absentee

1 ballots at 8:00 p.m. on Election Day and
2 shall continue without interruption until
3 each ballot has been canvassed."

4 It is clear that the
5 legislature intended that we pre-canvass
6 and canvass as quickly and efficiently as
7 possible. The extra step of
8 reconciliation prior to pre-canvassing
9 and canvassing ballots, which as I've
10 already explained is not necessary, is
11 intensioned with this, as it would
12 require waiting until poll books could be
13 returned from polling places and updated
14 in the SURE system before we can canvass
15 any ballots.

16 To my knowledge, Philadelphia
17 is among just a couple counties in
18 Pennsylvania that did such a
19 reconciliation prior to pre-canvassing
20 and canvassing ballots, and our efforts
21 demonstrate that the Election Code poll
22 worker training, voter education, and
23 county processing has all worked.

24 Yet Philadelphia is the only

1 county being challenged. All counties
2 that accepted the Election Integrity
3 Grant will need to follow the same
4 timeline, and I will not sit here
5 silently as people attack Philadelphia
6 while they remain silent about every
7 other county that will be following the
8 same procedures.

9 And with that, I second the
10 motion.

11 COMMISSIONER DEELEY:
12 Commissioner Bluestein, please call the
13 roll.

14 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:
15 Commissioner Deeley.

16 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote
18 aye.

19 Commissioner Sabir.

20 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

21 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: The
22 motion to approve the 2022 General
23 Election Ballot Canvass Procedures has
24 passed unanimously.

1 I have one last motion. I
2 motion that we authorize and deputize the
3 Philadelphia Board of Elections staff to
4 prepare for and conduct a pre-canvass and
5 canvass of absentee and mail-in ballots
6 at the Philadelphia Ballot Processing
7 Center. The absentee and mail-in
8 pre-canvass is to begin on Election Day
9 at 7:00 a.m. and is to be conducted in
10 accordance with the Board's historical
11 practices and procedures, procedures
12 approved here today, the Election Code,
13 and other applicable law. The absentee
14 and mail-in canvass is to begin on or
15 after 8:00 p.m. on Election Day and is to
16 be conducted in accordance with the
17 Board's historical practices and
18 procedures, procedures approved here
19 today, the Election Code, and other
20 applicable law. The canvass is to begin
21 on Friday, November 4, 2022 at 9:00 a.m.

22 Philadelphia Board of Elections
23 staff shall take an oath prior to
24 conducting the pre-canvass administered

1 by the Board's Executive Director and
2 prior to conducting the canvass
3 administered by the Board.

4 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:

5 Second.

6 COMMISSIONER DEELEY:

7 Commissioner Bluestein, please call the
8 roll.

9 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN:

10 Commissioner Deeley.

11 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Aye.

12 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I vote
13 aye.

14 Commissioner Sabir.

15 COMMISSIONER SABIR: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: The
17 motion to authorize and deputize staff to
18 conduct the pre-canvass and canvass of
19 the absentee and mail-in ballots has
20 passed unanimously.

21 Commissioner Bluestein, do you
22 have any items to be added to the agenda?

23 COMMISSIONER BLUESTEIN: I have
24 none.
