3 MR. SABIR: Morning.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Morning.

5 MR. STARBUCHER: Morning.

6 MS. DEELEY: Morning.

7 MR. SABIR: Call to order the meeting of the
8 Philadelphia City Commissioners' Return Board for
9 Wednesday, November 12th. This meeting is in
10 compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act. The
11 Philadelphia City Commissioners are a three-member,
12 bipartisan board of elected officials in charge of
13 elections and voter registration for the City of
14 Philadelphia. Each Commissioner is elected to serve a
15 four-year term that coincides with the municipal
16 election cycle for Mayor and City Council.

17 The commissioners set and enforce departmental
18 policies to administer voter registration and conduct
19 elections in accordance with federal and state voter
20 registration and election laws. City commissioners
21 were created by the Pennsylvania Assembly in 1711 with
22 a focus on taxation and held various regulatory powers
23 throughout the centuries. The commissioners started
24 maintaining voter lists in 1799 and took on more
25 election-related responsibilities, but didn't emerge

1 into a current form until the adoption of the
2 Philadelphia Homeowner Charter in 1951.

3 We start off with public comments. Before
4 beginning their comments, commenters will state where
5 they live, or if they are not a resident of
6 Philadelphia, that they are Philadelphia taxpayers.
7 Public comment is not an opportunity for dialogue or Q
8 and A. It is public comment, a chance for you to tell
9 us what you think. Each speaker will have two minutes
10 to speak. However, I may extend the time at my
11 discretion. Public comments must concern matters on
12 today's meeting agenda.

13 Finally, it is my responsibility to preserve the
14 order and decorum of the meetings. As such, profane,
15 slanderous, discriminatory, or personal attacks will
16 not be tolerated. If you wish to make a public
17 objection to a perceived Sunshine Act violation,
18 please raise your hand and I will recognize you.
19 Outbursts will not be tolerated. Anyone wishing to
20 offer public comment, please step forward. Seeing no
21 public commenters, we will now move to report from the
22 Secretary, Seth Bluestein. Are there any email public
23 comments?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: As of 9:45 a.m., there were no
25 email public comments.

1 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Secretary. We will now
2 proceed to old business. First, we have a report from
3 our Directors of Election Operations and
4 Administration, Mr. Joe Lynch and Mark Johnson.

5 Joe, we'll start with you.

6 MR. STARBUCHER: Yes. Good morning,
7 commissioners.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

9 MS. DEELEY: Morning.

10 MR. STARBUCHER: We're doing good. We have
11 everything, pretty much. We're, we're going -- we're
12 on a good time frame. We scanned over 2,400
13 provisional ballots yesterday. We're up to -- we're
14 up-to-date on the adjudication. We're working on
15 write-ins now. This weekend, or the end of the week,
16 we'll start the two percent audit. We still have to
17 finish -- Kevin's still working on the rest of
18 provisionals. He still has to work on the partials.
19 We already did some scans on those. But we're doing
20 pretty good. We're, we're ahead of the game. And
21 then I have -- this weekend, I'll also do all the mail
22 and ballots that were surrendered. We'll enter them
23 into the shore system, too.

24 So we probably have -- right now, I think they're
25 up to like 1,500 of those, so. And that's it. And

1 what I want to do is I want to get one prop to room
2 140 and 142 because I didn't mention them last week in
3 the report, and I was getting things thrown at me when
4 I came out of the meeting. So, my apologies to that
5 staff. Thank you.

6 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Joe. Commissioner Deely,
7 do you have any questions or comments?

8 MS. DEELEY: I have none. Thank you.

9 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have any
10 questions or comments?

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you.

12 MR. SABIR: Chair, I just want to echo
13 (indiscernible) good folks at 140 and 142. Please
14 proceed, Mark.

15 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning, Commissioners.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good morning.

17 MR. JOHNSON: As we are moving closer to our
18 certification and going over how we did, I believe
19 everything went smoothly. Thanks to Joe and his --
20 and his operational team. And again, I'd like to
21 thank our staff and partners for their hard work.
22 Right now, we're just focusing on post-election
23 operations and supporting certification, equipment
24 retrieval, and putting things back the way they were
25 to prepare for the next election and gearing up

1 towards the next election cycle.

2 I think we're going to have an after-action which
3 we'll go over and talk to all the teams and see how we
4 did, what we did right, what we did wrong. If there
5 are any gaps, we try to fill them and we'll report
6 back to the Board accordingly with what we find. So
7 that's it.

8 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Mark. Commissioner
9 Deely, did you have any questions or comments?

10 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. I have none.

11 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein?

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none. Thank you.

13 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Mark. This concludes our
14 whole business for today's meeting. We now proceed
15 new business.

16 We will begin by considering the first agenda
17 item under "New business: mail-in ballot sufficiency
18 determinations." We will call up Deputy Executive
19 Director of Compliance.

20 MS. ECKROADE: Good morning, Commissioners.

21 MR. SABIR: Morning. Thank you. State your name
22 for the record, please.

23 MS. ECKROADE: Sure. Dana Eckroad, D-A-N-A,
24 Eckroad, E-C-K-R-O-A-D-E.

25 MR. SABIR: Can you please read first category

1 and number of votes?

2 MS. ECKROADE: Yes, one moment. So, for the
3 mail-in ballot sufficiency, number one, in signed
4 front, I have 66 ballots.

5 MR. SABIR: (indiscernible).

6 MS. ECKROADE: So these are the voters that
7 signed the front of the return label but didn't sign
8 the front of the declaration. We have 66 ballots.

9 MR. SABIR: Okay. I move that this board counts
10 the ballots in this category. Do I have a second?

11 MS. DEELEY: Second.

12 MR. SABIR: Any commissioners have any comments?
13 If there are none -- Secretary Bluestein, please call
14 roll.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

16 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

18 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

19 MS. ECKROADE: Category number two, I'm removing
20 from the list, sign front pending ID, which that was a
21 reminder for me to get them to the deadline for ID
22 verification. So I added that to number eight. Okay?
23 So we're going to go to number three. No signature.
24 We have 744 ballots.

25 MR. SABIR: I move that this board does not

1 count votes in this category. Is there a second?

2 MS. DEELEY: Second.

3 MR. SABIR: Do any commissioners have any
4 comments before we proceed to vote?

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: No.

6 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please count
7 the vote.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

9 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

11 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

12 MS. ECKROADE: Ballots not enclosed in secrecy
13 envelope. We have 318 ballots.

14 MR. SABIR: I move that this board does not
15 count ballots in this category. Is there a second?

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

17 MR. SABIR: Do any commissioners have any
18 comments before we move?

19 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Your Honor.

20 MR. SABIR: Please proceed.

21 MS. DEELEY: I believe that the same arguments
22 that were successful in the Eakins case, which
23 requires PA counties to count the misdated and undated
24 ballots, as well as the Baxter case, which is
25 currently before the Supreme Court, would apply to the

1 so-called naked ballots as well. The secrecy envelope
2 does not determine the timeliness of when a ballot is
3 received. The secrecy envelope does not determine if
4 a voter is eligible to vote.

5 Finally, when absentee ballots used to be counted
6 in the polling places and there was only a handful of
7 them, they served to prevent fraud. But that is no
8 longer the case in a post-Act-77 world with the
9 central mechanized counting of mail ballots. So there
10 is no longer a compelling government interest to not
11 count these ballots. Thank you.

12 MR. SABIR: Thank you. Anyone else want to make
13 a comment?

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
15 would just add that I agree in principle that these
16 ballots should be allowed to be counted, but I don't
17 believe the law, as it currently stands, allows us to.
18 Thank you.

19 MR. SABIR: Thank you. And I echo sentiments of
20 my colleagues. Secretary Bluestein, please call the
21 roll.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

23 MS. DEELEY: No.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

25 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

1 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification. No Social
2 Security or driver's license on shore file. We have
3 seven.

4 MR. SABIR: I move that this --

5 MS. DEELEY: Excuse me, may I ask a question to
6 Dana, prior to the motion, please?

7 MR. SABIR: Prior to the motion? Sure.

8 MS. DEELEY: Yeah, I have a question on this
9 category.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Sure.

11 MS. DEELEY: Dana, these voters received our ID
12 verification letters and they responded by filling out
13 the form that we sent them, contacting us in some
14 other way, correct?

15 MS. ECKROADE: Yes.

16 MS. DEELEY: So these voters, it would be
17 impossible to verify using the form. They would have
18 to send us a copy of their voter ID, right?

19 MS. ECKROADE: It all depends. So, what they're
20 sending back on the form isn't passing, so could be
21 numerous reasons why -- there could be their ID that
22 they're provided is expired. It all depends. We just
23 need them to send back their viable ID.

24 MS. DEELEY: Thank you for your clarification.

25 MS. ECKROADE: You're welcome.

1 MR. SABIR: I move that this board counts the
2 votes in this category. Is there a second?

3 MS. DEELEY: Second.

4 MR. SABIR: Do any commissioners have any
5 comments before we vote?

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I have a
7 question for Dana, if that's okay.

8 MR. SABIR: Please proceed.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Dana, have you verified the ages
10 of these seven individuals?

11 MS. ECKROADE: Yes, I have.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Are all the seven individuals
13 over the age of 65?

14 MS. ECKROADE: No.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Okay. Thank you.

16 MR. SABIR: Okay. Please proceed. Call roll,
17 Secretary Bluestein.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

19 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay. Chairman Sabir?

21 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

22 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification. ID provided
23 opposite of what is on shore file.

24 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I have a question for
25 Dana.

1 MR. SABIR: Sure.

2 MS. DEELEY: (indiscernible).

3 MR. SABIR: Sure.

4 MS. DEELEY: These voters received our ID
5 verification letters, and they responded by filling
6 out the form that we sent them for contacting us in
7 some other way, correct?

8 MS. ECKROADE: Yes.

9 MS. DEELEY: And they provided the opposite of
10 what we asked for or what we needed, correct?

11 MS. ECKROADE: Yes.

12 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 MR. SABIR: I move that this board counts voters
14 in this category. Is there a second?

15 MS. DEELEY: Second.

16 MR. SABIR: Are there any commissioners that
17 have any comments before we vote?

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes, Mr. Chairman, if I may.

19 MR. SABIR: Please proceed.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Dana, how many ballots were there
21 in this category?

22 MS. ECKROADE: 11.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: And of these 11 voters, have you
24 verified the ages?

25 MS. ECKROADE: Yes.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: And are they all over the age of
2 65?

3 MS. ECKROADE: No.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Okay. Because I do believe, as
5 the law currently states, that we can only count
6 ballots for individuals who have not provided
7 verifiable ID if they are 65 or older. So I do have
8 concerns about this category, but thank you.

9 MS. ECKROADE: You're welcome.

10 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, please call a
11 rule.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

13 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay. Chairman Sabir?

15 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

16 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification. ID doesn't match
17 shore file.

18 MR. SABIR: Okay.

19 MS. ECKROADE: We have nine.

20 MR. SABIR: I move that this board does not
21 count votes in this category. Is there a second?

22 MS. DEELEY: Second.

23 MR. SABIR: Do any commissioners like to make a
24 comment before we move? Hearing none, Secretary
25 Bluestein, please call a role.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

2 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

4 MR. SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

5 MS. ECKROADE: ID verification, no response, 152.

6 MR. SABIR: I move that this board does not
7 count voters in this category. Is there a second?

8 MS. DEELEY: Second.

9 MR. SABIR: Any commissioners have any comments
10 before we proceed to vote? Hearing no comments,
11 Secretary Bluestein, please call the roll.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deely?

13 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye. Chairman Sabir?

15 MR. SABIR: Aye. Thank you, Dana.

16 MS. ECKROADE: Thank you, commissioners.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you.

18 MR. SABIR: That brings us to the end of our
19 (indiscernible). Thank you again for all your hard
20 work (indiscernible).

21 MS. ECKROADE: You're very welcome.

22 MR. SABIR: We'll now move to any additional
23 comments by commissioners. Vice Chair Deely, do you
24 have any other business to be read in this meeting?

25 MS. DEELEY: I do not. Thank you.

1 MR. SABIR: Secretary Bluestein, do you have any
2 other business to be read in this meeting?

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I do not. Thank you.

4 MR. SABIR: Thank you, Commissioners.

5 MR. STARBUCHER: Commission, I just have the
6 geekers to sign this unofficial returns?

7 MR. SABIR: We're signing unofficial --

8 MR. STARBUCHER: (indiscernible).

9 MR. SABIR: Correct. So maybe (indiscernible).

10 MR. STARBUCHER: I can make a copy of this and
11 give each one of you a copy.

12 MS. ECKROADE: I sent a copy yesterday. I'll
13 resent --

14 MR. STARBUCHER: Oh, you did?

15 MS. DEELEY: I'll send this one.

16 MR. STARBUCHER: Okay.
