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PROCEEDINGS
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CHAIR SABIR: Good afternoon.
MR. BLUESTEIN: Good afternoon.
MR. RICHARDSON: Good afternoon.
MS. DEELEY: Good afternoon.
CHAIR SABIR: I'm going to call to order the meeting of the Philadelphia City Commissioner's Return Board for Friday, November the 15th, 2024. This meeting is in compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act. Philadelphia City Commissioners, our three-member bipartisan board of elected officials in charge of elections and voter registration for the City of Philadelphia.
Each Commissioner is elected to serve a four-year term that coincides with the municipal election cycle for mayor and city council. The Commissioner set and enforced departmental policies to administer voter registration and conduct elections in accordance with federal and state border registration election laws.

1 The city commissioners were created
2 by the Pennsylvania Assembly in 1711 with a
3 focus on taxation and held various regulatory
4 powers throughout the centuries. The
5 commissioner started maintaining voter lists
6 in 1799 and took on more election related
7 responsibilities but didn't emerge into its
8 current form until the adoption of the
9 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter in 1951.

10 We will start off with public
11 comments. Before beginning their comments,
12 commenters should state where they live or if
13 they are not a resident of Philadelphia and
14 that they are a Philadelphia taxpayer.
15 Public comment is not an opportunity for
16 dialogue or Q&A. It is public comment, a
17 chance for you to tell us what you think.
18 Each speaker will have two minutes to speak.
19 However, I may extend the time at my
20 discretion. Public comment must concern
21 matters on today's meeting agenda.

22 Finally, it is my responsibility to
23 preserve the order and decorum of the
24 meetings. As such, profane and slanderous,

1 discriminatory, or personal attacks will not
2 be tolerated. If you wish to make a public
3 objection to a perceived Sunshine Act
4 violation, please raise your hand and I will
5 recognize you. Outbursts will not be
6 tolerated.

7 For today, public comments are
8 welcome on any agenda item except provisional
9 ballot challenges. We will discuss all
10 challenges during the provisional ballot
11 challenge hearing portion of today's meeting.
12 Anyone wishing to offer a public comment on
13 our mail or provisional ballot sufficiency
14 determinations, please step forward.

15 MS. KERNS: Here.

16 CHAIR SABIR: You want to step over
17 there.

18 MS. KERNS: My name is Linda Kerns,
19 K-E-R-N-S. I reside --

20 CHAIR SABIR: You want to have a
21 seat? Sit on the microphone.

22 MS. KERNS: My name is Linda Kerns,
23 K-E-R-N-S. I reside in Philadelphia and I'm
24 registered to vote in Philadelphia. I'm also

1 here on behalf of the McCormick campaign, the
2 Republican National Committee, and the
3 Pennsylvania Republican Party. With regard
4 to the provisional ballot sufficiency
5 determinations, I understand there's a
6 universe of approximately 7,329 provisional
7 ballots that were set aside during the
8 canvass process.

9 Over the last few days, by the
10 initiative of the workers and the Board of
11 Elections who were reviewing the envelope,
12 our position is that these should be subject
13 to the formal hearing procedure under 25 P.S.
14 3050 so that the parties have a right to
15 voice objections, make argument, and preserve
16 their positions as to each category prior to
17 the board vote.

18 To the extent that the board will
19 not hold hearings on this universe of ballots
20 and will not allow opportunity for parties to
21 be heard before voting, I am noting our
22 objection to that procedure and I am
23 preserving our objection under the relevant
24 Pennsylvania statutes and case law, including

1 25 P.S. 3050. Regarding the provisional
2 ballots at issue, I am also preserving any
3 and all objections under the Pennsylvania
4 Election Code, the relevant and case law,
5 including under 25 P.S. 3050 and 25 PA C.S.A.
6 1904 and 1905.

7 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Is there
8 anyone else? Okay. We will now move to a
9 report from our secretary for email public
10 comments. Commissioner Bluestein, are there
11 any email public comments?

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you,
13 Chairman. We did receive a number of email
14 public comments related to the mail ballot
15 sufficiency determinations. They include
16 emails from Garrett Hughes, Janice Ann, Dana
17 Shephard, Sharon Frankinfield, Kimberly Long,
18 Mahalia Homna, Tarae Esha, Harry Segal,

22 Wishop, Gerrraline Marshall, Eva Rivken,

24 Demetrius Walley, Marlon Sharper, Daniel

1 Alfonzon, Jerry Peck, Joshua Corridine,
2 Enrique Shistermen, Ashley Green, and Amy
3 Carson. These emails were shared with the
4 other commissioners and deputies as soon as
5 possible before this meeting. And I've
6 reviewed them and asked that they be moved
7 into the record.

8 CHAIR SABIR: I too have reviewed
9 them and I move that they be moved into the
10 public records.

11 MS. DEELEY: I also have reviewed
12 them and see that they be moved into the
13 public record.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you very much,
15 Secretary. Before we proceed to new
16 business, I understand this will be a long
17 hearing. So at about 1 o'clock, we'll take
18 about a 15, 20-minute recess. If there's
19 anything, Stenographer, if you need a break,
20 just let us know before that. We will now
21 proceed to new business.

22 We will begin by considering the
23 first agenda item under new business, mail
24 ballot sufficiency determinations. We will

1 call up the deputy executive director of
2 compliance and vote by mail, Dana Eckroade.

3 MS. ECKROADE: Good afternoon,
4 Commissioners.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Good afternoon.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Good afternoon, Dana.

7 MS. ECKROADE: So we have to --

8 CHAIR SABIR: Can you please read
9 the category and number of votes?

10 MS. ECKROADE: Sure. It is number
11 16, ID verification, ID doesn't match your
12 file. We have three voters.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. I move that
14 this board does not count ballots with an ID
15 that doesn't match the SURE files there.
16 Second?

17 MS. DEELEY: Second.

18 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
19 commissioners have any comments before we
20 proceed to vote?

21 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I Have none.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
24 please call the roll.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

2 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

4 Chairman Sabir.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Thank you,
6 Dana.

7 MS. ECKROADE: Thank you.

8 CHAIR SABIR: We will now move to
9 the next item under new business, provisional
10 ballot sufficiency determinations. These
11 categories will be presented by our voter
12 registration administrator, Kevin Richardson.
13 Good afternoon, Kevin.

14 MR. RICHARDSON: Good afternoon,
15 Commissioners.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Can you please read
17 the first category and number of votes?

18 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes. The first
19 category is a not in SURE system. We had
20 3,007 ballots.

21 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
22 board does not count provisional ballots in
23 category not in SURE. Is there a second?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Does anyone want to
2 make a comment before we proceed to vote?

3 MR. BONIN: Mr. Chairman, is this
4 an opportunity for advocates to make
5 arguments before the board as per category?

6 MS. STOHR: We ask that they make
7 public comments during the public comment
8 period or just --

9 MR. BONIN: I had understood your
10 instructions as to provisional ballot
11 questions are heard during the provisional
12 ballot hearing to delay such comments until
13 now.

14 MS. STOHR: Provisional challenges.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Provisional
16 challenges. Okay.

17 MS. STOHR: You want to --

18 CHAIR SABIR: Yeah, go ahead. Can
19 we keep this -- can we stick on the two
20 minutes?

21 MR. BONIN: Absolutely, Mr.
22 Chairman. And the comments --

23 CHAIR SABIR: And I'm just saying
24 if it gets to where as though everybody's

1 making comments, it may even go down a little
2 bit less than that.

3 MR. BONIN: Of course.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Fair enough?

5 MR. BONIN: Absolutely. And these
6 comments are ones which I submitted in
7 writing to the commissioners about an hour
8 ago. And so I will try to summarize them and
9 be brief. As to the inability to find
10 certain voters in the SURE system, we will
11 note that the SURE system can be challenging
12 and it is not always easy to confirm voters
13 in that system and that we've seen in other
14 counties that voters who have been rejected
15 as not registered are in fact in the system,
16 as many as 13 percent in York.

17 We have submitted through email
18 Exhibit A to the letter that I sent about an
19 hour ago approximately 1,000 voters who had
20 been identified as not recognized within the
21 SURE system. As to whom we have located, we
22 believe there are SURE records in the voter
23 file. And what we would ask is that the
24 commissioners and the staff rereview these

1 voter records individually to determine
2 whether they are registered before they are
3 rejected. I want to understand, before I go
4 any further here because I might be able to
5 stop here, does this category also include
6 voters who are located in SURE but registered
7 in other counties?

8 (No verbal response.)

9 MR. BONIN: Okay. Then I will
10 reserve my comments on that until the board
11 gets to that category.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.

13 MR. BONIN: Thank you, Mr.
14 Chairman. Thank you, Commissioner.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I
17 ask you a question before we proceed? If
18 we're going to continue allowing comment for
19 each category for the sufficiency
20 determination, do we just want to make that a
21 note for Ms. Kerns's original objection
22 during the public comment section so that
23 both sides are making argument if that's the
24 way we're going to proceed?

1 MS. KERNS: So I can make a comment
2 now?

3 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

4 MS. KERNS: With regard to this
5 category, my understanding is that the staff
6 took two steps in the SURE system to verify
7 that these voters are not in the SURE system.
8 And it's clear under 25 P.S. 3050(a.4) that
9 if the person is not a registered voter,
10 their provisional ballot should not be
11 counted.

12 Additionally, our election code has
13 a specific procedure with regard to
14 registered voters. If their registrations
15 where canceled, registered voters who were
16 canceled do have the opportunity to fix that.
17 That's under 25 PA C.S.A. 1904 and 1905. The
18 voter would have had to file a petition by
19 the tenth day preceding an election. So any
20 of these would be out of time anyway, so
21 these votes should not be counted under the
22 code.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. When the
24 motion was made, it was seconded. Secretary

1 --

2 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, if I
3 may.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Yes, you may.

5 MS. DEELEY: I don't think that
6 even if we vote to not count NIS, if there
7 are new information for the staff, they can
8 go back -- they should be able to go back and
9 look at it.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yeah. Mr.
11 Chairman, I don't have any objection to that.
12 If before computation we determine that a
13 ballot was inappropriately labeled as not in
14 system and the staff determined that it
15 actually should have been counted, I don't
16 see how voting to not count ballots that are
17 not in the SURE system would preclude that
18 from happening.

19 MS. KERNS: I would say there
20 should be another public hearing on this.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Noted. All right.
22 Please call the roll.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

24 MS. DEELEY: Well, your observers

1 will be able to watch them do it just like

2 they have been watching. I vote aye.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

4 Chairman Sabir.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Commission
6 passes. Please proceed.

7 MR. RICHARDSON: Commissioners, the
8 next category is canceled registrations. We
9 had 841.

10 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
11 board does not count provisional ballots and
12 category canceled registration. Is there a
13 second?

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

15 MS. DEELEY: Second.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
17 commissioners want to make any comments?

18 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

22 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

24 Chairman Sabir.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

2 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
3 is registered in another county. We had
4 1,084.

5 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
6 board does not count provisional ballots in
7 category registered in another county. Is
8 there a second?

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

10 MR. BONIN: Mr. Chairman, may I be
11 heard on this topic?

12 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

13 MR. BONIN: Adam Bonin again, on
14 behalf of Bob Casey for Senate. Given the
15 State Supreme Court's ruling in in re canvass
16 of provisional ballots in the 2024 primary at
17 2024 decision, we would ask the board to
18 reassess these ballots. Based on the new
19 rulings which say that a -- well, it is all
20 set forth in the letter, but based on DOS
21 guidance with regards to voters who have
22 moved recently and given what the Supreme
23 Court has observed about PennDOT changes in
24 voter registration, which the court said may

1 be of questionable validity where no party
2 has identified a vet-- maybe it's been of
3 questionable validity.

4 We believe the board must do a
5 certain level of checking before striking a
6 ballot for a voter marked as out of county,
7 number 1, to check if the voter was a
8 registered voter in Philadelphia, number 2,
9 to check when the voter had their
10 registration switched to another county,
11 number 3, as to whether the voter was
12 automatically reassigned via PennDOT, and
13 number 4, whether the voter has voted in an
14 election since the reassignment.

15 We believe that the vote should
16 count, A, if the voter was a registered
17 Philadelphia voter and moved less than 30
18 days before election day, or two, the voter
19 was a registered Philadelphia voter, was
20 administratively reassigned by PennDOT, and
21 has not voted in another election since that
22 reassignment. And we would urge the board
23 not to strike these ballots until that review
24 consistent with the State Supreme Court's

1 recent ruling has been performed.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Adam.

3 MR. BONIN: Thank you.

4 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, may I
5 ask a question?

6 CHAIR SABIR: Yes, you may.

7 MS. DEELEY: Counselor, if you
8 mind. Is there any evidence of an out-of-
9 county voter having any experience similar to
10 in re canvass of provisional ballots 2024
11 primary election?

12 MR. BONIN: Quite frankly,
13 Commissioner, given how late we received the
14 list of the voters in all the categories,
15 which was Wednesday afternoon at about 4:00
16 p.m., we have been scrambling to reach all of
17 these voters to learn of their experiences,
18 but it really is not a lot of time to gather
19 that sort of evidence. What we know though -
20 -

21 CHAIR SABIR: So Counselor, so just
22 to answer the vice chair's question, so stick
23 to your acknowledge, I believe.

24 MR. BONIN: Excuse me.

1 CHAIR SABIR: She said to your
2 knowledge. Right?

3 MR. BONIN: To my knowledge, I do
4 not have that evidence to prepare and I don't
5 know what voters have submitted any written
6 comments regarding that situation.

7 CHAIR SABIR: So the answer is no?

8 MR. BONIN: That answer is no.

9 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.

11 MR. BONIN: Thank you.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman,
13 before the next commenter speaks, may I just
14 comment on what we just heard?

15 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: I would just add
17 that the list was produced on Wednesday to
18 parties to both sides, but both the
19 Republican party and Democratic party had
20 observers present the entire time. So they
21 had many days' worth of opportunity to see
22 how determinations were being made and to
23 reach out to individual voters if they had
24 concerns about those categories. Thank you.

1 MS. KERNS: Linda Kerns, on behalf
2 of the Dave McCormick campaign. The
3 arguments of the Casey campaign are more
4 suited to the General Assembly to change the
5 laws. We cannot change the rules and
6 procedures now that we're at the end of this
7 game. That is not what this board should do.

8 In addition, I believe counsel
9 misquotes in re canvass of provisional
10 ballots in the 2024 primary election that
11 dealt with one voter who established a new
12 residence. So you cannot extrapolate that
13 out to the 1,084 voters and just speculate
14 that they may have gotten a new residence.

15 So on behalf of the David McCormick
16 campaign, we ask that these not be counted
17 and that the 25 P.S. 3050 be followed, in
18 that, if it's determined that the individual
19 was not registered at that election district,
20 their vote should not count.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Secretary
22 Bluestein, please call the roll.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

24 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

2 Chairman Sabir.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

4 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
5 is voted in person. There is 68.

6 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
7 board does not count provisional ballots in
8 category voted in person. Is there a second?

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
11 want to make any comments?

12 MS. DEELEY: None.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
15 please call the roll.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

17 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

19 Chairman Sabir.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

21 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
22 is return mail-in or absentee ballot that was
23 counted. There were 428.

24 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this

1 board does not count provisional ballots in
2 category return mail-in or absentee ballot
3 that was counted. Is there a second?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 MS. DEELEY: Second.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
7 have any comments?

8 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

12 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

14 Chairman Sabir.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

16 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
17 is not enclosed in a secrecy envelope. We
18 had 743.

19 CHAIR SABIR: I move --

20 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chair --

21 CHAIR SABIR: Let me put my motion
22 first and then you can make your comment.

23 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I have a
24 question for Kevin on this category, please.

1 CHAIR SABIR: On this category?

2 Proceed.

3 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, were these
4 voters determined to be registered voters?

5 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

6 MS. DEELEY: These voters signed
7 the affidavit. Correct?

8 MR. RICHARDSON: Correct.

9 MS. DEELEY: So the only thing
10 wrong with these ballots is that it was not
11 inside a secrecy envelope. Correct?

12 MR. RICHARDSON: That is correct.

13 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. Thank you,
14 Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Sure. Are you making
16 a comment after we make the motion? Just --

17 MR. BONIN: It's a very brief
18 comment, Mr. Chairman. And that's under
19 Section 3053, sub (a.4), sub psi and then
20 double I. The statute does not require that
21 the provisional ballot be contained inside a
22 secrecy envelope. What the statute says is
23 that a provisional ballot shall not be
24 counted if a provisional ballot envelope does

1 not contain a secrecy envelope.

2 In other words, according to the
3 General Assembly, as long as that envelope is
4 in the package, the ballot counts. This is
5 not the same as mail-in ballots. For mail-in
6 ballots, the General Assembly has spoken
7 otherwise, much as I wish they hadn't. But
8 that rule has been set forth. It is not the
9 same rule as it is for mail-in ballots as it
10 is for provisional ballots, and I would urge
11 the commissioners not to apply the same rule
12 because that's not what the General Assembly
13 asked for.

14 The only question is whether the
15 secrecy envelope was inside the provisional
16 ballot. And it's only on that factual basis
17 that any of these ballots can be excluded.

18 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Adam.

19 MR. BONIN: Thank you.

20 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
21 board does not count provisional --

22 MS. KERNS: Oh, I was going to make
23 a comment also.

24 CHAIR SABIR: I'm sorry. Yes.

1 MS. KERNS: Oh, I'm sorry.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Do you have to make a
3 comment every time he make a comment? I just
4 what I know. I'm just trying to be prepared.

5 MS. KERNS: It depends on his
6 comment. So yes, on this one, it would be a
7 yes.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

9 MS. KERNS: On behalf of the
10 McCormick campaign, Linda Kerns. With regard
11 to this category, 3050(a.4)(5)(ii)(c) is
12 clear that these ballots should not be
13 counted if the envelope does not contain a
14 secrecy envelope. And that should be read in
15 conjunction with the part of the statute
16 3050(a.4)(3), which says, "After the
17 provisional ballot has been cast, the
18 individual shall place it in a secrecy
19 envelope." And the General Assembly
20 specifically included the word shall, which
21 means it's required.

22 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
23 board does not count provisional ballots in
24 category not included in the secrecy

1 envelope. Is there a second?

2 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Is there a second?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Proceed, Vice Chair.

6 MS. DEELEY: I believe whether or
7 not a ballot is in a secrecy envelope is not
8 material in determining whether or not such
9 individual is qualified under state law to
10 vote in such election. But unlike the mail
11 ballots where the voters are filling them out
12 on their kitchen table, these voters are
13 doing this process in a polling place. The
14 judge of elections should be instructing them
15 to place their ballot in the secrecy
16 envelope. So this is a poll worker error
17 that we should not be punishing the voter
18 for.

19 Furthermore, the difference here is
20 the provisional ballots are outlined in
21 federal law, the Help America Vote Act, and
22 this is a federal election. State law
23 determines if someone is eligible to vote.
24 If we determine these voters to be registered

1 and that they sign the affidavit and that
2 they have not already voted in another way,
3 then we must count them.

4 PA law has extra hurdles, but
5 putting a ballot in a secrecy envelope has no
6 bearing on whether or not someone is
7 qualified to vote. I believe that PA law is
8 in conflict with the Help America Vote Act.
9 This has not been subject of recent court
10 challenges, and therefore, I believe that
11 these ballots should count.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, I
13 would just add my long-term position that
14 secrecy envelopes should not be a reason for
15 not counting ballots, whether it's
16 provisional ballots or mail ballots in the
17 general sense. But we need to follow the law
18 as we best understand it. So unfortunately,
19 until the legislature or the courts instruct
20 us otherwise, I think we cannot count these
21 ballots.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Can you call the
23 roll, Secretary?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

1 MS. KERNS: No.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

3 Chairman Sabir.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

5 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
6 is the ballot was not signed by the voter.

7 We have 61.

8 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
9 board does not count provisional ballots in
10 the category not signed by voter.

11 MS. DEELEY: Second.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Anyone want to make a
13 comment for this? Any commissioners?

14 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

18 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

20 Chairman Sabir.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

22 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
23 is only one signature by the voter. We have

24 1,270.

1 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I have
2 questions for Kevin on this category, please.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

4 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, was there a
5 signature on the envelope?

6 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, there was.

7 MS. DEELEY: Was the staff able to
8 compare that signature to the registered
9 voter in the SURE system?

10 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

11 MS. DEELEY: In all cases, the
12 signature was determined to be genuine?

13 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

14 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no
17 questions.

18 MR. BONIN: Mr. Chairman, may I be
19 heard on this issue?

20 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

21 MR. BONIN: The Department of State
22 has made clear that it is poll workers'
23 responsibility to ensure that voters sign
24 these fields. All the guidance says the

1 voter must sign. The language literally says
2 poll workers must ensure that the voter signs
3 their name in the presence both of the judge
4 of elections and the minority inspector.
5 Poll workers must ensure that both the judge
6 of elections and minority inspector sign the
7 affidavit.

8 This is a process which is curated
9 by the poll workers. This is not something
10 that voters are expected to do on their own.
11 And unfortunately, what we have seen in this
12 election, despite the best efforts of the
13 commissioners in many cases to train poll
14 workers, are clusters and patterns of errors.
15 I prepared a chart which, thanks to the
16 camera, you can actually see on screen, but
17 I've emailed it to all the commissioners, of
18 where voter signatures are missing.

19 And you can see that there are
20 clusters of polling places. I mean, in 4912,
21 there are 28 different voters whose ballot
22 only has one signature on it, 1813, 22, 3312,
23 20, 5707, 21. That's not because all these
24 voters happen to not understand the law.

1 It's because it wasn't their job to
2 understand the law. It was the poll workers
3 job to instruct them. These voters should
4 not be disenfranchised because of poll worker
5 error.

6 And quite frankly, and we get into
7 this a little bit in the letter, when the
8 Supreme Court ruled on a similar category of
9 ballots earlier this year, they were only
10 looking at one voter who made the error.
11 They did not understand that these errors
12 occur in clusters, number 1. And number 2,
13 the court did not understand and none of the
14 parties briefing this matter explained it to
15 them that the second signature, the affidavit
16 that they are looking at, is on that same
17 ballot envelope as the second signature that
18 they are looking for.

19 This isn't a question of cross
20 checking between three places. Both
21 signatures are supposed to be on the same
22 envelope. The alleged purpose that they --

23 CHAIR SABIR: Counselor, that's it.

24 MR. BONIN: Thank you, Mr.

1 Chairman.

2 MS. KERNS: I should have gotten a
3 closer seat. The position of the McCormick
4 campaign is that the statute is clear and we
5 are bound by the statute. Not only does it
6 say that these ballots should not be counted
7 if they're not signed, 3050 has specific
8 procedures that the voter is required to sign
9 an affidavit and is also required to sign the
10 front of the provisional envelope. The
11 General Assembly was clear on this.

12 We cannot sit here and presuppose
13 what the Supreme Court thought or didn't
14 thought in other cases. That's pure
15 speculation. The law is clear here and it
16 should be followed.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. I move
18 that this board does not count provisional
19 ballots in category only one voter signature.
20 Oh, I'm sorry. Excuse -- you want to make a
21 comment, sir? Yes. Come on. You come up,
22 sir. Sorry, sir. I didn't see you. I'm
23 sorry. I look at them -- you will say your
24 name for the record.

1 MR. HOGGER: Chris Hogger.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Thanks for coming up.
3 Go ahead, please.

4 MR. HOGGER: I arrived at my
5 polling place at 7:05. Mysteriously, the
6 whole box didn't show up, something I've been
7 seeing happen since Catch Street election in
8 this city. So I was given a provisional
9 ballot as my only option, and it was actually
10 from the election judge that was there. She
11 was the one handing them out. She had said
12 she had never seen anything like it in terms
13 of the chaos that was going on at that poll.
14 She was the only one I dealt with dealing
15 with that ballot.

16 To me, the term one-voter signature
17 would be exactly how many you would need. I
18 was not instructed to sign anything. I did
19 not have it reviewed. I handed it back to
20 her, and she dropped it on the floor next to
21 her foot. Not in a box, just on the floor.
22 I asked specifically if I could just come
23 back if the machines were up later and put a
24 vote in then and then you would have the

1 ability to just say, "Hey, no, they already
2 voted." And I was told absolutely, I cannot
3 do that.

4 But it sounds like there was about
5 67 people who did. You just threw their
6 votes out because they vote it in person
7 through a machine when I was told I couldn't
8 do that. So I'm here saying what the hell I
9 got to do to get my vote to count? Right?
10 You're getting ready to throw them out.
11 1,200 other people, you're getting ready to
12 just throw them out. Right? What more do I
13 have to do?

14 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, sir.
15 Thank you. Does any commissioner want to
16 make any comments?

17 MS. DEELEY: Yes.

18 CHAIR SABIR: The floor's yours,
19 Vice Chair.

20 MS. DEELEY: Just to assist in
21 showing everyone what we are talking about
22 here, I would like to display a blank
23 provisional deck envelope because I think
24 that the core of this issue is the lack of

1 understanding that we are asking voters to
2 sign the same envelope twice. The signature
3 boxes are within inches of each other. When
4 reading in re canvass of provisional ballots
5 in the 2024 primary election, I believe that
6 the court erred because this fact was not
7 plain to them.

8 To start, they referred to one
9 signature ballot as "unsigned". Quoting from
10 the majority opinion, "Walsh additionally
11 emphasizes Wagner provided a fully executed
12 affidavit attesting that the ballot was the
13 only one he submitted in that election. As
14 such, Walsh characterizes the envelope
15 signature requirement as unnecessary and
16 superfluous." That affidavit that they are
17 talking about is not on some other piece of
18 paper. It is the signature line on the left
19 side of the envelope that you see on the
20 screen.

21 The decision further spends several
22 pages diving into the meaning of the word
23 shall in the sentence, "shall place his
24 signature on the front of the provisional

1 ballot envelope". In the election code, this
2 sentence refers to the right-side signature
3 box, but nowhere does it mention that the
4 voter had already placed their signature on
5 the front of the provisional envelope on the
6 left side.

7 It then goes on to affirm that the
8 staff must compare the signature on the
9 envelope with the one on the voter SURE
10 record to assess whether it is genuine and
11 executed by the same person who signed the
12 affidavit. I will note that all of this
13 activity of signing provisional ballots is
14 happening in the polling place in front of
15 the election board workers. So I am not sure
16 which situation is occurring where the person
17 signing the left side would be different from
18 the person signing the right side. It seems
19 to me the judge of elections would have put a
20 stop to that if two different people were
21 filling out provisional envelopes.

22 As we heard from Kevin, our staff
23 only needs one of the two signatures to
24 compare it to the SURE system and determine

1 if it is genuine. I am aware of what 25 P.S.
2 3050 says about the need for both signatures,
3 but it would not be the first thing in the
4 election code to be thrown out because it
5 unfairly disenfranchises voters.

6 In conclusion, I believe that the
7 court erred in its decision in re canvass of
8 provisional ballots in the 2024 primary
9 election. I think that if presented the full
10 picture, and I have faith in our law
11 department's ability to do that, they would
12 find, using the buzzwords of the day, that
13 there is no compelling government interest in
14 making voters sign the same piece of paper
15 twice when we only need one to complete our
16 check.

17 I will also note that this decision
18 came out late in the cycle. Our poll worker
19 training had already begun and we were unable
20 to fully communicate the newfound importance
21 on signing both sides. Furthermore, in
22 Luzerne County, where this case originated,
23 their envelopes actually have boxes on both
24 the left and right sides where the voter

1 needs to sign, while we only have it on the
2 right side. This makes it much harder for
3 the voter to notice the two places that they
4 need to sign. Thank you.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Sure. Secretary.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you, Mr.
7 Chairman. I just want to thank Chris for
8 coming out and telling us your story about
9 your experience on Election Day. I also want
10 to say I agree with the Vice Chair in
11 principle that there is no compelling
12 interest that we should require two
13 signatures when one should suffice. But we
14 are bound by what the statute says and the
15 recent Supreme Court ruling. And if we are
16 appealed and the Supreme Court decides
17 differently, then they have every right to do
18 that, but absent further action by the court,
19 I think we're bound to follow what was
20 instructed to us by them.

21 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
22 board does not count provisional ballots in
23 category only one voter signature. Is there
24 a second?

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
3 please call the roll.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

5 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
7 Chairman Sabir.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

9 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
10 is the signature does not match what we have
11 in SURE, and there was one.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, do you have
13 it --

14 CHAIR SABIR: You want to put on
15 the screen?

16 MR. RICHARDSON: No, I don't have
17 it with me.

18 MS. DEELEY: We can come back to
19 it.

20 MR. RICHARDSON: Sure. Yeah. So
21 the next --

22 CHAIR SABIR: So we'll come back to
23 category 9. Okay. Please proceed to the
24 next category.

1 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
2 was not signed by board workers. There was
3 564.

4 MR. BONIN: Mr. Chairman, I can be
5 pretty brief on this. In addition to all of
6 the arguments stated before as to -- this is
7 a process curated by poll workers, and voters
8 should not be disenfranchised for their
9 errors. I only need to note that the statute
10 itself in 3050, where it lists the reasons
11 why a provisional ballot shall not be counted
12 under (a.4), subsection 5, subsection II, I
13 have this on the screen here, it lists five
14 categories. "Wasn't signed by the poll
15 worker" is not listed among them.

16 And the Supreme Court has been
17 clear, where the statute lists consequences
18 for certain actions, they have to be
19 followed. But where it lists some and
20 excludes it for others, that means that it's
21 not a reason to throw out a ballot. The
22 General Assembly was clear on the reasons why
23 provisional ballots shall not be counted.
24 This is not among those enumerated reasons

1 all these ballots should be counted.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.

3 Counselor.

4 MS. KERNS: With regard to this
5 category, the statute is clear that the
6 election board workers must sign these
7 affidavits. And that is in place to prevent
8 fraud and to make sure that the election
9 board workers see these provisional ballots
10 and are seeing that the actual voter is
11 signing them.

12 We can't guess what is happening or
13 whether or not the judge of elections and the
14 other board workers saw this. The reason we
15 don't have to guess is because the General
16 Assembly put this in the statute. If the
17 election board workers didn't follow the
18 statute, that's an entirely different
19 proceeding. It has nothing to do with these
20 specific ballots. It has to do with whether
21 or not the election board workers did their
22 job.

23 And with regard to the training, if
24 it was not in the training, well, it was

1 always in the statute. So it should have
2 been in the training whether or not the in re
3 canvassing case came out from the primary
4 election. So we're asking that these ballots
5 not be counted.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.

7 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I
8 ask Kevin a question?

9 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, do we have
11 any reason to believe that these ballots did
12 not follow the proper chain of custody and
13 weren't returned to us on election night?

14 MR. RICHARDSON: No.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Vice Chair, do you
17 have any questions?

18 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

19 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
20 counts provisional ballots in the category of
21 not signed by board workers. Is there a
22 second?

23 MS. DEELEY: Second.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,

1 please call the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

5 Chairman Sabir. CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please
6 proceed.

7 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
8 is no ward division on the declaration
9 envelope. There's 59.

10 CHAIR SABIR: 59

11 MR. BONIN: Mr. Chairman, I could
12 view this for standing. This isn't a
13 requirement in the statute. It's not listed
14 as a reason in the election code as a reason
15 to exclude a ballot. These ballots should be
16 counted.

17 MS. KERNS: No, case by case basis.
18 I'm not going to say anything on this one.

19 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
20 counts provisional ballots in the category of
21 no ward division on envelope. Is there a
22 second?

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

24 MS. DEELEY: Second. And then, if

1 I may.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Go ahead.

3 MS. DEELEY: Simply put, the voters
4 should not be disenfranchised for mistakes by
5 election board workers. The warden division
6 information is located on the section of the
7 provisional ballot envelope that is to be
8 filled out by the election board worker, not
9 the voter. The voter should not be penalized
10 for mistakes by the election board workers.

11 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, do you
12 have any comment?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no comment
14 to add. Thank you.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Please proceed to
16 vote.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

18 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

20 Chairman Sabir.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

22 MR. RICHARDSON: The next category
23 is other. I have none.

24 CHAIR SABIR: So we're going to go

1 back to the category of the signature does
2 not match for that category. It's category
3 number 9 on the agenda.

4 MS. STOHR: So you can see on the
5 screen -- sorry. Alison Stohr. You can see
6 on the screen the provisional ballot, and it
7 lists the names Jameal Maddox. And one of
8 our staff has written in Jameal Stevens. And
9 you can see the signatures here and here.
10 And Kevin is going to pull up the SURE file
11 for this voter.

12 MS. DEELEY: Can you put that on
13 the screen? The SURE --

14 MS. STOHR: Oh, which is on the
15 Commissioners' screens. Thank you, Nick.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I
17 ask Kevin a question?

18 CHAIR SABIR: Yes, you may.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, is there no
20 Jameal Maddox registered? The staff
21 determined that this person, Jameal Stevens,
22 is Jameal Maddox?

23 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes, Commissioner.
24 If you look, his former name was Jameal

1 Stevens Maddox and he changed his name
2 without notifying us.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Understood. Thank
4 you.

5 MR. RICHARDSON: So he wrote Jameal
6 Maddox on this thing, but he's called Jameal
7 Stevens.

8 CHAIR SABIR: So Kevin, you spoke
9 to that -- you spoke to him? Did y'all
10 communicate with this --

11 MR. RICHARDSON: I'm sorry,
12 Commissioner. I didn't hear you.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Did you communicate
14 with Jameal?

15 MR. RICHARDSON: I have not.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I
17 make comment? From my visualization, even
18 though the last name is different, Jameal is
19 signed similarly enough that I don't see it
20 being a mismatched signature from that
21 perspective.

22 MS. DEELEY: Yeah. Mr. Chairman,
23 if I may.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

1 MS. DEELEY: I think that the J is
2 pretty distinctive. And the first name, the
3 signature looks the same.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. So I move that
5 this board counts the provisional ballots
6 with signature does -- in a category
7 signatures does not match. Is there a
8 second?

9 MS. DEELEY: Second.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
11 please call the roll.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

13 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

15 Chairman Sabir.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. So that's all
17 the forms. Is it?

18 MR. RICHARDSON: That concludes
19 categories, Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Huh?

21 CHAIR SABIR: That concludes the
22 categories, Mr. Chairman.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you, Kevin. I
24 appreciate you. You got to that pretty good.

1 Okay. It's getting close to 1 o'clock. I
2 know I said around 1 o'clock, but let's just
3 -- hold on. Slow down. I heard you. Just
4 hold on. I said we're going to take a 10-
5 minute recess as we transition into the
6 challenges.

7 MS. STOHR: Can I?

8 CHAIR SABIR: Yeah.

9 MS. STOHR: The attorneys actually
10 have a call at 1 p.m., Chairman. So I wonder
11 if maybe I can give an overview of the
12 process and then when we come back, we can
13 just begin the challenge hearings.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Sure also. Okay,
15 everybody. I'm just --

16 MS. STOHR: Just for the record, my
17 name is Alison Stohr, A-L-I-S-O-N S-T-O-H-R,
18 deputy city solicitor for the Philadelphia
19 Law Department and counselor to the Board of
20 Elections. So the provisional challenge
21 hearing process is going to follow these
22 steps. I will read up -- I will present the
23 category that a challenge falls into, and I
24 will read the number of provisional ballots

1 that fall into that category. I'll give a
2 short explanation of what that category is
3 and a summary of the staff determinations in
4 each category. Then any challenged voters
5 who are here at the public hearing are
6 welcome to provide comments.

7 I will then read into the
8 transcript any emails we received from voters
9 in that category who submitted testimony.
10 Then we will allow any challengers or
11 attorneys representing challengers in that
12 category to speak, followed by attorneys
13 representing voters whose ballots were
14 challenged or anyone opposing the challenge
15 to speak. Then voters will have the ability
16 to respond if they would like to respond to
17 anything that those folks have said. Then
18 the commissioners will take a vote on that
19 category of challenged provisional ballots.
20 Any questions? Okay. Can't wait to have a
21 challenge hearing.

22 (Off the record.)

23 CHAIR SABIR: Good afternoon. We
24 now resume for our hearings. We'll call on

1 Alison.

2 MS. STOHR: Good afternoon,
3 commissioners. The first category for our
4 challenge provisional ballots are blank
5 forms. We have four blank forms, and the
6 staff has determined that two of them should
7 be a full count and two of them should be not
8 counted because they only had one voter
9 signature. I'll show you each of the forms
10 and you'll see that there is no reason --
11 well, I got to zoom in. You will see that
12 there is no reason on each of the forms.
13 Those are the four blank challenges.

14 I'll now invite any voters who are
15 here to speak on this category to come up.
16 We received no emailed voter comments. Would
17 anyone from the challengers want to speak on
18 this? Anyone representing the voters being
19 challenged want to speak on this? You have
20 to come talk into the microphone.

21 MR. BONIN: Sure. One sentence,
22 Mr. Chairman. Adam Bonin, on behalf of Casey
23 for Senate. If there's no reason provided,
24 the voter has no notice as to the basis for

1 the challenge, and we believe that the
2 challenge should just be summarily rejected.

3 MS. STOHR: That concludes all
4 testimony for this category.

5 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
6 board rejects challenges as an invalid and
7 follow staff determination. Is there a
8 second?

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Does any commissioner
11 want to make any comments? Hearing none,
12 we'll proceed to vote. Secretary Bluestein,
13 please call the roll.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

15 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote Aye.

17 Chairman Sabir.

18 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

19 MS. STOHR: The next category of
20 provisional challenges is no provisional
21 reason selected. So if you look at the
22 provisional ballot, there is this area here
23 where a poll worker can check the reason that
24 the provisional ballot is being provided. In

1 this category, we have 229 provisional
2 ballots. Staff had determined that 163 of
3 them should be a full count. 59 of them
4 should be -- am I looking at the right
5 category? Sorry. Yeah, 59 of them should be
6 a partial count and seven of them should be
7 not counted, two because they had a canceled
8 record and five because the ballot only had
9 one voter signature.

10 Are any voters represented in this
11 category here who would like to speak? We
12 did receive several emails in this category
13 that I'll read into the record. The first
14 one is from Pete Campion, who wrote, "I was
15 working as a clerk on election day so I could
16 not go to my voting center." The second is
17 from Ann Rollins Bonay, who wrote, "I just
18 located a Philadelphia website with a list of
19 provisional ballot challenges and see that my
20 name is included on that list. I remain very
21 concerned that the Philadelphia hotline
22 worker I spoke with told me that there was no
23 action needed.

24 Here is additional information

1 about my provisional ballot. On the day
2 before the election, I learned that the City
3 had improperly canceled my registration. I
4 called the PA voter hotline and was
5 transferred several times, ultimately to a
6 satellite office in Philadelphia. The
7 election worker I spoke with at the satellite
8 office confirmed this was an error on the
9 city's part. I had previously completed a
10 form to cancel my mail ballot request so that
11 I could vote in person on election day.

12 The election worker I spoke with
13 confirmed that, instead, the office had
14 improperly canceled my registration. The
15 election worker corrected the issue
16 immediately so that I was again properly
17 registered to vote, but it was not completed
18 in time for my name to appear in the poll
19 book.

20 On election day, I completed a
21 provisional ballot. The reason listed for
22 the challenge to my ballot is reason for
23 provisional ballot not checked, but I very
24 distinctly remember the judge of election

1 saying that she was selecting the reason that
2 my name was not in the poll book. My full
3 name is Ann Rollins Bonay," and then she
4 provides contact information.

5 The next email is from Ariadnay
6 Duboy, and she says, "I, Ariadnay Duboy,
7 submitted a provisional ballot after
8 receiving a mail-in ballot which was
9 misplaced but not submitted." And finally,
10 Amir Osani wrote, "Whatever I selected Bob
11 Casey on a split ticket with Trump and Trump
12 already beat Kamala, this only hurts Bob
13 Casey and so therefore don't count my ballot
14 for this stupid reason."

15 Those are all of the emailed
16 comments from voters in this category. We
17 will now proceed to the challengers in this
18 category if they would like to speak.

19 MS. KERNS: Linda Kerns, on behalf
20 of the McCormick campaign. First, can we
21 make that an exhibit that's part of the
22 transcript, that chart that's on the -- can I
23 ask that so that the transcript is a little
24 bit clearer?

1 MS. STOHR: Yes.

2 MS. KERNS: So just so I'm clear,
3 some of these were not counted under other
4 categories, Ms. Stohr?

5 MS. STOHR: Yes, that is correct.
6 They were challenged and then reviewed. And
7 upon review, the final staff determination is
8 listed in this chart.

9 MS. KERNS: So with regard to these
10 challenges, we ask that they not be counted
11 because under the statute, it's required that
12 the voter signs the affidavit and also check
13 off the reason for casting the provisional
14 ballots. So that is clearly required by the
15 statute, and we should follow the law as
16 enacted by the General Assembly.

17 MS. STOHR: Anyone else from the
18 challengers who wishes to speak? We'll now
19 hear from people representing voters whose
20 ballots were challenged.

21 MR. BONIN: Thank you. And I
22 actually want to put the sample ballot back
23 on the screen. Oh, here's where the camera
24 is. It's actually very clear when you look

1 at the ballot envelope that the reason for
2 the ballot, contrary to what my learned
3 colleague said, the reason for ballot is for
4 election officials only to provide. It is
5 not a thing for the voters to provide at all.

6 Therefore, number 1 is subsumed
7 within our previous arguments about poll
8 worker not disenfranchising voters, nor am I
9 actually aware of any place within the
10 election code that this information is
11 required. It is certainly not enumerated on
12 the list of reasons to exclude a ballot.
13 Beyond that, I'm just going to say right now,
14 everything that I said in the prior hearing
15 with regards to missing signatures, the board
16 should consider it as applied to all other
17 categories where they're missing. I don't
18 need to repeat them. You don't need to hear
19 it again, but thank you.

20 MS. STOHR: Is there anyone else
21 who would like to speak on this category?
22 That concludes testimony for this category.

23 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Yes.

1 MS. DEELEY: If I may.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Yes, you may.

3 MS. DEELEY: I would ask that we
4 should be counting the votes -- we should be
5 counting the ones that have one voter
6 signature, and I ask that if we can have two
7 votes and separate out the one voter
8 signature.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Are you making a
10 motion?

11 MS. DEELEY: I'm making a request
12 before the motion is voted on.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Are you making it?
14 You're asking for an additional vote. Is
15 that correct?

16 MS. DEELEY: Yes, I'm asking that
17 the one signature be pulled out and we vote
18 on them separately.

19 CHAIR SABIR: That sounds like a
20 motion. Is there a second? Hearing no
21 second, we will proceed. I move that this
22 board rejects challenges and follows staff
23 determination. Is there a second?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
2 please call the roll.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

4 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
6 Chairman Sabir?

7 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

8 MS. STOHR: The next category is
9 missing board worker signature. So this
10 category involves provisional ballot
11 declaration envelopes where either one or
12 both of these signatures before the judge of
13 elections or the minority inspector were
14 missing from the provisional ballot. In this
15 category, we had 99 ballots. The staff
16 determined that 68 of them should be full
17 counts, 28 of them should be partial counts,
18 and three of them should be not counted, one
19 because -- or two because they were missing
20 one voter signature and one because the voter
21 voted in person.

22 Are there any voters who fall into
23 this category who would like to provide
24 testimony? We did receive several emailed

1 comments in this category. The first is from
2 Mckensy Shaffer. "Hello. My name is Mckensy
3 Shaffer, and I received an email that stated
4 my provisional ballot has been challenged due
5 to a missing board worker signature. I spoke
6 to someone on the phone today and let them
7 know I am unable to come to the hearing
8 tomorrow afternoon and they directed me to
9 send all my information to this email. My
10 voter registration number, address, and full
11 name is below. Please let me know if you
12 need more information." And then she lists
13 her contact information.

14 The next email is from Amber Eric.
15 "Hello. I received an email this morning
16 saying that my provisional ballot has been
17 challenged because the board worker did not
18 sign it. Is there a way to remedy this so my
19 ballot can be counted?" And she lists her
20 voter registration number.

21 The next email is from Megan
22 Claiborn, who says, "Good afternoon. I can
23 see that my provisional ballot is being
24 challenged for lack of an election official

1 signature. I am unable to make the hearing
2 tomorrow as I am out of town. However, I can
3 confirm that I submitted a provisional ballot
4 after I misplaced placed my mail-in ballot
5 and I personally watched the election
6 official sign the envelope on at least one
7 place. Respectfully, I hope my vote is
8 counted in this very important and close
9 election. Thank you."

10 The final email is from Cherry
11 Chadwick, who writes, "Hello, County Board of
12 Elections. There were judges and election
13 officials there. Please let me know how to
14 move forward. Not sure what the confusion
15 is. Please advise. Thank you for contacting
16 me, your time, and attention to this matter."
17 Those were all the emailed comments in this
18 category. Would someone representing the
19 challengers like to speak?

20 MS. KERNS: Yes. This is Linda
21 Kerns on behalf of --

22 MS. STOHR: Make sure your
23 microphone is on, Linda.

24 MS. KERNS: Linda Kerns on behalf

1 of the David McCormick campaign. And because
2 25 P.S. 3050(a.4)(2) requires that the
3 affidavit be signed by both the judge of
4 elections and minority inspector, we would
5 like these challenges upheld and these
6 ballots not to be counted because the
7 election code requires that the judge of
8 elections and the minority inspector sign
9 these provisional ballot envelopes.

10 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else from
11 the challengers like to speak? Those
12 representing ballots being challenged or
13 others opposing this challenge can speak now.

14 MR. BONIN: That's what I said
15 before.

16 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else like
17 to speak on this category? That concludes
18 testimony for this category.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Does anyone, the
20 commissioners want to make comment on this
21 category before we proceed?

22 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Sure.

24 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I would

1 just like to state that I believe that we
2 should be counting the two one-voter
3 signature.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.
5 Secretary.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have nothing to
7 add. Thank you.

8 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
9 board rejects challenges and follows staff
10 determination. Is there a second?

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

12 MS. DEELEY: Second.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
14 please call the roll.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

16 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

18 Chairman Sabir.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

20 MS. STOHR: The next category is
21 voter information missing. This category
22 includes any challenges where some part of an
23 address, a date of birth, a current address,
24 some part of this affidavit was missing

1 information.

2 In this category, there were 44
3 challenges. The staff determined that 22 of
4 those ballots should be fully counted, 16
5 should be partially counted and six should
6 not be counted, one because it had a canceled
7 record, one because there was a mail-in
8 ballot that was cancelled, and one that's not
9 on the spreadsheet. One moment. Love to do
10 math while people are watching. Oh, sorry.
11 I missed -- okay. I'm just bad at reading a
12 spreadsheet. Two because there was one voter
13 signature, one because it was registered out
14 of county, and one because they voted in
15 person.

16 Are there any voters in this
17 category that would like to speak? We did
18 not receive any emails in this category, so
19 we'll now proceed to the challengers in this
20 category. Would they like to speak?

21 MS. KERNS: Yes. Linda Kerns on
22 behalf of the McCormick campaign. As I noted
23 previously, under 25 P.S. 3050(a.4)(2), this
24 information in the affidavit is required by

1 the statute, which includes the voter's name,
2 date of birth, where they were registered,
3 what county they reside in. So we ask that
4 these challenges be upheld because these
5 ballots were not filled out correctly.

6 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else from
7 the challengers like to speak? Then we'll
8 move to those representing ballots being
9 challenged.

10 MR. BONIN: Adam Bonin on behalf of
11 Bob Casey for Senate. As before, the General
12 Assembly set forth the specific reasons for
13 which a provisional ballot shall not be
14 counted. This is not listed among those
15 reasons. And therefore, while the voters may
16 have been directed by the forum and by
17 statute to provide this information, because
18 this is not listed as a reason for the ballot
19 to be excluded, the staff recommendation
20 should be upheld and the challenges should be
21 denied.

22 MS. STOHR: Is there anyone else
23 who would like to speak on this category?
24 That concludes testimony in this category?

1 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. I move
2 that the board reject challenges and follow
3 staff determination. Is there a second?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
6 have any comments?

7 MS. DEELEY: Mr. Chairman, I would
8 just like to state again that I believe that
9 we should be counting the two one-voter
10 signature ballots. I vote aye.

11 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.
12 Secretary, please call the roll.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

14 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
16 Chairman Sabir.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

18 MS. STOHR: The next category is
19 already voted. These are voters who voted by
20 some other method. There were three
21 challenges in this category. All three of
22 them were determined by staff that they
23 should not be counted, two because they had a
24 mail-in ballot that was counted and one

1 because the voter voted in person. Would the
2 challengers like to speak on this category?

3 MS. KERNS: Yes. We ask that these
4 challenges be upheld. The statute is clear
5 that the County Board of Elections must
6 confirm that the individual did not cast any
7 other ballot. It's clear that these three
8 voters did. So we ask that the challenges be
9 upheld.

10 MS. STOHR: Would those
11 representing voters with challenged ballots
12 in this category like to speak? Is there
13 anyone else who would like to speak on this
14 category? That concludes testimony on this
15 category.

16 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
17 board rejects challenges and follow the staff
18 determination. Is there a second?

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Is there any comments
21 from any commissioners on this category?

22 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, I
24 just want to make it clear for the record

1 that the challengers are asking us to not
2 count these ballots. The staff have
3 determined to not count these ballots. So it
4 makes the challenge unnecessary, which is why
5 I believe the motion to reject it makes
6 sense. Thank you.

7 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

9 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

11 Chairman Sabir.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

13 MS. STOHR: The next category is
14 challenges alleging that there was a missing
15 voter signature. There are 34 of these
16 challenges filed, and staff determined that
17 one of those should be a partial count and 33
18 of those should not be counted because they
19 only had -- because they were either not
20 signed by the voter at all or only had one
21 voter signature. Do the commissioners want
22 any more information about the ballots in
23 this category?

24 (No verbal response.)

1 MS. STOHR: Great. Are there any
2 voters who would like to speak on this
3 category? The challengers in this category
4 are invited to speak.

5 MS. KERNS: Yes. Linda Kerns on
6 behalf of the McCormick campaign. These
7 challenges were made because the election
8 board workers were not following the
9 procedure and not setting these ballots aside
10 due to the issues with only having one voter
11 signature. So we're asking that these
12 challenges be upheld.

13 There appears to be one that on the
14 chart provided by the law department, it just
15 indicates partial count. It's voter number
16 01 -- well, it's line number 391 in the
17 chart, and it's voter number 014951929-51.
18 And under the reason not to count, it's
19 blank. And the staff determined partial
20 count.

21 MS. STOHR: So this is the ballot,
22 and you can see that there are, in fact, two
23 voters.

24 MS. KERNS: So that was a mistake.

1 So that challenge would be withdrawn. Yeah.

2 MS. STOHR: Would someone from the
3 challenged voters or voters who had their
4 provisional ballots challenged like to speak?
5 Is there anyone else who would like to speak
6 on this category? That concludes testimony
7 in this category.

8 CHAIR SABIR: So Alison, so since
9 she said she withdrew her challenge, so we
10 don't have to vote on that?

11 MS. KERNS: No, just on that one.

12 CHAIR SABIR: So on that one.
13 Okay.

14 MS. STOHR: So yes, you could vote
15 on the 33 ballots alleged to be missing a
16 voter signature.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. I moved that
18 this board rejects the challenges and follow
19 the staff determination. Is there a second?

20 MS. KERNS: Wait.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They're
23 rejecting them because the staff
24 determination --

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: I would just state
2 again --

3 CHAIR SABIR: Excuse me. Got to
4 keep your voice down, please.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may
6 I?

7 CHAIR SABIR: Oh, I was talking to
8 --

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Just to state again
10 for the record, the reason that the challenge
11 is being rejected is because the staff have
12 determined not to count these ballots. So
13 the challenge is requesting the ballots to
14 not be counted, and we are voting to not
15 count them.

16 MS. KERNS: So just so I'm clear --
17 because when we challenged them we did not
18 have the staff determination at the time, but
19 now we do. Okay, I get it. Okay. Thank
20 you.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
22 commissioners want to make any comments on
23 the motion?

24 MS. DEELEY: No comment.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Hearing none, please
2 proceed to vote.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

4 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
6 Chairman Sabir.

7 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

8 MS. STOHR: The next category is
9 voter signature issues. I think it's easiest
10 to explain these by just reviewing each one.
11 So in this one, the challenge was that the
12 voter did not -- oh, hey, here we go. Okay.
13 There are four ballots. This one, the
14 challenge was that the voter did not sign the
15 affidavit in the correct area. And you will
16 see the provisional here that the voter has
17 signed here and here. And the staff
18 determination on this ballot was a partial
19 count.

20 The next challenge just says
21 signature. And you will see that the voter
22 has signed here, and the staff determination
23 was a full count, which may be a mistake by
24 the staff. Well, I'm sure we'll be talking

1 about it in court in a few days. The next
2 challenge is incomplete signature on the
3 right. This is the ballot. You will see one
4 signature here and another signature here.
5 And the staff determination was a full count.

6 And finally, we have a challenge,
7 the signature was not in the correct
8 affidavit spot. You will see similar to the
9 first ballot, the voter has signed here and
10 here. And the staff determined that this
11 should be a partial count. Are there any
12 voters in this category that would like to be
13 heard? Would someone from the challengers
14 like to be heard on this category? Sure.
15 Commissioner Deeley.

16 MS. DEELEY: Alison, could you pull
17 that Matthews envelope up again, please?

18 MS. STOHR: Yes.

19 MS. DEELEY: So could the signature
20 -- I mean, the second line under the X looks
21 just like the signature line.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I think we need
23 Kevin to pull it up in shorter to determine
24 that.

1 MS. DEELEY: Can you pull that for
2 me, please?

3 MS. STOHR: Kevin, can you see the
4 SURE ID? I can read it aloud if that's
5 helpful.

6 MR. RICHARDSON: I can see it.

7 MS. KERNS: Ms. Stohr, can I ask a
8 question?

9 MS. STOHR: Sure.

10 MS. KERNS: With regard to the
11 partial count, is that because there was
12 another issue with the residents of the
13 voter.

14 MS. STOHR: It means that the voter
15 voted in a ward and division different than
16 the ward and division where they're
17 registered. And so their vote can only be
18 counted for races that align between those
19 two divisions.

20 MS. KERNS: So essentially, these
21 ballots have two issues. They have signature
22 issues and potentially didn't vote in their
23 own district?

24 MS. STOHR: That's not an issue.

1 That's just a way that we determine what will
2 be counted.

3 MS. KERNS: Okay.

4 MS. DEELEY: Alison.

5 MS. STOHR: Yes.

6 MS. DEELEY: I would just like to
7 state for the record that looking at the SURE
8 record, it does indicate that Mr. Matthews
9 does use printed letters as his signature.
10 It matches.

11 CHAIR SABIR: And I agree with
12 that.

13 MS. STOHR: Noted. Where were we?
14 The challengers were about to talk. Did you
15 talk already, Linda?

16 MS. KERNS: Not yet. So on behalf
17 of the McCormick campaign, Linda Kerns. We
18 would ask that these challenges be upheld and
19 these ballots not be counted because they
20 were not signed correctly.

21 MS. STOHR: Would anyone from the
22 challenged voters like to be heard?

23 MR. BONIN: If I could be heard
24 briefly. I believe I saw on at least one of

1 these challenges that they were an observer
2 on behalf of Kennedy Goodwin. I forget which
3 one it was. Yeah. My understanding is that
4 Kennedy Goodwin was a congressional candidate
5 in the fifth congressional district, which
6 within the City of Philadelphia comprises a
7 very small part of South Philadelphia.

8 I would question the standing of
9 the observer on behalf of that candidate to
10 challenge anything outside of that district.
11 And I want to make sort of a blanket
12 objection to crediting any objection which
13 has been made by an observer on behalf of a
14 candidate who would not be affected in any
15 way by the counting or not counting of that
16 ballot.

17 MS. STOHR: Is there anyone else
18 who would like to be heard on this category?
19 That concludes testimony in this category.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, can
21 Alison put up number 415 again, please?

22 MS. STOHR: Oh, gosh. Can you tell
23 me the voter name?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I believe that is

1 Kliver.

2 MS. STOHR: Sure.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Because I believe
4 that 414, 416, and 417 all had two
5 signatures, it looked like, and this one only
6 has one.

7 MS. STOHR: Yes, that appears to be
8 correct.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: So is the intention
10 of the board to vote on this entire category
11 or by ballot or how do we want to proceed,
12 Mr. Chairman?

13 CHAIR SABIR: I'm saying do the
14 whole category, but if you want to make a
15 motion to exclude one --

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes, I would like
17 to make a motion to separate out this ballot
18 from the other three as I believe that the
19 staff made a mistake in the determination of
20 how to count this ballot separate from the
21 others.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. So you want to
23 -- what's that number for the record? What's
24 that number --

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: 415.

2 CHAIR SABIR: 415. Okay. So I'll
3 second that. Vice Chair Deeley, do you want
4 to make a statement on that?

5 MS. DEELEY: No, I have none.

6 CHAIR SABIR: You want to proceed
7 to vote on that?

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yeah. Vice Chair
9 Deeley.

10 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
12 Chairman Sabir.

13 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. So just for the
14 record sakes, we're segregating 415 from this
15 category. Okay. So for the rest of those
16 ballots in this category, I move that the
17 board rejects the challenges and follow the
18 staff determination for the category. Is
19 there a second?

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
22 commissioners have any comments? Please
23 proceed to vote.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

1 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

3 Chairman Sabir.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Alison, Please
5 proceed.

6 MS. STOHR: The next category is
7 signature mismatch.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Excuse me, Mr.
9 Chairman. Before we proceed, I think we have
10 to vote on 415 because we just pulled 415
11 out.

12 CHAIR SABIR: That motion was just
13 to pull it out.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Right. So now we
15 have to vote on whether to count the ballot
16 or not. It's a one signature ballot
17 question.

18 CHAIR SABIR: I thought we ruled on
19 that category.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: So the motion I
21 made was to pull 415 out separately, to do a
22 second separate vote. So we just voted on
23 416 -- we just voted on 414, 416, and 417.
24 So now we would just need to vote on 415

1 before Alison proceeds.

2 MS. DEELEY: You want to make a
3 motion?

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: If you'd like, I
5 can make a motion to reject the staff
6 recommendation, to make this a full count
7 upholding the challenge, and to not count
8 this ballot.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Second. Any
10 commissioners want to make a comment?
11 Hearing none, please call the roll.

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

13 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
15 Chairman Sabir.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you,
18 Chairman.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Alison, please
20 proceed.

21 MS. STOHR: The next category is a
22 very fun one. It is signature mismatch.
23 There were 29 ballots in this category. The
24 staff determined that 18 of these should be

1 full counts, seven of them should be partial
2 counts, and four of them should not be
3 counted because there was indeed a signature
4 mismatch.

5 I think the easiest way to proceed
6 this category is to go through each one
7 individually, and Kevin can look up the SURE
8 system ID. And if that voter is here, they
9 are welcome to make comments. And then we
10 will have universal comments by the attorneys
11 at the end. So the first signature mismatch
12 challenge is here. It says the signatures
13 don't match SURE system. This is the ballot
14 of the voter. And Kevin will pull up the
15 SURE system ID.

16 MS. SNYDER: Since the SURE system
17 thing isn't over there and I'd like to
18 possibly address these, can I just look over
19 Kevin's shoulder? Are we okay with that?
20 And Kevin, is that okay with you?

21 MS. STOHR: He's used to having
22 people look over his shoulder. The staff
23 determination on this ballot was don't count,
24 and the reason given was signature mismatch.

1 CHAIR SABIR: So Counselor.

2 MS. STOHR: Yes.

3 CHAIR SABIR: So we're going to
4 vote on each --

5 MS. STOHR: I mean, it may make
6 sense to vote on each of these individually.
7 Yes.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Individually. Okay.

9 MS. STOHR: Yes.

10 MS. SNYDER: We ask --

11 MS. STOHR: Oh, yes. Is the voter
12 here? If not, would someone from the
13 challenger like to speak? The challenger was
14 Goodwin.

15 MS. KERNS: Right. And I would
16 just like to note on behalf of the McCormick
17 campaign that on the chart provided by the
18 law department where it notes challenger, all
19 of the Republican candidates were bound by
20 the procedures of the city commissioner's
21 office, in that we submitted lists of
22 observers and then we submitted lists of our
23 authorized representatives who would be
24 challenging.

1 And the staff is the one who
2 basically assigned us to the individual
3 candidates. So we really had no control over
4 what candidate we were observing for. We
5 just had observers on behalf of all of our
6 candidates so this would go quicker so that
7 we could have 10 observers in there rather
8 than just one on behalf of McCormick. So I
9 just wanted to note that to begin with.

10 And then we agree with the
11 determination of the worker that this should
12 not be -- that this ballot should not be
13 counted because it is a signature mismatch.
14 And the statute is clear that when the
15 signature does not appear genuine or not
16 executed by the voter, it should not be
17 counted under (a.4)(5)(ii)(b).

18 MS. STOHR: Would anyone
19 representing voters being challenged like to
20 speak? And you need to do so into a
21 microphone.

22 MS. SNYDER: Commissioners, I would
23 ask you to consider the fact that the
24 signature on the SURE system is such that it

1 shows initials and that it certainly can be
2 taken that this could be a match. We don't
3 know or I don't have in front of me the date
4 that this person registered to vote, how they
5 did so, whether they did so on a screen
6 versus on paper, but certainly that mark from
7 that voter doesn't show that it's different.

8 For example, had that voter written
9 out their whole name and the signature was
10 substantially different, then we might say
11 that there are material errors. But where
12 someone has made their mark as initials,
13 they've shown an intention to make their
14 mark. And here they've written out a full
15 signature. This absolutely could be the same
16 person. There's no evidence otherwise, and
17 therefore this voter should be enfranchised.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, I
19 would just say, for Counsel's knowledge, when
20 you're looking at the SURE screen, the second
21 box on the center left will show how the
22 person was registered. And then to the top
23 or the right, it'll show when he's had --

24 MS. SNYDER: Thank you.

1 MS. STOHR: Can that be read into
2 the -- Kevin, can you read when the voter
3 registered and how they voted registered into
4 the transcript?

5 MR. RICHARDSON: Sure. It was a
6 paper application on a registration drive at
7 10/16/2020.

8 MS. STOHR: Thank you.

9 MS. SNYDER: You know what? I'll
10 maintain my argument and just note for the
11 record that a registration drive is when
12 people are moving quickly and you often have
13 clipboards. But other than that, I think
14 that the argument is that there's no evidence
15 that this isn't the same human being.

16 MS. STOHR: Is there anyone else
17 who would like to be heard on this ballot?

18 MS. DEELEY: Kevin? I'm sorry. Is
19 there anything else -- do you have anything
20 else in the file for Shamina that might have
21 a signature?

22 MR. RICHARDSON: Can you see that,
23 Commissioner? I can blow it up. This is the
24 actual scan of her document.

1 MS. DEELEY: Thank you, Kevin.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Did you see it?

3 MS. SNYDER: No. I rest on my
4 argument. I trust your vision.

5 MS. STOHR: That concludes comments
6 on this ballot.

7 CHAIR SABIR: So just for the
8 record, staff determination was not to count
9 this?

10 MS. STOHR: Correct. The staff
11 determination was don't count because of a
12 signature mismatch.

13 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
14 board rejects the challenge and follow the
15 staff determination. Is there a second?

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Does any commissioner
18 want to comment on this before we proceed to
19 vote? Hearing none, Secretary, please call
20 the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

22 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

24 Chairman Sabir.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

2 MS. DEELEY: I'm sorry.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Please proceed.

4 MS. DEELEY: I'm sorry.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley,
6 would you like to change your vote?

7 MS. DEELEY: Yeah. I'm sorry. I
8 vote aye.

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: So it's unanimous
10 to follow staff determination and not count
11 that ballot.

12 MS. STOHR: Only 28 more to go.
13 This next one is another signature mismatch
14 by the Republican party. The ballot
15 signatures are here, and Kevin will pull them
16 up for the SURE system. Are y'all done? Are
17 you ready? Okay. Is there a voter on this
18 ballot who would like to be heard? Will the
19 challengers on this ballot like to be heard?

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: What was the staff
21 determination?

22 MS. STOHR: Sorry. The staff
23 determination was full count. Full count.

24 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, is there any

1 other document with an example of a
2 signature? Can you go back to the envelope,
3 please?

4 MR. RICHARDSON: This is a copy of
5 his registration from 2018.

6 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.

7 MS. STOHR: What part are we on?
8 Any other questions from the commissioners?

9 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, I think you
10 need to reclip that affidavit and use that
11 signature for the future.

12 MR. RICHARDSON: Excuse me.
13 Commissioner, he had a later registration
14 come in from one of those people to go around
15 with the iPads, and that's how we signed that
16 one.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: The problem is with
18 the registration drives using the tablets,
19 people are not signing their signatures
20 properly.

21 MR. RICHARDSON: That's correct.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: And that's a huge
23 problem. And it seems clear to me that the
24 paper application from prior to that date, a

1 year prior, shows an accurate signature.

2 MS. STOHR: Yeah. We'll withdraw
3 the challenge to this one. So it will be
4 line 419.

5 CHAIR SABIR: So how's --

6 MS. STOHR: Yes. So that will be
7 marked as withdrawn. The next challenge was
8 from the Candidate Gill, signatures do not
9 match. Here's the ballot.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, can you
11 bring up the document?

12 MR. RICHARDSON: Sure.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, can you
14 bring up additional documents?

15 MR. RICHARDSON: And this is a copy
16 of her mail-in ballot application. And this
17 would be her signature. And you can see
18 where the hands cover.

19 MS. STOHR: Any further questions
20 from commissioners? Is the voter in this
21 category like to speak? Will the challenger
22 on this --

23 MS. KERNS: Challenger will
24 withdraw.

1 MS. STOHR: Challenge is withdrawn.
2 I'm putting up the number. Kevin, if you
3 want to go ahead and look up the -- yeah, I'm
4 easy. You got it. Okay. Well, how am I
5 supposed to know that? All right. The
6 challenge is from the Republican party, and
7 it says signature mismatch. These are the
8 ballot signatures. The staff determination
9 was a full count. Any questions from the
10 commissioners?

11 CHAIR SABIR: I have none.

12 MS. STOHR: Will the challenger on
13 this like to speak?

14 MS. KERNS: Yes. First, I would
15 like to note that when the observers are
16 reviewing these, we're only shown the one
17 screen. We are not shown multiple examples
18 of signatures on different applications. So
19 I want to make the record clear on that. And
20 we ask that this ballot not be counted
21 because the signature on the ballot envelope
22 does not match the signature in the SURE
23 system.

24 MS. STOHR: Would anyone

1 representing challenged ballot like to speak?

2 MS. SNYDER: I'd like to
3 incorporate prior arguments of Counsel and
4 then note that Nicole Brown Talley signed her
5 name as Nicole Brown Talley. And in the
6 system, it's Nicole Talley. That signature
7 clearly matches. Thanks.

8 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else like
9 to be heard on this category? That concludes
10 testimony, excuse me, on this ballot.

11 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
12 rejects challenges and follows staff
13 determination. Is there a second?

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Commissioners, do you
16 have any comments?

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

18 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Hearing none, we'll
20 proceed to vote. Secretary Bluestein, please
21 call the roll.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

23 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

1 Chairman Sabir.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

3 MS. STOHR: The next signature,
4 mismatch challenge from the Candidate Bashir.
5 Signature mismatch. These are the
6 signatures, and the staff determination was a
7 full count.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Kevin, do you have
9 any additional documents on this one?

10 MR. RICHARDSON: This is a copy of
11 a registration from 2008.

12 MS. STOHR: Any additional
13 questions from commissioners? Is the voter
14 here would like to speak? The challengers
15 like to speak?

16 MS. KERNS: I just want to make
17 sure that these SURE records are part of this
18 record for purposes of appeal. So I just
19 want to note that for the record. And in
20 light of the additional document that the
21 challengers did not have access to when they
22 were reviewing these signatures, we'll
23 withdraw this challenge.

24 MS. STOHR: The challenge is

1 withdrawn. The next challenge is mismatch
2 signature by the McCormick campaign. The
3 staff determined it should be a full count.
4 This is the provisional ballot. Yeah, it's
5 on the screen.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Are there other
7 documents, Kevin?

8 MR. RICHARDSON: This is a copy of
9 her application from 2012.

10 MS. STOHR: Any additional
11 questions from commissioners? Is a voter
12 here that would like to speak? Challengers?

13 MS. KERNS: I'd like to note just
14 for the record that this is raising a little
15 bit of concern that there are such different
16 signatures on some of these applications and
17 voter records, but now that we've seen the
18 second one, which we did not have access to
19 when we were observing, we'll withdraw this
20 challenge.

21 MS. STOHR: Challenge is withdrawn.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may I
23 speak before the next category, before the
24 next ballot?

1 CHAIR SABIR: Well, one second.
2 Yes. The lefts want to say something too.
3 Did y'all want to -- the challengers, did
4 y'all want to look at those other documents
5 and see? Did you want to withdraw any more
6 of them?

7 MS. KERNS: I'm sorry. I didn't
8 hear.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Do we want to take
10 maybe a five-minute recess or so, view the
11 documents, and then withdraw whatever ones
12 you want to withdraw?

13 MS. KERNS: Oh, sure.

14 CHAIR SABIR: So we'll take a five-
15 minute recess, let them go through each one
16 that they may withdraw.

17 (Off the record.)

18 MS. STOHR: We can resume the
19 signature mismatch category. 15 of the
20 signature mismatch challenges were withdrawn,
21 and so we will proceed with those that were
22 not withdrawn. Actually, I need those two
23 that I just handed you back. Thank you. Two
24 of them were withdrawn, but the staff

1 determined that the signatures did not match.
2 So I'll present those for the board to
3 review. Here's the first ballot, Noeltaj
4 Masin.

5 CHAIR SABIR: There's no other
6 documents from Kevin? Just that. And --

7 MS. STOHR: So the second one where
8 the staff also determined that -- where the
9 challenge was withdrawn and the staff
10 determined that there was a signature
11 mismatch is this one, Christina Virata.

12 MS. DEELEY: Can we bring these
13 together or --

14 MS. STOHR: Oh, we can do whatever
15 the board prefers.

16 CHAIR SABIR: This is all
17 individually like we were?

18 MS. STOHR: So we can do first this
19 one, Noeltaj Masin.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Kevin, can you go
21 back to Noeltaj, please?

22 MS. STOHR: Sorry, Kevin.

23 MR. RICHARDSON: I didn't -- the
24 number again. I was --

1 MS. STOHR: Do you want me to read
2 it to you?

3 MR. RICHARDSON: No --

4 MS. STOHR: Did you remember why
5 they were sitting over here? Did --

6 CHAIR SABIR: That's it.

7 MS. STOHR: Would anyone like to
8 speak on this challenge or withdrawn
9 challenge? I guess not because it's
10 withdrawn. Go ahead.

11 CHAIR SABIR: So are we voting on
12 this?

13 MS. STOHR: Yes. The signature
14 mismatch, like with Kevin.

15 CHAIR SABIR: So what was the staff
16 determination again? I'm sorry.

17 MS. STOHR: The staff also
18 determined that it was a signature mismatch.

19 CHAIR SABIR: So they said not to
20 count.

21 MS. STOHR: Correct.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. I move that
23 this board -- so we accept the challenge?

24 MS. STOHR: The challenge has been

1 withdrawn, so you're just voting whether or
2 not to count the ballot.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Just the staff
4 determination. Okay. Long day. Got you.
5 All right. I move that this board follows
6 the staff determination for this category.
7 Is there a second?

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioner want
10 to make any comments?

11 MS. DEELEY: Yeah. Thank you,
12 Chairman. I believe in looking at the ballot
13 and the additional document, I believe that
14 there is enough match in the signature that
15 this ballot should count. You can see in the
16 drop-down portion at the bottom it seems to
17 have that very same style, in addition to the
18 drag after the C. I don't know. It's my
19 opinion and determination that this is the
20 voter signature and that this ballot should
21 count.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
23 do you want to call the roll?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

1 MS. DEELEY: Nay.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

3 Chairman Sabir.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

5 MS. STOHR: And this is the next
6 ballot with a withdrawn signature mismatch
7 challenge where the staff determined that
8 there was a signature mismatch and the ballot
9 should not be counted.

10 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
11 follows the staff determination. Is there a
12 second?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

14 MS. DEELEY: Second.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Does any commissioner
16 want to make any comments?

17 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
20 please call the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

22 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

24 Chairman Sabir.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

2 MS. STOHR: Then we'll continue
3 with the remaining signature mismatch
4 challenges. This one, the staff determined
5 there should be a full count for the
6 signature mismatch.

7 MS. KERNS: I'm sorry. So what
8 number on the spreadsheet is this one? Oh, I
9 got it. I found it.

10 MS. STOHR: It's a voter, Corey
11 Drissel.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Kevin, you got any
13 other document for this one?

14 MR. RICHARDSON: No, Chairman, I
15 don't. This came from PennDOT from another
16 county, so.

17 CHAIR SABIR: From PennDOT.

18 MS. STOHR: Any further questions
19 from commissioners? Is the voter here would
20 like to speak? Would challengers like to
21 speak?

22 MS. KERNS: Yes. We ask that this
23 not be counted because the signatures do not
24 match under 25 P.S. 3030 (a.4)(5) two little

1 i's (b).

2 MS. STOHR: Thank you. Would those
3 representing challenged ballots like to
4 speak?

5 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate prior
6 arguments of Counsel. Signature is similar
7 enough to count it and voters should be
8 enfranchised.

9 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else like
10 to speak on this ballot? That concludes
11 testimony on this ballot.

12 CHAIR SABIR: What's the staff
13 determination again? What's the staff
14 determination?

15 MS. STOHR: The staff determined it
16 should be a full count.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Okay. I move that
18 this board rejects the challenges and follow
19 the staff determination. Is there a second?

20 MS. DEELEY: Second.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Is there any
22 commissioner want any comments before we
23 proceed on this? Hearing none, Secretary
24 Bluestein, please call the roll.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

2 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay.

4 Chairman Sabir.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

6 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is
7 Alexander Rivera Jr. It was challenged as a
8 signature mismatch. The staff determined it
9 should be a full count and noted that the
10 signature matches additional doc attached to
11 voter record. Any questions from
12 commissioners?

13 CHAIR SABIR: Any questions,
14 commissioners?

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: No.

16 MS. DEELEY: None.

17 MS. STOHR: Would the voter like to
18 speak? Challengers?

19 MS. KERNS: The challengers ask
20 that this ballot not be counted based on the
21 signature mismatch under the statute
22 previously cited.

23 MS. STOHR: Representing
24 challenged?

1 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate prior
2 relevant arguments, Counsel.

3 MS. STOHR: Anyone else want to be
4 heard on this ballot?

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: Kevin, can you put
6 the other document back on the screen,
7 please?

8 MR. RICHARDSON: This is a copy of
9 the voter affirmation record from 2014.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Does that suffice,
11 Secretary?

12 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes. Thank you.

13 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
14 board rejects challenges and follow the staff
15 determination for this category. Is there a
16 second?

17 MS. DEELEY: Second.

18 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
19 have any comments? Hearing none, Secretary
20 Bluestein, please call the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: I'm sorry, Mr.
22 Chairman. I have a question just for Alison
23 clarifying what we're voting on. Is this
24 line 431 or 430? Because they have two

1 different determinations by staff, so I want
2 to make sure I understand what the staff
3 determination was that we're voting on.

4 MS. STOHR: This is line 431 with
5 the address 6134 Palmetto.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: So the staff
7 determined to not count the ballot?

8 MS. STOHR: What a fun time this
9 is. This is what I have. This is the staff
10 determination, and this is the ballot.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Because the voter
12 ID number is identical for lines 430 and 431.

13 MS. STOHR: Yes. I think there was
14 an -- I cannot explain the error in the
15 spreadsheet.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: So the staff
17 determined that it should be counted. So
18 we're voting on --

19 MS. STOHR: Yes.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: The motion that the
21 chairman made is to affirm the staff's
22 decision to count that ballot?

23 MS. STOHR: Correct.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Thank you.

1 MS. STOHR: Yes. Apologize for any
2 confusion.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Sorry. Should I
4 call a roll, Mr. Chairman?

5 CHAIR SABIR: Yes.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

7 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

9 Chairman Sabir.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Aye. Please proceed.

11 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is
12 Jessica Larson.

13 MS. KERNS: Mister, did you
14 determine that 431 in its entirety is a
15 mistake, so we're not even addressing that?
16 Is that the issue?

17 MS. STOHR: 430 is a mistake. We
18 voted on 431.

19 MS. KERNS: Okay, got you.

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice versa. Line
21 430, it says --

22 MS. STOHR: Sorry. I'm looking at
23 the -- I'm looking at the reference numbers,
24 not the line numbers. And on my spreadsheet,

1 reference number 431 is Alexander Rivera Jr.,
2 who lives at 6134 Palmetto.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yes. But that the
4 staff determination was to not count, whereas
5 we're voting to count, which is what the
6 determination was in 430. So I think this
7 should be --

8 MS. STOHR: I think we can ignore
9 what the spreadsheet says for this one and
10 vote on what the piece of paper, challenge
11 form, says.

12 MS. KERNS: I just want to make
13 sure that there's not two votes for the same
14 person. But there's not, it was just a --
15 okay. Great. Thank you.

16 MS. STOHR: Typographic error.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: Which line do we
18 eliminate or are we eliminating?

19 MS. STOHR: Are we really having
20 this discussion? I will send an updated
21 spreadsheet to everyone because it seems like
22 the two lines need to be merged.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Just for the record,
24 you voted to count the last category?

1 MS. STOHR: The last ballot, yes.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Please proceed.

3 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is
4 Jessica Larson. This was a signature
5 mismatch challenge where the staff determined
6 it should be a full count.

7 MR. RICHARDSON: There is no
8 further documentation on this voter.

9 MS. STOHR: Maybe they just checked
10 what the challenge was. People did not know
11 how to know at that point.

12 CHAIR SABIR: And they voted to
13 count it?

14 MS. STOHR: Correct. Any questions
15 from commissioners?

16 CHAIR SABIR: Any questions?

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: No.

18 MS. STOHR: Challenger?

19 MS. KERNS: Yes. We'll incorporate
20 our previous arguments that this should not
21 be counted due to a signature mismatch.

22 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

23 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate arguments
24 of Counsel, specifically those from the first

1 ballot that we did in this category regarding
2 initials and intention to sign.

3 MS. STOHR: Anyone else want to be
4 heard on this ballot? That concludes
5 testimony on this ballot.

6 CHAIR SABIR: So the staff
7 determination was to count this one?

8 MS. STOHR: Yes.

9 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
10 accepts the challenge and update
11 determination accordingly. Is there a
12 second?

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

14 CHAIR SABIR: Does any commissioner
15 have any comments?

16 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I
17 would just like to point out, in my opinion,
18 the J in the signature looks exactly like the
19 J on the provisional ballot envelope. And I
20 would also note for the record that this
21 application source is online, so the voter in
22 all probability used their finger. So that
23 is where we're seeing these shorter versions
24 of signatures. And I vote aye.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: The motion is to
5 not count the ballot.

6 MS. DEELEY: I apologize. I
7 thought the vote was to accept the board's
8 recommendation, which was full count. So I
9 vote nay. I'm sorry.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
11 Chairman Sabir.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

13 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is on
14 the screen, Aljia Lawrence. This was a
15 signature mismatch challenge. The staff
16 determined it should be a partial count.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Kevin, was there any
18 additional documents?

19 MR. RICHARDSON: No, Mr. Chairman,
20 there was not.

21 MS. STOHR: Any questions from
22 commissioners. Is a voter here and would
23 like to testify? Challengers?

24 MS. KERNS: We would request that

1 this not be counted due to a signature
2 mismatch incorporating previous arguments.

3 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

4 MS. SNYDER: Same argument. And
5 I'd like to note that doing it this way
6 disenfranchises people specifically who
7 registered by doing so online or a tablet.

8 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? Concludes
9 testimony on this ballot.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Question, was there
11 an ID verification with this one or did it
12 reach that or anything for this?

13 MR. RICHARDSON: Well, it did pass
14 the habit check, Commissioner.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Did it pass the habit
16 check? Okay. And --

17 MR. RICHARDSON: And it checks
18 Social Security number, driver's license
19 number. It doesn't verify any signatures.

20 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
21 board accepts the challenge and update
22 determination accordingly. Is there a
23 second?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,
2 please call the roll.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

4 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
6 Chairman Sabir.

7 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

8 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is on
9 the screen, Cheryl Morrison. This was a
10 signature mismatch challenge. The staff
11 determined it should be a partial count.
12 Sorry.

13 MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah, there's no
14 further documentation on this voter.

15 MS. STOHR: Is the voter here and
16 would like to speak? Challenger?

17 MS. KERNS: The challengers request
18 that this not be counted due to a signature
19 mismatch. We incorporate prior arguments.

20 MS. STOHR: Challenged.

21 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate arguments
22 and note that it looks similar but for being
23 cut off at the end.

24 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That

1 concludes testimony on this ballot.

2 CHAIR SABIR: And the staff
3 determination was to count?

4 MS. STOHR: Partial count, yes.

5 CHAIR SABIR: Partial count. Okay.
6 I move that this board rejects the challenges
7 and follow the staff determination. Is there
8 a second?

9 MS. DEELEY: Second.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
11 commissioners have any comments?

12 MS. DEELEY: I would like --

13 CHAIR SABIR: Go ahead. I'm sorry.

14 MS. DEELEY: I would like to state
15 for the record that the signature on the
16 envelope looks identical to -- I mean, the
17 printed portion of the envelope looks
18 identical to the voter's SURE signature,
19 which is obviously a printed signature.
20 Thank you.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you.
22 Secretary, please call the roll.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

24 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

1 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay.

2 Chairman Sabir.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

4 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is on
5 the screen. It was a signature mismatch
6 challenge, and the staff determination was a
7 partial count. Sorry. The staff
8 determination was a full count. Any
9 questions from commissioners?

10 MS. KERNS: I'm sorry. Could you
11 tell me the line on the spreadsheet? I'm
12 just trying to follow.

13 MS. STOHR: 437.

14 MS. KERNS: Got you.

15 MS. DEELEY: Kevin, can you go back
16 to the other document, please? There's
17 another document in there. I'm sorry.
18 Thanks.

19 MS. STOHR: Any questions from
20 commissioners? Is the voter here and would
21 like to speak? Challengers?

22 MS. KERNS: The challengers, the
23 McCormick campaign, ask that this not be
24 counted because the signature doesn't match

1 and we incorporate prior arguments.

2 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

3 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate and note
4 the messiness of the rest of the voter
5 information, either lack of care or being
6 rushed.

7 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
8 concludes testimony for this ballot.

9 CHAIR SABIR: And for the record,
10 the staff determination was to full count?

11 MS. STOHR: Yes, full count.

12 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
13 board rejects the challenge and follow the
14 staff determination. Is there a second?

15 MS. DEELEY: Second.

16 CHAIR SABIR: Does any
17 commissioners have any comments?

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: No.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Hearing none,
20 Secretary, please call the roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

22 MS. DEELEY: I vote aye.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay.

24 Chairman Sabir.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

2 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is
3 Siham Overdan on the screen. The challenge
4 was signatures do not match and the staff
5 determined it should be a full count. Any
6 questions from commissioners? Is the voter
7 here and would like to speak? Challengers?

8 MS. KERNS: We ask that this ballot
9 not be counted based on the signature
10 mismatch and we incorporate prior arguments.

11 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

12 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate and note
13 printed signature.

14 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
15 concludes testimony on this ballot.

16 CHAIR SABIR: The top part. All
17 right. So they wrote the top corner and they
18 match the signature. Right? I move that
19 this board rejects challenges and follows
20 staff determination. Is there a second?
21 This motion is not passed. Please proceed.

22 MR. BLUESTEIN: I would make a
23 motion to accept the challenge and change the
24 staff determination to not count the ballot.

1 MS. DEELEY: Second.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, please
3 call the roll.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

5 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.
7 Chairman Sabir.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Nay.

9 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is
10 Anthony Ponzo. Ballot is on the screen. The
11 challenge was signature, and the staff
12 determined it should be a partial count. Any
13 questions from commissioners? Is the voter
14 here and would like to speak? Challengers?

15 MS. KERNS: Challengers ask that
16 this not be counted based on the mismatched
17 signature and incorporate prior arguments.

18 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

19 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate, the same.

20 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
21 concludes testimony on this ballot.

22 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
23 board rejects challenges and file the staff
24 determination. Is there a second?

1 MS. DEELEY: Second.

2 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
3 have any comments?

4 MS. DEELEY: I have none.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, please
7 call roll.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

9 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

10 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

11 Chairman Sabir.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

13 MS. STOHR: The next ballot is on
14 the screen. The challenge is signature does
15 not match. The staff determined it should be
16 a full count. For the record, this is SURE
17 ID 014606257-51. Sorry. Any questions from
18 commissioners?

19 MS. DEELEY: I would just comment
20 that the printed line looks like the printed
21 signature on the SURE file. The N is very
22 distinct as well as the U and all of it
23 probably. Thank you.

24 MS. STOHR: Is the voter here and

1 would like to speak? Challengers?

2 MS. KERNS: Yes. We'd like to keep
3 this challenge and ask that this not be
4 counted based on a signature mismatch and
5 incorporate our prior arguments.

6 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

7 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate it, the
8 same, and print it.

9 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
10 concludes testimony for this ballot.

11 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
12 board rejects challenges and follow the staff
13 determination. Is there a second?

14 MS. DEELEY: Second.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Does commissioners
16 have any comments?

17 MS. DEELEY: None.

18 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Hearing none, please
20 call roll.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

22 MS. STOHR: Aye.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay.

24 Chairman Sabir.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

2 MS. STOHR: The next challenge is
3 Harold Williams. This was a signature
4 mismatch challenge, and the staff determined
5 it should be a partial count. Any questions
6 from commissioners? Is a voter here and
7 would like to speak? Challengers?

8 MS. KERNS: We ask that this not
9 count because of the signature mismatch and
10 incorporate prior arguments.

11 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

12 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate other
13 documents. It's the same.

14 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
15 concludes testimony on this ballot.

16 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
17 board rejects challenges and follow the staff
18 determination. Is there a second?

19 MS. DEELEY: Second.

20 CHAIR SABIR: Anyone have any
21 comments?

22 MS. DEELEY: None.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have none.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, please

1 call the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

5 Chairman Sabir.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

7 MS. STOHR: The final ballot in the
8 signature mismatch category, Latyra
9 Williamson. So the signature mismatch
10 challenge. The staff determined it should be
11 a full count. Any questions from
12 commissioners? Is a voter here and would
13 like to speak? Challengers?

14 MS. KERNS: We ask that this ballot
15 not count because of the signature mismatch
16 and incorporate prior arguments.

17 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

18 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate.

19 MS. STOHR: Anyone else? That
20 concludes testimony on this ballot.

21 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
22 board rejects challenges and follows the
23 staff determination. Is there a second?

24 MS. DEELEY: Second.

1 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, please

2 call roll.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

4 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

5 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote nay.

6 Chairman Sabir.

7 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

8 MS. STOHR: That concludes the
9 signature mismatch category. I would like to
10 request a brief comfort break. I need to go
11 to the bathroom.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Granted.

13 MS. STOHR: Thank you.

14 (Off the record.)

15 MS. STOHR: Our next category is
16 voter information mismatch. There were 11
17 ballots challenges in this category, six the
18 staff determined should be a full count and
19 five the staff determined should be a partial
20 count. Three of these were withdrawn during
21 our session earlier, number 449, Noreen
22 Campbell, 450 Shawna Coffee, and 452, Jason
23 Carol Lomax Jr.

24 The challenges to those have all

1 been withdrawn. That leaves us with eight
2 voter mismatch challenges. The reasons for
3 these are written on the spreadsheet that has
4 been shared with the parties and the
5 commissioners, and they are all alleging that
6 certain information on the ballot did not
7 match what is in SURE. Any questions from
8 commissioners?

9 MS. DEELEY: Yes. Kevin, was there
10 our signature on these envelopes?

11 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

12 MS. DEELEY: And the staff was able
13 to compare that signature to the registered
14 voter in the SURE system?

15 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

16 MS. DEELEY: And in all cases the
17 signature was determined to be genuine?

18 MR. RICHARDSON: Yes.

19 MS. DEELEY: Thank you. Nothing
20 further.

21 MS. STOHR: Are any voters in this
22 category here and would like to be heard??
23 Challengers?

24 MS. KERNS: So the challengers

1 would ask that these not be counted because
2 they were not filled out and completed in
3 compliance with the Statute 25 P.S.
4 3050(a.4)(2). So we ask they not be counted.

5 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

6 MS. SNYDER: We ask that these
7 ballots be counted as they are compliant with
8 the rules of what actually needs to be thrown
9 out, what actually needs to be counted, and
10 that you should consider them as a category
11 if you see fit. And we trust your judgment.

12 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else like
13 to be heard on this category? That concludes
14 testimony on this category.

15 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
16 board rejects the challenge -- one more time.
17 I move that this board rejects the challenges
18 and follow the staff determination. Is there
19 a second?

20 MS. DEELEY: Second.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Any comments?

22 MS. DEELEY: None.

23 MR. BLUESTEIN: No comments.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary Bluestein,

1 please call the roll.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

3 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

4 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

5 Chairman Sabir.

6 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

7 MS. STOHR: The next category is
8 multiple challenges, meaning a single
9 challenger listed multiple reasons that they
10 were challenging a particular ballot. You
11 will see those challenges are listed on the
12 spreadsheet that has been shared with the
13 parties and the commissioners. And the vast
14 majority of these are reasons that the board
15 has already determined that challenges should
16 be rejected and the staff determination
17 should be followed.

18 There are a few that we should talk
19 about. First, I'll tell you about the
20 category in general. Multiple challenges.
21 There were 48 ballots in this category, 48
22 challenges, 21 where the staff determined
23 there should be a full count, 12 where the
24 staff determined there should be a partial

1 count, and 15 where the staff determined that
2 the ballot should not be counted. 14 of
3 those were because there was only one voter
4 signature and one was a signature mismatch.

5 So I think we can start with the
6 signature mismatch from the staff. This is
7 voter Jogre Cloudio. I will tell you his
8 reference number in one second. This was a
9 challenge alleging a mismatching signature
10 and that there was no reason for voting
11 provisionally checked. The staff determined
12 that it should not count because it was a
13 signature mismatch. I can't find this
14 reference number, but --

15 MR. RICHARDSON: 470.

16 MS. STOHR: Thank you. 470.

17 Kevin, were you able to pull up a signature?

18 MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah.

19 MS. STOHR: Great. Any questions
20 from commissioners?

21 CHAIR SABIR: No commissioner.

22 There isn't.

23 MS. DEELEY: Thank you.

24 MS. STOHR: Is the voter here and

1 would like to be heard? Challengers?

2 MS. KERNS: We agree with the
3 staff's determination not to count this
4 ballot and ask that it not be counted.

5 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

6 MS. SNYDER: We incorporate
7 arguments and note that the last name is
8 matching in the signature.

9 MS. STOHR: Anyone else on this
10 ballot? That concludes testimony for this
11 particular ballot.

12 CHAIR SABIR: So the staff
13 determination was for this ballot not to be
14 counted?

15 MS. STOHR: Correct, signature
16 mismatch.

17 CHAIR SABIR: I move that the board
18 rejects the challenge and follow the staff
19 determination. Is there a second?

20 MR. BLUESTEIN: Second.

21 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
22 have any comments? Hearing none, please call
23 the roll.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

1 MS. STOHR: No.

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

3 Chairman Sabir.

4 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

5 MS. STOHR: And there's one more in
6 the multiple category where there is a
7 signature mismatch challenge that has not
8 been withdrawn. It is for Jemima Edward,
9 SURE number 110469362. The challenges here
10 were that the signature doesn't match from
11 SURE and that the name was printed wrong.
12 The staff determined it should be a partial
13 count.

14 MS. KERNS: Do you know what line
15 on the spreadsheet this one is?

16 MS. STOHR: 476.

17 CHAIR SABIR: And Kevin, so there
18 was no other documents. Right?

19 MR. RICHARDSON: There were no
20 other documents, Mr. Chairman.

21 CHAIR SABIR: And the staff
22 determination was to?

23 MS. STOHR: It's a partial count.

24 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this

1 board rejects the --

2 MS. STOHR: Do we want to let the -
3 - sorry. We have to do our whole rigmarole.
4 Does anyone want to be heard on this?

5 MS. KERNS: I think it's a little
6 more of a rigmarole, but --

7 MS. STOHR: Sorry.

8 MS. KERNS: -- I'd like to say
9 these are valid challenges under the statute,
10 so I would prefer to refer -- but our
11 challenge is that it's a signature mismatch
12 under the statute and we would incorporate
13 previous arguments and ask that this not be
14 counted.

15 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

16 MS. SNYDER: Incorporate.

17 MS. STOHR: Anyone else want to be
18 heard on this matter? That concludes
19 testimony for this ballot.

20 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
21 board reject the challenge and follow the
22 staff determination. Is there a second?

23 MS. DEELEY: Second.

24 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners

1 have any comments?

2 MR. BLUESTEIN: I would just say --
3 if you don't mind putting that back up,
4 Alison --

5 MS. STOHR: Oh, yeah.

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: -- that the name
7 underneath the signature box is signed and
8 not printed and it does look like it does in
9 the SURE system. My opinion.

10 CHAIR SABIR: Please call the roll.

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

12 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

13 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

14 Chairman Sabir.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

16 MS. STOHR: So for the remainder of
17 the multiple category, I believe these are
18 all reasons that the board has already
19 considered and rejected as basically for
20 challenges. We can proceed with the rest as
21 a category if the board has no objection.

22 CHAIR SABIR: Oh, the rest as a
23 category. Okay.

24 MS. STOHR: Would the challengers

1 on this category like to be heard?

2 MS. KERNS: I'm sorry. Which
3 category is it?

4 MS. STOHR: Where there are
5 multiple challenges?

6 MS. KERNS: Yes. So we would ask
7 these not be counted and incorporate prior
8 arguments.

9 MS. STOHR: Challenged?

10 MS. SNYDER: We have no objection
11 to you treating each category consistently
12 with your prior determinations if you
13 similarly preserve our objections and/or
14 argument incorporate those.

15 MS. STOHR: Would anyone else like
16 to be heard on this category?

17 MS. DEELEY: Yes, please. I would
18 just like to state that I believe that we
19 should be counting the 14 one-voter signature
20 ballots.

21 MS. STOHR: Any other comments on
22 this category? That concludes testimony for
23 this category.

24 CHAIR SABIR: And the staff

1 determination for this was?

2 MS. STOHR: Well, there are
3 various, but we would just -- for multiple
4 challenges, 21 were full counts, 12 were
5 partial counts, and 15 were do not counts, 14
6 for one voter signature and one for the
7 signature mismatch that we already heard.

8 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
9 board rejects the challenges and follow the
10 staff determination. Is there a second?

11 MS. DEELEY: Second.

12 CHAIR SABIR: Any commissioners
13 want to make any comments? Hearing none,
14 Secretary, please call the roll.

15 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

16 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

17 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

18 Chairman Sabir.

19 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

20 MS. STOHR: The next category is
21 double challenges. This is where two
22 challenges were filed for a single ballot.
23 In this category, there are 24 challenges.
24 So these numbers basically should be in half

1 because we did them by challenge rather than
2 by ballot. So 24 challenges to 12 ballots.
3 That would be six ballots that are fully
4 counted, one ballot that is a partial count,
5 and five ballots that are do not count, one
6 because it has a canceled record and four
7 because there is one-voter signature. Would
8 the commissioners like to review these
9 individually or do you have any questions
10 about these categories?

11 MR. BLUESTEIN: Is there anything
12 else and that's inconsistent from a staff
13 determination with what we've already voted
14 on?

15 MS. STOHR: No.

16 CHAIR SABIR: I move that this
17 board follows the staff determination. Is
18 there a second?

19 MS. STOHR: Oh, sorry.

20 CHAIR SABIR: -- make a comment.

21 I'm sorry.

22 MS. STOHR: I apologize. Are any
23 of the voters in this category here and would
24 like to be heard? Challengers?

1 MS. KERNS: Yeah. So if I
2 understand it, the -- I just want to make
3 sure I'm understanding correctly that the
4 staff voted not to count 10 of these 12
5 ballots.

6 MS. STOHR: The staff determined --

7 MS. KERNS: Yeah, determined.

8 Excuse me.

9 MS. STOHR: -- that five ballots
10 relating to 10 different challenges should
11 not be counted.

12 MS. KERNS: So based on the
13 challenges that these ballot envelopes were
14 not filled out correctly, the challengers
15 would ask that these ballots not be counted.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: Alison, it does
17 look like numbers 508 and 509 are a signature
18 mismatch question.

19 MS. STOHR: We can look at that
20 one. Can you tell me the name on the ballot?

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Briana Bello.

22 MS. STOHR: Briana Bello. There
23 were two challenges, one from the Republicans
24 with the signature mismatch challenge and

1 then the Democrats challenging the challenge
2 for the signature. Here is the provisional
3 ballot. The staff determined that this
4 should be a full count.

5 MS. KERNS: We'll withdraw this
6 challenge. But again, we note that we don't
7 have access to all of these documents when
8 we're observing.

9 MS. STOHR: So that leaves 11
10 ballots to vote on in the double challenge
11 category. Right? Yeah.

12 CHAIR SABIR: We're just going to
13 follow the staff determination. Okay. I
14 move that this board follows the staff
15 determination. Is there a second?

16 MS. DEELEY: Second.

17 CHAIR SABIR: Secretary, please
18 call the roll.

19 MR. BLUESTEIN: Vice Chair Deeley.

20 MS. DEELEY: Aye.

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: I vote aye.

22 Chairman Sabir.

23 CHAIR SABIR: Aye.

24 MS. STOHR: The next category is

1 incorrect rejections. These are challenges
2 where the challenger is alleging that the
3 staff incorrectly rejected a provisional
4 ballot. There are 22 challenges in this
5 category and 23 do not count because of a
6 canceled record. That must be a adding
7 error. I will get those now. The vast
8 majority of these, as you can see from your
9 spreadsheet, allege that voters were
10 incorrectly removed because they did not vote
11 into federal election cycles. I think all
12 but one of the challenges are from the
13 Democrats. Any questions from commissioners?

14 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have a question
15 for Kevin for line number 535 where it's
16 alleging that the operator entered the wrong
17 date of birth. Is it possible for you to do
18 a look up and see if you can find the person?

19 MS. STOHR: Sorry, can you tell
20 Kevin what to look up?

21 MR. BLUESTEIN: Yashua, Y-A-S-H-U-
22 A, middle name John, last name E-M-I-L-E. M.

23 MS. DEELEY: M as in Mary.

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: Can I give you the

1 address, Kevin?

2 MR. RICHARDSON: Sure.

3 MR. BLUESTEIN: 8135 Frankford
4 Avenue.

5 MR. RICHARDSON: There's no one by
6 that name at that address.

7 MS. STOHR: Just fold them back up.

8 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no further
9 questions.

10 MS. STOHR: One moment,
11 Commissioners. The challengers are
12 withdrawing certain challenges.

13 MS. KERNS: Where's the --

14 MS. STOHR: I don't know, but I
15 guess we're going to find them.

16 MS. KERNS: (indiscernible).

17 MS. STOHR: I don't know that. I
18 put it all in a spreadsheet for people to
19 look at before they got here.

20 MS. KERNS: You put it on a sheet?

21 MS. STOHR: Well, none of you could
22 have looked at it? Why did I make a
23 spreadsheet?

24 MS. KERNS: (indiscernible).

1 MS. STOHR: Well, then why didn't
2 you withdraw anything based on what was in
3 the information? Okay. All of these
4 challenges have been withdrawn. I got it.
5 Yeah.

6 MS. KERNS: (indiscernible).

7 MS. STOHR: No, I got it. Thank
8 you. Okay. Our next category is a district
9 challenge. So these were based on the fact
10 that we counted certain provisionals first,
11 and these were not in the district of that
12 race. You will note on your spreadsheet that
13 each of these was determined to be a partial
14 count by the staff. These were all
15 challenged by Republicans. I don't know if
16 they would like to weigh in on this.

17 MS. KERNS: So the challengers will
18 withdraw these.

19 MS. STOHR: Just for the record,
20 there were 15 challenges and all 15 were
21 determined by staff to be partial counts.
22 Those have been withdrawn. Okay. We're on
23 our final category. We're in the other
24 category. There are nine ballots in this

1 category. The staff determined that four of
2 them should be a full count, three of them
3 should be a partial count, and one of them
4 should not count. I think we found our
5 adding error somewhere here.

6 So these, I think it's easiest to
7 just go through them one by one. For the
8 first challenge, it is from a Democratic
9 candidate, lack of reason to count maybe.

10 MS. SNYDER: Withdrawn.

11 MS. STOHR: Great. So fun. Okay.
12 The next one is from Candidate Gill, inactive
13 five years. The staff determined it should
14 be a partial count. Here is the provisional
15 ballot.

16 MS. SNYDER: Withdrawn. Oh, I say
17 this, you withdraw, is what I --

18 MS. KERNS: Do you mind pulling
19 that one up so I can look at the SURE?
20 Right. I will withdraw that challenge.

21 MS. STOHR: The challenge is
22 withdrawn.

23 MS. KERNS: The Republicans will.

24 MS. STOHR: The next challenge is

1 by Candidate Trump, no date on judge of
2 election signature, so a little different
3 than a missing board worker signature.

4 MS. KERNS: We'll withdraw that
5 challenge.

6 MS. STOHR: The challenge is
7 withdrawn. The next challenge is by
8 Candidate Gill, voter registration not
9 active. This is the provisional.

10 MS. KERNS: This is Kia Mclaughn?
11 Can you pull --

12 MS. STOHR: Yes, Kia Mclaughn.

13 MS. KERNS: Yeah, we'll withdraw
14 that challenge.

15 MS. STOHR: Challenge is withdrawn.
16 The next is for a challenge brought by
17 Candidate Kahn.

18 MS. SNYDER: Withdraw.

19 MS. STOHR: It is withdrawn, and it
20 was determined to be out of county, which was
21 the basis for the challenge. The next
22 challenge was filed by the Republican party.
23 It stated that there was no county or
24 municipality. Here's the provisional. The

1 staff determined it should be a full count.
2 So it probably should have been in our voter
3 information missing category.

4 MS. KERNS: Do you know what line
5 this is on the spreadsheet?

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: 574.

7 MS. STOHR: This is line 574 on the
8 spreadsheet. Jacklyn Lindsey.

9 MR. RICHARDSON: Actually it's for
10 Marilyn Ross.

11 MS. KERNS: Yeah.

12 MS. STOHR: Oh. So this is
13 correctly categorized on the spreadsheet as
14 voter information missing. So we have
15 already voted on this one. I apologize.

16 MR. BLUESTEIN: 351.

17 MS. STOHR: 351, already voted on.
18 Okay. The next challenge is from Candidate
19 Bashir stating that this person already voted
20 on 11/5/24. Here is the provisional ballot
21 for Denroy Myrie.

22 MS. KERNS: I'm sorry. Can you
23 tell me the line on this spreadsheet?

24 MR. BLUESTEIN: 378.

1 MS. STOHR: 378. Sorry. We have
2 already voted on this one. I apologize.
3 There were some sorting errors. The next one
4 is minority inspector date missing, similar
5 to the one that we voted on earlier. The
6 staff determined it should be a full count.
7 This is Marilyn Ross.

8 MS. KERNS: So the challengers will
9 withdraw that challenge.

10 MS. STOHR: The challenge has been
11 withdrawn.

12 MS. KERNS: The Republicans
13 withdraw.

14 MS. STOHR: The next challenge
15 states that the registration deadline has
16 passed, from Candidate Martina White. This
17 is the provisional, and the staff determined
18 it should be a partial count.

19 MS. KERNS: What is that
20 challenging?

21 MS. STOHR: This is number 575.

22 MS. KERNS: Yeah. The Republicans
23 will withdraw that challenge.

24 MS. STOHR: The challenge is

1 withdrawn. And our final ballot, a challenge
2 from Candidate Trump, no date on judge of
3 election's signature.

4 MS. KERNS: And the Republicans
5 will withdraw that challenge.

6 MS. STOHR: The challenge for
7 Rachel Winchester is withdrawn. That
8 concludes our provisional challenge hearing.

9 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Thank
10 you, everybody. Appreciate y'all. Vice
11 Chair Deeley, do you have any other business
12 to be raised at this meeting?

13 MS. DEELEY: Yes, Mr. Chairman, if
14 I may.

15 CHAIR SABIR: Proceed.

16 MS. DEELEY: I would like to amend
17 my vote on the blank form challenge. That
18 was the first category. I would like to be
19 recorded as voting in the affirmative while
20 stating for the record that I believe that we
21 should be counting those two one-signature
22 votes. In addition to that, on the motion
23 for the multiple challenge categories, I
24 would like to state that I believe that we

1 should be counting the one-vote signature
2 ballots on those four ballots. Thank you.

3 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you. Secretary
4 Bluestein, do you have any other business to
5 be raised at this meeting?

6 MR. BLUESTEIN: I have no other
7 business. Thank you, Chairman.

8 CHAIR SABIR: Thank you,
9 commissioners.

10 (Meeting adjourned at 3:57 p.m.)

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
